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# **Message from Reverend Choi**

#### Dear friends,

I think, after the big celebration of Easter, we seem to live in a somehow awkward time in many ways, not only because of the unsettled weather, but also because of the uncertain future of the world, politically as well as economically. Globally, we see tensions getting more and more serious in the Middle East and in the Korean Peninsular. And, nationally, we see the so-called 'snap general election' coming up and all the parties selling manifestos for their campaigns, which don't seem to be promising but rather coming with more doubts.

In my understanding 'doubt' is an interesting word, which appears a few times in the post-Easter stories of the gospels. We can find one from John 20, where Thomas was told 'Stop doubting and believe'. He is known as 'doubting Thomas', which doesn't sound nice. And, Matthew 28, the last chapter of this gospel gives us another example, where the eleven disciples gathered at Galilee and met the risen Jesus, and there they worshiped him, but some 'doubted'. You may say, "How could they worship the Lord with doubt?" But, according to Matthew, that's what they did. Not all of them, but some, of course. You may blame them of their lack of faith. On this issue, Paula Gooder argues in her book 'This Risen Existence', that the word 'doubt' is one of those much-abused words in English language. (You must know it much better than me!). For instance, when we say 'I very much doubt that', it often means 'I am confident you are wrong'. But, Paula insists that the word 'doubt' actually doesn't mean anything like that. It is the word that stands precisely between belief and unbelief. Therefore, it simply marks a lack of sureness, she says. And, we can understand how they felt, after witnessing the shocking and distressing death of Jesus. So, it is not that surprising that some of them doubted. And, it seems that it was the reason why Jesus had to stay with them for forty more days until he ascended into heaven. I often think it was a kind of extra lesson to give them confidence in preaching the good news to the world.

In our Church calendar, we celebrate Ascension Day on 25 May, on which some people still have doubt. But, I just want them to be reminded that even some of the disciples worshipped Jesus with doubt. Then, eventually their all doubts were cleared on the day of Pentecost, when they were all mysteriously filled with the Holy Spirit. That was his love. And, his love endures forever.

This month, we have another big event coming, that is, 'Christian Aid week'. And, without doubt, I believe our church must have been involved in this campaign for many years and supported it in various ways. We know how greatly and wonderfully this campaign has helped and influenced so many people's lives over the world. Yet, needs are still there.

So, I hope and pray that at this Christian Aid week, we all may share the love Jesus showed us by either generously giving away or actively being involved, not because we have enough, but because their needs are huge.

# Mission Planning: the results are out!



In a Service some weeks ago, Choi presented some audio visual materials which were being shared round the 4 churches in the Circuit, about the ongoing process of Mission Planning.

Members of the Congregation were then asked to fill in a short individual form,

outlining firstly our perceived Strengths as a Church, and secondly the Opportunities we could find in which to grow and expand our Mission. The challenge presented to us was to improve what we do by 1% under four broad headings: Community Engagement, Generations, Discipleship and Worship. We received only about 15 written responses, but in the intervening weeks, the Stewards have also had informal conversations with people about these topics.

We then met with Choi to consider the responses and we can now report back to you both the findings and the proposals for future development.

Under 'Strengths,' our **Community Engagement** was felt to be strong –, people appreciated our comfortable and spacious premises and the body of volunteers willing and able to man, administer and maintain them. We are open 7 days a week and host a variety of activities for all age groups. We use our abilities and resources to raise funds for a variety of causes. The Welcome Area/Coffee Bar was seen to be key in this outreach – it serves a great many people and needs throughout the week; customers and servers alike.

With regard to '**Generations'**, we have a small but thriving Junior Church, and our age range, although weighted towards the top end, goes from small babies on the Cradle Roll to regular attendees who are in their eighties and nineties. JMA collections help young and old to meet each other and there are also Church family events such as the pantomime and the barbecue.

Concerning **Discipleship**, it was acknowledged that we are encouraged and helped to find our own Christian pathway, guided by our Ministers and worship leaders. There are Fellowship groups, Housegroups, Prayer groups, Bible study sessions and a Pastoral system which seeks to reach all members and adherents who want this.

Regarding W**orship**, our Church was felt to be warm, caring and welcoming. Our services are quite diverse in style and are inclusive and approachable. Several people mentioned our rich musical tradition: we are led by a loyal choir and an excellent organist and we have annual ecumenical events involving singers from many other churches. We also have people willing to do prayers, readings and more if required.

