Message from Reverend Choi

Just left 'the jungle' in Calais. It was humbling and inspiring to see so many people smile as they read a Bible in their own language. Eritreans and Ethiopians were thrilled to receive Amharic Bibles. Iragi Christians took Arabic Bibles too. We also gave personally donated clothes, shoes and blankets to the leaders of St Michael's church to distribute to those who needed it most. There were many, many western charities there giving aid. People there need hope - they feel abandoned. Many said the Bible has given them that hope. They have been on boats where they saw people washed away and have left wives and children behind. There are also 333 women and 123 children in the camp and we talked to a woman who is 5 months pregnant. We prayed with people who asked us and felt humbled by their faith.

Couple of weeks ago, after the service, a lady came to me and said, "So, what can we do? If they all come over here, how can we cope with them?" Well, to be honest, I don't know the answer. And, I fully appreciate her genuine concerns. Yes, before we open the border, we must be well prepared to tackle all the issues which may affect our usual

lives. We must be realistic and practical in dealing with this unprecedented humanitarian crisis. But, on the other hand, what best can we do, except praying to God for his wisdom and following his command? In Leviticus 19. 34, it says, "The alien living with you must be treated as one of your native-born. Love him as yourself, for you were aliens in Egypt. I am the Lord your God."

There doesn't seem to be any condition in doing this. He just asks us to do this only because they are aliens, no matter who they are.

This must be a big challenge to each one of us, I believe. But, I am sure we will grow in faith by facing it obediently.

A few words from the editor.

Partly because churches are being challenged to spread the word on blood donation, and partly because I'm a regular donor myself. I often see colleagues from the Methodist Church at donor sessions but only about 7% of the UK population are regular donors. Each year the Blood Service needs to recruit an additional 204,000 to replace regular donors who can no longer donate – due to their age for instance.

So have a look at blood.co.uk to see if you are eligible and to book a session – the blood vans come to New Malden about once a month or you can pop along to the permanent centre at Tooting. I'm been missing a pint of blood (or an armful as Tony Hancock put it) since Wednesday but got a free cuppa and some crisps in return so think it's a pretty good deal!
