Message from Reverend Choi Dear friends,

By the time you read this message, most of you may have forgotten what we celebrated on Easter a month ago. But, Easter stories continue and actually will be completed through Ascension, and then we will be celebrating one of the exciting events in the Church history, that is, Pentecost. It is exciting, not only because the disciples experienced the mysterious power of the Holy Spirit, but also, and more importantly, with the help of that power, they started to form a new faith community, so called, the 'Church'. Therefore, it is the church's birthday!

But, as we celebrate Pentecost, I think we need to look back and see how the early church believers lived their lives in that new faith community and committed themselves to the church. As for this matter, first few chapters of the Acts give us some brief pictures of their lives. But, what seems clear is that they were a 'learning community, a praying community, and a sharing community'. They met every day for learning the Scripture, for praying together, and for breaking bread together, which doesn't look quite different from what we've been taught as Christians although we may find it not easy to practise it every day.