This is all very positive, but there is no room for complacency. Under 'Opportunities,' several concerns and suggestions were put forward, and we attempted to address these, as follows:

The congregation and membership is declining steadily, and it is becoming more and more difficult to fill key roles, recruit people to positions on committees and find enough volunteers to man the coffee bar. We are looking at ways to break these roles down so that more people might feel able to take on a small job, on a rota basis.

There have been significant problems with the audio visual system. These are being addressed and rectified with new equipment, and people will be trained in using the new technology. We will ensure that it supports our worship effectively but not intrusively.

Some people felt there should be more Housegroups. In response, it was felt that there are quite a number of groups already, who might be encouraged to welcome new members more actively. Anyone is at liberty to start a new group on or off the Church premises.

There were various suggestions for more diversity in our styles of Worship, but it was acknowledged that to a large extent we are reliant on our various preachers who choose the hymns and influence the general style and tenor of the services. This range can be seen as a strength, but there was also a significant number of people who said that they found some local preachers difficult to understand. This is a sensitive issue, as it goes right back to Training and perhaps beyond, but we will try to mention the problem at a higher level when it occurs. The Stewards will continue to encourage preachers to keep family services short, and to engage people more actively. Recently, we have seen an increase in the number of

young people involved in our services, particularly in the Local Arrangement/Songs of Praise- type services. We want this to continue. The use of instruments other than the piano or organ was suggested... this would be welcome, but we need players to come forward!

Our most successful services - in terms of numbers, at least - are the Christingle and Easter Sunday, where there are many visitors in all age groups.

We need to encourage the 20-40 age group. We must welcome our youngsters back after their University years, however infrequently they are able to be with us. Factotum is an important link here. Parents of the children who come to our weekly activities are encouraged to come on Sundays too, and we always have a crèche available to support this. We must be careful to get the balance right, however, between being sufficiently welcoming, and trying to involve them too much too soon. Just being prepared to talk to people you haven't seen or spoken to before is a good start. There are opportunities before and after the Service. We have recently introduced name labels once a month, to assist with getting to know people.

It was strongly felt that the 150Y celebrations give us a unique and exciting opportunity to capitalise and expand on our position and reputation on the High Street. It is hoped that every member of our Church community- in its widest sense -will get involved in at least some part of the many events being planned: we hope to get the message ' out there' about what it is we do 'in here' inside the glass doors.

The signs outside are looking tired and dated. The mosaic will be a huge improvement, will give us focus, and will be lit, but we will also improve the noticeboards inside and outside to make us look lively and more up to date, and also to give accurate information about all the activities.

Our Coffee Bar has been aptly described as 'The everyday face of Service' and 'The window on the High Street'. This is where we shall focus our energies .We want to expand its function, usefulness and outreach; for example by perhaps offering it on an occasional basis to various groups of vulnerable or disadvantaged people such as those with Autism or people from Care Homes, in much the same way as it is used once a month for the Memory Cafe. There was also a suggestion that we might give it a name, such as 'Wesley's' and effectively 'rebrand 'ourselves to raise awareness further.

In conclusion, the Stewards would like to thank everyone who responded to the questions, and for their helpful thoughts and suggestions. If you somehow missed the consultation process, Julie, Jenny, Alison and Megan -are always willing to receive feedback about any aspect of Church life and worship which concerns you. Please feel free to speak to them about anything you particularly like or dislike. We can at least attempt to feed back to the right quarter and hopefully address the issue. In particular, would you please let Alison know if you have read this far, and what you think about these proposals.

Please also think about how you could involve yourself further in the life and work of your Church. We will not turn down any offer of help. Could you read a lesson? It can be done from the pew. Maybe you could do one hour on the coffee bar if 2 is a bit of a stretch? Do you feel able to arrange the flowers once a year, or perhaps to deliver them and /or a few newsletters and visit someone who is ill or housebound?

We hope and pray that things will grow from these various branches extending into the furthest reaches of New Malden and beyond. In celebrating our heritage and past this year, we must also look to the future so that we can hand on a thriving place of Fellowship and Worship to the generations who come after us.

Her legal and court fees now have to be met, which are very significant (and Becky's visa did not allow her to take up employment while in this country.)

In order to raise some funds to offset these costs we have arranged a KMC Family Night Out on 6 May. The evening is free, but donations are invited to help offset the cost of the legal fees incurred in Rebecca's unsuccessful fight to remain in the UK.
