

## Message from Vindra

Each month before I write something for the newsletters, I go to my search engine and look at all the special events being celebrated during the month. May is awash with them, including 'Harry Potter Day' celebrated on 2 May.

So here are some of the notable ones. 2-8 May- Global campaign for Education Awareness Week 3 May- World Asthma Day 7-13 May- Deaf Awareness Week 14 May- World Fair Trade Day

And I have not included Christian Aid week amongst others.

All of these days are highlighted and celebrated because it affects someone and God has put into the hearts of men and women a desire to help, to bring comfort and to encourage all those affected to live a full life despite their limitations.

Over the years my dad has become profoundly deaf and refuses to wear his hearing aid. It is near impossible to have a conversation with him. He lip reads my mum and they communicate, although at times she gets frustrated. In the last few weeks I have had the time to reflect on how isolating it is to have very limited mobility, in my dad's case, and to also be profoundly deaf. Your world becomes smaller. Thankfully he has at least 5 visitors during the week. I have realized that what matters is presence. Because I am so used to doing things, that was hard for me at first! I just wanted to make things better. I have discovered that sometimes presence is enough. It is ok to just sit with the person and be there. Words are not always necessary. This goes completely against my nature but it is all I can do now. It is a work in progress. It is not right or wrong but a journey of discovery and each day there are new insights.

May for me is also when the church normally celebrates Pentecost, the coming of the Holy Spirit in power to the apostles, transforming them from men and women who were afraid

to people who were empowered to speak the word of God at great cost. Pentecost marks the birth of the Church and I often think a birthday cake at church is a great idea. Pentecost is sometimes referred to as the forgotten Christian festival. Most people know that Christmas celebrates the birth of Jesus, some people know that Easter refers to the death and resurrection of Jesus but if you did a survey most people would have no idea about Pentecost. There are certainly no greeting cards about. Yet this is when the Holy Spirit comes as a mighty wind and tongues of fire and the Church is born. Let us celebrate Pentecost this year and pray for a fresh outpouring and anointing of the Holy Spirit. By the time you read this letter, I should have a return date to the UK. For a long time light in this tunnel was a speck but now I can see more rays. Each week that passes draws me closer to a return date. In all of this God has been faithful and there have been many blessings. I am learning to trust God in a different way. Soon there will be a time of celebration and I feel assured that God has so much planned for us in the Kingston Circuit.

Please look after yourselves, remember God never leaves or forsake us. Be hopeful and see you soon. Blessings, Vindra

#### **Wives & Friends**

Wives was buzzing on 23<sup>rd</sup> April as their speaker was Julie Konishi who keeps bees. She lives in Coombe Gardens and keeps 4 hives in her garden and another 6 hives at Coombe Wood Golf Club.

We found out about queen bees who during the summer lay 2000 eggs a day. These eggs and the queen are looked after by the drone bees, inside the hive. Meanwhile it is the worker bees that are the ones we see about the place collecting the nectar and the pollen from the flowers. It is the workers and the queen who have stings.

Drones come from unfertilized eggs whilst worker bees are fertilized bees. Worker bees are responsible for many vital tasks both inside and outside the hive: collecting pollen and nectar, feeding and grooming the queen, keeping the hive clean, guarding the hive against predators, making and storing the honey and feeding the drone bees.

The drones only role is to find a queen bee to fertilize. If they do not manage this as the winter comes, the workers kick them out of the hive to die.



A hive during the summer can have 50,000 bees producing 20 to 40 lbs of honey. I harvest between 50 and 100 Kilos of honey per year. It was a fascinating presentation. Julie Haines (photos from Sue Knowles)

## **Tuesday Lunchtime Concerts**

"I don't usually like Modern Music, but .... "

Thirty three people took the risk on a cold and blowy lunchtime to come and hear Graham Waterhouse play three of his own compositions on the cello and the organ.

Graham is an award–winning composer now based in Munich, and it was immediately clear that he is also a very accomplished performer. Several people remarked at the end that they had never heard a cello played like that, and in fact had had no idea such sounds could be produced from it.



The first piece was entitled **Variations**. From a simple melody, Graham proceeded through an astonishing variety of sounds and extraordinary techniques, using the wide range of the instrument to advantage and moving apparently effortlessly between pizzicato, bowed and muted passages with consummate skill. The audience was silent, as if mesmerised.

Graham followed this piece with **Equinox**. He explained that music can be more than just melody or harmony; it can express all sorts of feelings, emotions, ideas and concepts. In this composition he set out to express the vastness, the weightlessness, the grandeur and the mystery of the cosmos, again enthralling the audience with deliberately contrasting and opposing sonorities... high and low, loud and soft, detached and smooth. Thus an expressive tone-picture was evoked and again the silence of the audience and their enthusiastic applause at the end testified to their delight in this new sound world.

Graham then moved to the organ, slipping out of his shoes in order to dance on the pedals in his composition again called **Variations** and this time inspired to some extent by the music of the French composer Marcel Dupre. Most of this piece dates from his pre–university days; astonishing, as it is a wide-ranging work of great complexity and maturity.

Starting with the statement of a Bach-like chorale melody, Graham reached virtuosic heights by weaving contrapuntal textures, exciting rhythms and a full range of organ sounds into a blend of exquisite mastery which left the audience gasping. This was all done from memory; awe-inspiring in itself.

Peter, who has known Graham for almost 50 years, alluded in his Introduction to the wide variation and diverse nature of our Lunchtime Concerts which have now been running for several years, albeit with the Covid interruption.

Do come and give one a try sometime (May's concert is on 21<sup>st</sup> at 1.10pm – a song recital). They are usually held on the third Tuesday of the month, they are completely free, (though with a retiring collection so we can pay the Church and give the performers their train fare) and they last about 45 minutes. Who knows... you too may discover something you have not come across before and might just enjoy! Alison Bullett
