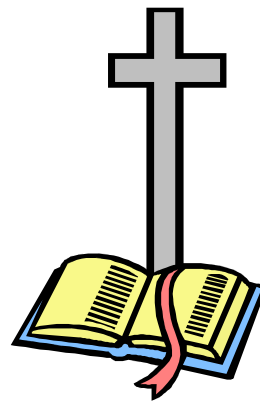

Minister's Letter

Dear Friends,

On July 3rd I will be performing a special, highly privileged task. I will be assisting at the ordination of a new Methodist Presbyterian. The laying on of hands at an ordination has always had profound significance in the Church. For the Orthodox, Roman Catholic and Anglican Churches, it encapsulates the idea of the continuity of the Church through the continuity of its ministers. The idea is that there is an unbroken chain of ministry from Jesus, through St Peter and onwards to the present day priests. Of course we know, because of the history of the Church, that this is simply not the case. The 'line' of apostolic succession as it is known, has been broken at least twice, and probably more than that as a result of disputes, schisms and divisions in the Church.

In the Methodist Church, the laying on of hands is intended to be symbolic rather than sacramental. Three people, rather than one Bishop assist at an ordination. The President of Conference, or the President's representative – to signify the relationship which the minister will enter into with the Methodist Church, a minister from the World Church – to signify the catholicity of the Church and the ordinand's calling to a world parish, and an assisting minister – to signify that none of us can come to this calling without support and assistance from others of the people of God.

Methodists are not ordained into the 'historic episcopate' but into a covenant of law and grace with God, and the people of God as laid down in our 'doctrine and discipline'. A minister in the Methodist Church is not ordained to the Methodist Church, but to the World wide Church of Christ – which we believe all Christians, regardless of their denomination, belong to.

Sadly, because we are not ordained into the 'historic episcopate' by a Bishop, the ordination of a Methodist Minister is not recognized by the Anglican, Roman Catholic or Orthodox Churches. Regardless of the fact that Methodist Ministers train side by side with Anglican Ministers, often work alongside them in social justice projects in Churches together events etc, the simple fact remains that to my Anglican brothers and sisters, I am not 'ordained' I am not a priest, which means, for example, that our services of Holy Communion are not 'really' in their opinion, the 'sacrament' that Christ requires of all his disciples.

Minister's Letter

There is no difference in the eyes of the Anglican Church between a Methodist minister and an Anglican Lay person.

The Anglican Methodist Covenant is just one of the reports which will be discussed at this year's conference. It is a significant report because if it is adopted steps can be taken to create new ecumenical areas where Anglican Priests can and will be recognized and able to minister as Methodist Ministers, in Methodist Churches but Methodist Ministers will still not be recognized as being ordained – which means they will still not be able to celebrate Holy Communion, or even Baptize, in an Anglican Church. The new arrangement is designed to perpetuate and even amplify the lie that there are no real differences dividing us.

This year, in addition to assisting at the ordination of a new Methodist Presbyterian, I will be celebrating the anniversary of my own ordination – as will every other Methodist minister as Methodists only ordain once a year – at Conference on Conference Sunday. I ask for your prayers for all of us, and for our Anglican brothers and sisters. Pray that a way may be found for the differences that divide us to actually be resolved, rather than disguised or hidden, so that the unity we seek will be worthy of Christ.

'Though we are many, we are one body, because we all share in the one bread'

The Methodist Conference:

This year the Methodist Conference is at Southport. On the Agenda are some highly significant reports which, if their recommendations are adopted, will change the structure, worship and practice of the Methodist Church as we currently know it.

The debates and the reports can be followed online by anyone who is interested.

The debates are streamed live so you can listen to the Conference over the internet. The Agendas, containing all the reports can be downloaded.

Following Conference, opportunities will be created for those who are interested to discuss some of the key reports and to consider our own response as a local Church and as part of the Circuit.

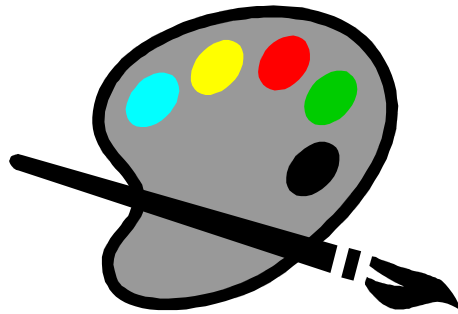

Rotary Shoe Boxes - Harvest Collection



As you know, for some years now, Junior Church and others connected with the Church have been filling shoe boxes for needy children, families and older people in Eastern Europe via the Rotary International Shoebox Scheme. These have traditionally been received at our Gift Service at the beginning of December.

Last year, the number of boxes collected was considerably fewer than in previous years, as was the number of gifts for needy children in this country, so we thought we'd try to spread the load a bit this year.

We shall be collecting the shoe boxes over the summer months – July, August and September – and presenting them as part of our gifts at our Harvest Festival Service on the morning of 18 September. This will also mean that our boxes are available for collection by Rotary by the end of September and are therefore more likely to reach Eastern Europe in time for Christmas.

We hope you will support this experiment. The boxes and lists of possible contents will be available in the Welcome Area from Sunday 26 June. We are, of course, still happy to receive gifts of individual items to be included in the boxes which will be filled by Junior Church at a date in September to be announced and donations of cash towards the cost of the boxes.

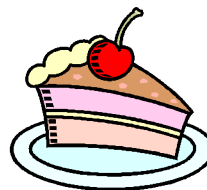
Church Garden Party and Cream Tea

Notes on Church AGM – Sunday 8th May 2011

The meeting was chaired by Revd Dr Angela Shier-Jones; with 34 people attending.

