# **Message from Reverend Choi**

Do you know what I want?

I want justice – oceans of it.

I want fairness –rivers of it.

That's what I want. That's all I want. (Amos 5. 24, MSG)

"Holiness and Justice"

Some of you may know that it is the theme, which the President and the Vice President of the conference have chosen for this year. At first glance, to be honest, I thought these two words were not well matched, as they seem to have quite different roots in their meanings and to reflect different images in their use. In my understanding, holiness is 'setting apart', something personal or even private, and something more spiritual, which we are asked to pursue all through our Christian journey, whereas justice is more social, more active, and more engaging with the public.

But, if we look at our history, we can easily find that they have the same root in Methodism, and in the 18<sup>th</sup> century there was a kind of 'Holiness movement', so called 'social holiness'. As we know, Methodism started from the Holy Club in Oxford, where John and Charles Wesley, with handful of their friends, were seeking to find out the right way of living as Christians and trying to practice the holy life-style, living out 'justice' in the community, in the society, and in the world. Their methodical endeavour to achieve this actually made them called 'Methodists'. In this sense, 'holiness and justice' might be one of the best matched words in our tradition.

At synod last month (in September), we heard a word 'pesky' or 'pesky Methodists' repeated and repeated all through the day. It seemed 'pesky' was the theme of the day. To me, honestly, it wasn't a familiar word and didn't sound attractive or favourable. However, although it might have rather negative connotations, we were strongly challenged to be 'Pesky Methodists', to do justice, not ignoring the needy, the poor, and refugees in particular as their struggles still continue and never seem to end.

It is crucial in the life of the church to be aware of where the world is going and what God wants us to do in this world. Especially as we celebrate the Harvest, Christmas, or anniversaries, we may need to be more mindful of the situations around the world, and never mind being called 'pesky' in seeking to do justice. I truly believe that is

what God wants. Amos reminds us of this message: "Do you know what I want? I want justice –oceans of it. I want fairness –rivers of it. That's all I want."


