# **Message from Karl**

One day, when I was about eight, my mum announced that she'd lost her glasses again and asked me to help her look for them. For about half an hour, the two of us searched high and low, but there was no sign of them. Eventually, my brother emerged from his bedroom and asked us what we were doing. When my mum told him that we were hunting for her glasses, I remember he looked puzzled, and said, 'you're wearing them, mum'. The next day, mum made an optician's appointment!

Sometimes, it's hard to see what's right in front of us — literally in this case — and it takes a fresh pair of eyes to help us get a truer picture of what's happening. One of the gifts I hope that I can bring as a newly arrived minister is the fresh perspective of someone coming into our church community from the outside, and having become a Christian in my twenties, something of how things might appear to those who are unfamiliar with both this particular building, and Methodism more generally.

Since arriving in New Malden, I've been really encouraged to discover a church with a heart for its wider community, and a great asset in the coffee shop and welcome area. I've enjoyed meeting lots of friendly, welcoming and committed people, and there are many positive things to build on as we look beyond the recent anniversary celebrations to the next 150 years of ministry and mission in this place. However, there are also things, it looks to me, that we need to work on together.

With that in mind, I'd like to invite you to participate in a process of rebranding and refreshing, that I hope will help us make the most of what we have and connect with those currently on the outside of the church. Thus, over the next six months and with the help of Kate Pozzo (an expert in branding who has worked with many churches, including Surbiton Hill), we will be looking at:

Designing a new logo, which picks up on our beautiful mosaic and speaks clearly about who we are and what's important to us;

Improving the church website, in order to help attract and communicate with younger people;

Marketing the coffee shop more effectively, with a brand that appeals beyond church circles;

Making the most of the welcome area, with dedicated space for new welcome material, the possibility of new leaflet holders to reduce clutter, and eye-catching signs for the coffee bar;

Thinking about signage on the windows, using the video screen more effectively and finding ways to make it clearer that the chapel is open for prayer and chilling out

If you have any ideas, comments or suggestions you would like to offer, please do get in touch with me; I'd love to hear from you. Finally, please pray that what emerges through this work will enable us to proclaim the love of God to those outside the church, make new connections, and build lasting relationships.

Gillian Gillman and I went to Albania in September for our annual visit to see the Celaj family. Needless to say a warm welcome always awaits us and they make every effort to make our visit a happy one.

They arrived in New Malden in 1999 as illegal refugees and were sent back to Albania in 2003. Thanks to Gillian, she found out about ICA, the charity started in the 1990s by a British Army officer helping needy people in Albania. The Albanian director of the charity traced Elvis and Elvira, the two elder children though the school registers on a computer and in 2005 Gillian and David Gillman, Stella and Maurice Chattle, and myself made our first visit to Albania. Bleona, their youngest child, born in Kingston Hospital, celebrated her 4<sup>th</sup> birthday while we were there on that first visit so we had an English style party with birthday cake and candles.

Elvis is now 23 and living in Germany. Elvira is 22 and living with her Albanian boyfriend and their 2 year old daughter in East London, the country she longed to return to. Bleona at 16 is a good student and hopes to go to university. Garni and Drita remember the

kindness shown to them by the people in New Malden through the church, school and ICA, and thank everyone for the help they received when they were eventually found.

# **The Organ Fund**



This week the Church Council gave its approval for the Church to commit to work starting on the organ refurbishment from March, 2018, retaining Organ Pipe Services of Melton Mowbray, and the Organ Committee to launch the Organ Appeal with the intention of raising or having promises for the bulk of the £70 000 required by Christmas this year. The Finance Committee indicated how this might be achieved, including the allocation of a bequest and other funds of some £20 000.

During the next few weeks you will see a promotion in the Welcome Area explaining some background to the Organ Appeal, what the refurbishment will achieve and where we are in raising the money needed.

The Committee would like to express its gratitude to all who have already made generous donations amounting to nearly

£10 000 or commitments of financial support. We are, of course, always delighted to receive offers of fund-raising initiatives or donations which can be made by cheque payable to *New Malden Methodist Church* and given to The Treasurer, Gloria Taviner, clearly marked "for the Organ Fund" or by BACS payment to the Church account.

The refurbished organ will be a tremendous resource for enhancing our worship and for the wider musical community in New Malden.