The minutes of the AGM held on 16th May 2010 were agreed and signed and under “Matters Arising”, it was also agreed that a telephone answering machine would be installed in the minister’s vestry.

Angela thanked all those who had contributed to the Annual Report and invited the meeting to break into groups to discuss the contents; after which the following points were raised.

- John King and Pam Bugeya have been managing the Sunday collections for the last 10 years and would like to be replaced within the next year or so.
- Angela drew attention to the fact that although much of the Report suggests a thriving church, we have vacant posts in several areas of activity. In addition, the treasurer has reported that our reserves have continued to fall with the up-grading of our premises and that there has been a small decline in the use of the Envelope Scheme. Note was made of the fact that we are indebted to our older members and friends for their work in the church; however we need to work hard with our minister to encourage younger members and adherents to increase their participation in the various church activities. In addition to Angela’s goal of promoting more people to take part in our worship; for example in sharing in Bible readings and intercessory prayers, it was agreed that it was important for those who are more mature in their faith to support and build confidence in our younger members and friends. Taking part in our membership classes could be encouraged for instance; particularly as some posts can only be filled by church members. It was suggested that it would be of benefit to prepare an up-to-date list of people who are prepared to contribute to our worship and other activities. Angela, together with the stewards will try to implement these ideas.
- Angela introduced discussion on the possible purchase of the new Methodist hymn book, “Singing the Faith”. The other churches in the Circuit have already placed orders and Angela mentioned that the new hymn book contains good Methodist theology and would

- provide an opportunity to shape our future worship. Peter Bullett provided helpful background information based on his research on the project. Various views were expressed regarding the merit of buying the new hymn book and how the costs involved in purchasing the different versions (word, music and electronic) might be covered. It was agreed that a special AGM would be called in the autumn so that a decision could be made before the advantage of the introductory discount price is lost.
- Angela thanked the present Church Stewards, Treasurer and Church Council Secretary for their work over the year. George Alleyne, Jane Bennett, Janet Jones and Liz Edwards were re-appointed for a further year; to be joined by Maurice Chattle. The Junior Steward post is still under consideration. Rosemarie Lester was appointed as Church Council Secretary and it was agreed that Caroline Afriyie would take over from Tony Chalk as Treasurer later in the year. Peter Bullett was elected as a Church Council representative to join the other 11 others, who were re-appointed for the year. These include, Sue Knowles, Jenny Reid, Pam Vincent, Pam Wardley, Alan Clarke, Liz Edwards, Stella Chattle, Sue Abell, Nicola Horton, Sarah Moore and Alan Vincent.
- The following Circuit changes will take place in August 2011. Rev Donghwan Kim will move to Camden, Rev Seung-Wook Jung will move to Norfolk and Rev Elizabeth Osei will move to Chessington.
- It was agreed that Kingston Churches Action on Homelessness (KCAH) will be our Church home charity this year and Wells for India will be our overseas charity.
- Under “Any Other Business”, Brian Shier-Jones was asked to check on the loop system on the public address equipment in the Sanctuary and arrange any necessary repairs.

Next year’s AGM will be on 29th April 2012.

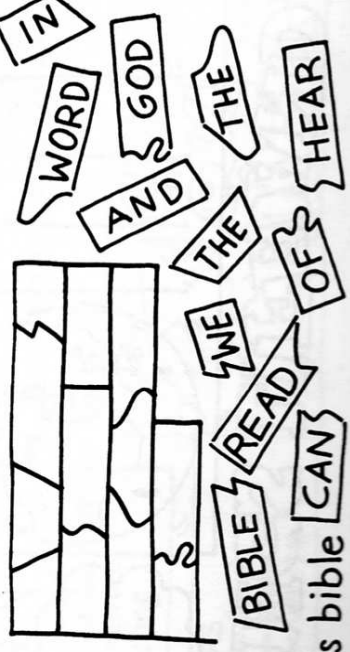

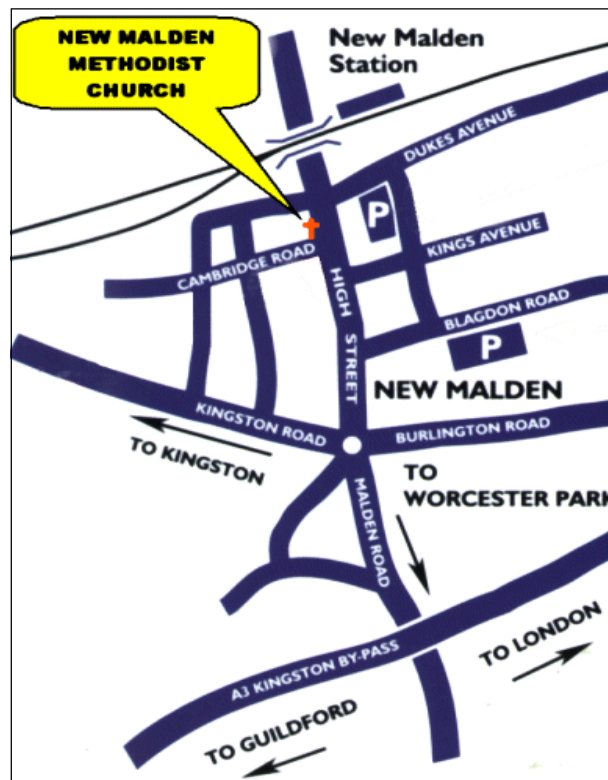
