But, we need to notice that the answer is there, the basic activities of learning, sharing and praying in love and mutual support. Whatever plan we make, I am sure this must be something we need to put in the first place. Then, I believe we can see a difference in the life of the church, not only in numbers, but also in relationships with each other and with God. I hope and pray that in our special celebration this month we may remember these basics and with them we may continue our mission in this place for another 150 years and further.

Jesus Fish

What are the origins?

The Jesus fish is perhaps the earliest symbol for Christianity. Some reports of its use date back to the end of the 1st Century AD and it is believed to predate the symbol of the cross. The fish is reported to have given Christians a simple means by which to identify themselves as believers in a time of persecution. This was a time when Christians began to come against pagan emperors and others who called themselves gods. As Christians proclaimed the sin of idol worship and false saviours, it was important to boldly stand on and state their beliefs even though it placed them in danger.

Fish are talked about many times throughout the New Testament Gospels. The symbol probably came about because of those references. One of the most notable is found in Matthew 4:19. Many of Jesus original disciples were fishermen by profession. He told them that if they would follow Him, He would make them fishers of men. The symbolism to these fishermen represented their commission to bring souls

into the knowledge and recognition of Jesus as the Saviour. Spreading the good news of Jesus is at the very heart of the calling of all Christians still today.

There are other biblical scriptures that include fish such as the miracle Jesus performed by feeding five thousand listeners when He multiplied a young boy's five small loaves and two fishes. This story is told in all four Gospels, Matthew 14; Mark 6; Luke 9 and John 6. The Jesus fish is a symbol that says, with Jesus the Saviour, all things are possible.

1867 and all that

I thought it might be an idea for someone to write an article about the historical context into which our church was born 150 years ago - not so much the local context as I suspect Robin Gill will more than cover that on 11th July, but from a more national and international perspective. So here I am writing said article....

It will come as no surprise that almost at the mid-point of the Victorian age, it was Queen Victoria on the throne. You might be more surprised that the Prime Minister was not one of the 19th century heavyweights but the Earl of Derby – nominal head of a Tory minority government in fact. Across the pond in the US, Andrew Johnson was President and – quiz aficionados pay attention – he had no vice POTUS.

In politics 1867 was a seminal year with the second extension of the franchise passed in what became known imaginatively as the Second



Reform Act. This one doubled the electorate by adding many urban working men to the franchise. Interestingly, an amendment from John Stuart Mill to

extend the vote to women was defeated in the House of Commons. Most historians are pretty cynical about Benjamin Disraeli's motivation behind the Act (he was the power behind Derby), but whatever the case the electorate gave him a bloody nose and rewarded him by voting for arch-rival Gladstone in at the 1868 General Election.

In other political news at home, there was a failed Fenian Rising in February. With hindsight, neither this issue nor the question of votes for women or even a few more men would go away any time soon.

Abroad, some aspects of the world map were slowly taking their modern form. So, it's happy 150th birthday to Canada this year as the British North America Act received Royal Assent in 1867, forming the Dominion of Canada. Ottawa became the capital, and John A. Macdonald the first prime minister.




In the Strait Settlement, Singapore became a Crown Colony under the jurisdiction of the Colonial Office in London. The Suez Canal opened to shipping traffic and the US purchased Alaska from the Russians for the bargain price of 2 cents per acre. Lots more quiz trivia here for you.

In Europe, the seeds of pre-1914 tensions and conflicts were clearly being sown. The Constitution of the North German Confederation with Prussia at the helm and Bismarck as Minister President marked the embryonic beginnings of the unified German state. Not far away, the Austro Hungarian dual monarchy was established by the Compromise agreement. It's almost ironic that barbed wire was also patented this year.



In medicine, a wise person named Lister wrote about his research on antiseptics in surgery and a reduction in hospital mortality rates. This rightly earned him the epithet "father of modern surgery". Marie Curie was born this year though the world of science lost two titans in the form of William Marsden and Michael Faraday. Latterly, according to Wikipedia ", his main discoveries include the principles underlying electromagnetic induction, diamagnetism and electrolysis." And if you want to know what this means, ask Peter Bullett!

In economics, Britain was still on a relative high following the industrial revolution; trade was still massively important and we still had Colonies to trade with. Just around the corner though, the depression of the 1870's lurked so it won't be a total surprise to learn that Marx wrote Das Kapital in 1867. Sure as eggs is eggs, bust follows boom.



In wider society, there were lots of firsts in 1867:

- The first blue plaque at Lord Byron's birthplace Holles Street.
- The first Lambeth Conference
- The first test of Dynamite at Redhill! Of all places
- The first performance of Johann Strauss II's waltz "The Blue Danube" – just imagine if you'd never heard the Blue Danube....
- The foundation stone of the Royal Albert Hall was laid
- QPR and Wasps were formed
- Matthew Arnold's lyric poem Dover Beach was published
- Walter Bagehot's treatise The English Constitution was released in book form – this is a thrilling and entertaining read, I can tell you.

The world welcomed: Stanley Baldwin, John Galsworthy, Toscanini, Frank Lloyd Wright and Mary of Teck. It bid farewell to Baudelaire, Emperor Komei of Japan, and King Otto of Greece.

It would be nice to end this whistle-stop tour of 1867 with something specific to Methodism so how's this – for once I'm hoping Wikipedia is wrong:

"The Reverend Thomas Baker, a Wesleyan Methodist missionary was cooked and eaten by Navatusila tribespeople at Nabutautau on Fiji, together with eight of his local followers, the last missionary in that country to suffer cannibalism." Some claim to fame!

That's all folks.

welcome. The swings are nearby too.


