Message from Reverend Choi

Dear friends,

Last month I went up to Swanwick in Derbyshire, with our Superintendent Rev. Stan Brown, for a conference titled 'Re-Imagine', which was a residential conference for three days, attended by about two hundred church leaders and ministers. It was mainly designed to explore different ways of being Church for the 21st century and to share their experiences of moving from ideas to action. Personally I felt it was an excellent conference, well-organised with excellent speakers and workshops. And, I was challenged and inspired a lot by some fundamental questions and issues, difficulties and opportunities we are facing as 'Church'.

What impressed me most was that most of the keynote speakers rarely mentioned any particularly strategies or policies of mission, rather they seemed to stress on the fundamental element of our faith, that is, Love. To be honest, I haven't heard any great, new ideas of mission, or projects or activities. All the stories of so-called successful churches were not anything new: what they do is not that different from what we do here - coffee bar, mums and toddlers, messy church, house groups, café church, engaging with community groups (including uniform groups or pre-school), and so on. Of course, there might be some differences in running or organising those activities. But, I don't think we are any less professional than others, and our facilities are less equipped than others, I dare to say. What makes a difference, then? The answer may not be easy. But, we may need to think of a question 'Why do we do this?'

The word 'mission' seems to have emerged as something we should take seriously today, as we face serious decline in membership and church attendance. But, that shouldn't be a reason in the first place, because it sounds like shouting 'Save our church'. Yet, we are here to 'save the people' with the love of God. More importantly, what we should remember is we are here for God's mission, and He says 'You don't need activities. You need Me. You need 'Fresh Expression' of Me, My love'.

As we are preparing to celebrate the 150th Anniversary of the church, I hope we may Re-Kindle the love of God and share his love more with the people in our community.


Worship Today and Tomorrow




NAME BADGES
