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# Message from Reverend Choi

The Spirit of the Sovereign LORD is on me, because the LORD has anointed me to proclaim good news to the poor.
He has sent me to bind up the broken-hearted, to proclaim freedom for the captives and release from darkness for the prisoners,<sup>[a]</sup>
<sup>2</sup> to proclaim the year of the LORD's favour and the day of vengeance of our God, to comfort all who mourn, (Isaiah 61. 1-2)

In this passage, the prophet Isaiah shows the Israelites the great picture of the Jubilee, when they are all freed and rejoice in God's favour. It is to give them hope and promise them of the Messiah whom they have been waiting for. And, not surprisingly, we see this passage being quoted by Jesus (Luke 4. 18-19), when he first preached at the synagogue in Nazareth. In this sense, it sounds very much like a 'Mission Statement', which declares what he is going to do in his ministry, his aims and goals in line with the vision God has shown to him.

Then, as a Methodist, I find it interesting to see its link with John Wesley's ministry. In Bristol, near the city centre, there is a place called 'Bread Street'. (I know Bristol a bit better than

any other cities in England, as we lived there over eight years for my studying and training.)

At the corner of that street, we can find a small, bronze plaque, which reads "This is the place, where John Wesley, the founder of Methodism, first preached in the open air, on the 2<sup>nd</sup> of April 1739."

And, Isaiah 61. 1-2, the passage above, is inscribed on it, as it was the text John preached on.

To me, it's not surprising that he chose this passage for his first open air preaching, because he knew that the good news of salvation should go to everyone, particularly to the poor, the prisoners, the sick, and the oppressed. It was his mission statement. On that day, he preached to about three thousand people in the Brickfield. Amazing!

Over the last eighteen months, we have been talking about our mission, action plans, and so on. And, at the Church Council meeting last month, we all agreed to adopt a 'Vision Statement' as follows:

"Having borne witness to the glory of God for 150 years, we are here to continue our mission, to raise our profile as a force for good in this changing community and to strengthen our fellowship."

I think it is very appropriate, as we are celebrating the 150<sup>th</sup> anniversary of our church now. I hope and pray that we all may be well aware of our vision and move forward to achieve this vision together with God's help and his guidance.

## Your Church Needs YOU!

In September Megan leaves New Malden for college so we will need **2** new stewards.

Could one of them be **YOU**?

What does a steward do?

- You are a member of the church.
- You are a member of the church council, and as such are a trustee of the church.
- You become a leader of the church community. So you represent the mood/feelings of the church to the circuit when necessary

#### On a Sunday

You are the manager of the building on 2 Sundays a month with another steward.

- You open the building and close it.
- You put up the numbers of the hymns and set up the church for worship
- You look after the preacher that morning.
- You introduce the preacher and welcome the congregation, light the peace candle
- You give out notices if necessary.
- You find 4 people to take the collection, and then lock it away at end of service.
- You bundle the flowers and give them to people or arrange for them to be given to people

Other duties are-

- 8 stewards meetings a year approx. 1 ½ hours in length
- One month in 4 you are the one who writes to the visiting preacher a Standard letter of invitation.
- You try to attend circuit meetings once every 4 months.

None of this is really arduous and you are a member of a team and a big family.

Perhaps all the above is not possible for you so why not consider being a **Vestry Steward**.

You do not have to be a member of the church.

You commit to 1 service every 4 to 6 weeks when you will help the steward on duty to prep the church. (Rota for 3 months planned a month in advance) Other roles we need to find people for include:-

- Operating the projection system on a Sunday morning. This would mainly involve pressing a button to move slides on during a service and full training can be given. It is a job that can be done even by the most computer innocent.
- Delivering flowers after the service or on the Monday

Please consider these opportunities to support the work of this church and its worship on a Sunday. Perhaps discuss with myself or any of the stewards.
