Message from Karl

At the time of writing, we are almost two-thirds of the way through 2023, and for me it feels like the time has flown by! The arrival of September heralds the beginning of a new Methodist year, and so this is a good time to take stock of things as we look ahead to the future. There is no doubt that the need to replace the church's boilers has cast a shadow over the past few months, not least as it looked like the project would cost a vast amount beyond our immediate capacity, so it is a great relief that we appear to be closing in on a far more achievable solution. With the immediate future of the building looking more secure, we can turn our eyes towards more positive matters.

Hopefully many of you have now met Lee Monczakowski, who is the newest member of our staff team. She is here to help us develop our mission and outreach, and in particular to lead us forward in making the most of being at the heart of the High Street and in enhancing the work of Wesley's. Lee is a great asset and brings lots of energy and experience, so please support her both through your prayers and in volunteering where you can. I am very grateful for the myriad ways in which so many of you already contribute to the life of this community, and I hope that we will continue to be joined by new volunteers over the course of this year, allowing us to do more.

Certainly, we find ourselves in a challenging context. It is good that we can offer schemes like the Bags of Hope, the Community Larder and free drinks in Wesley's for those who require them, but the need for such things gives us a glimpse into the hardships of the cost-of-living crisis and the relative poverty that can easily go unnoticed within a predominantly affluent borough such as Kingston. As the nights draw in once again and we need to call upon our new boilers to keep us warm(!), we will again join with other churches in New Malden in offering warm spaces for people in the community. Just being here matters and makes a real difference.

One of my priorities for this Methodist year is beginning to think about succession planning, and how to ensure our work is sustainable in the longer-term as I embark upon the final

third of my time with you, which assuming I do not get asked to move earlier by the President of Conference means three more years here. That may sound like a long time, but my experience of the past couple of years shows how fast things race along, and it is really important that the relationships I have built up do not fall apart when I move onto my next appointment. Hence, you will hear more from me in coming months about consolidating existing projects, and looking towards what you want to take forward as you ponder the gifts and graces you hope for in my eventual successor.

And so, as we step forward into the future with faith, please pray for wisdom, energy and discernment for me and for the church's Leadership Team. These are exciting but challenging days, and we all need God's guidance to know where best to use our energies and gifts. May God help us all to grow and to flourish together, so that more people in New Malden may glimpse God's love in and through the life of our church community. After all, everything we do comes down to that love which Jesus calls us to rejoice in and to share freely.

Request from the Treasurer

I will cease to be Church Treasurer at the end of August and at present there is nobody to take over this role.

There is one part of the job which gives me cause for concern. As you will all be aware, there are no longer any banks in New Malden. We are able to pay in cheques at the Post Office, but cash has to be taken to Kingston to be paid in.

Over the past few weeks we have been raising funds for the new boilers and this has increased the amount of cash which needs to be paid in. If we pay in more than a certain amount in cash in a month, the bank actually charges us a fee!

I know that there are a number of people who make their offertory in cash on a Sunday. Some may well have previously used the envelope system which we stopped using because it had become uneconomical. It would be very helpful if those giving cash would switch to paying by standing order. It would also help the Finance Committee when preparing their budget.

Walk with Blind Ramblers Club

As a member of Kingston Ramblers, I have done many beautiful walks with them in London and in all the home counties. I have also completed a number of trails on my own including the North Downs Way and the London Outer Orbital Path.

But 2-3 times a year our group organise and lead a walk for the London Blind Rambling Club. Earlier this year I was privileged to volunteer to escort a blind man named James. It was a walk of 10 miles from Beckenham to Nunhead and based on sections of the Green Chain Walk. Surprisingly quite tough for London! It started in pouring rain but cleared up after half an hour thankfully. In the park at Crystal Palace we encountered life sized models of different dinosaurs ? - quite a sight if not expecting it!

The man I had responsibility for had only very recently lost his sight. He knew it would happen eventually as it is an inherited condition and other members of his family had succumbed much younger than he. Thanks to his employer arranging various adaptations for him at his work station he is still able to continue working at the moment. I carefully manoeuvred James up and down steps, over tree roots and avoiding overhanging branches - I got clobbered several times but thankfully he didn't!

I asked what he got out of such a walk as he couldn't see. He told me it was to be outside to feel the wind, hear the rustle of leaves on the trees, the smell of flowers and hear birdsong. All the things I would have guessed I suppose.

At the end of the walk all we volunteers were thanked for a lovely day out. It was a very humbling experience. Such bravery and cheerfulness and laughter. Something I doubt I could ever hope to match in their situation. I hope to more of these walks in the future.

Our bothersome boilers!



This month marks the anniversary of one of our boilers failing when called upon to supply our heating for another winter. If a week is a long time in politics, this past year has at times rather seemed to encroach on eternity! However, the good news is that last week Argonaut Heating, who currently maintain our central heating, were commissioned to replace both boilers, line our chimney for a new flue, clean the circulation pipe-work, separate it from the new boilers with heat-exchangers to prevent any contamination and test the timers and circuits which programme heating for our various spaces. This work will be completed in September, with any luck before the onset of cold weather in the Autumn. This will provide welcome

certainty for us and our hirers of a warm building for what we hope will be many years to come.

From 11th September, workmen will be on site based in the Boiler Room and the kitchen (Lounge), using the Minister's parking space for deliveries and the green doors from Cambridge Road for access to the building. Arrangements will be made for this to cause as little disruption as possible, but you may come cross them when at the back of the Church and I know everyone will be as helpful and welcoming as possible as they carry out this vital work for us.

A project of this size inevitably comes at a cost and I am delighted to be able to report that we have already made excellent progress in raising and securing the funds needed. The apt thermometer of progress shows £34k of the £64k total has attracted grant funding from Circuit, District and the Benefact Trust (Methodist Insurance) and we ourselves have already raised nearly £9,000 from a wide variety of events and donations since March. The shortfall is underwritten by our reserves, which leaves us with just over £20,000 to raise over the next year. A number of our prime fund-raising activities have already been ear-marked for this purpose as without heating during some six months of the year our very varied services and activities could not continue. We have estimated our premises are used for some 2,500 person hours each week, I think making the description community hub entirely appropriate.


There are too many people to thank by name who have helped us reach this point, but the support of the Heating Committee and of the Church Council has been pivotal, as have the countless individuals who have got stuck in for

coffee mornings and many other initiatives to ensure we are in the strong position we now find ourselves. I have every confidence we will raise the shortfall in short order!

Music Marathon: The Big Push

Exactly 3 years ago, on the August Bank Holiday weekend in the Middle of Lockdown, we flung open our front windows and gave a 'distanced' concert from inside, relayed to friends



and neighbours who kindly came and listened in their deckchairs in our hastily—tidied front garden. Several performers and many different instruments were involved, and the audience gave generously to a charity benefiting musicians who were suffering financially from the complete lack of performance opportunities during Covid.

This year we are no longer restricted, thank goodness, and we are putting on a rather more ambitious and elaborate event, styled as a Music Marathon. The tenuous reference comes from the fact that it goes on a long time, takes a lot of effort and involves approximately 26 musicians, each of whom will perform for 15 mins in the Church. The idea is that people will drop in and out through the afternoon – although of course we would be delighted if you stayed for the duration – to enjoy music of all styles and genres in a relaxed and informal environment.

You will not be surprised to learn that this time the worthy cause is the replacement of our boilers! Sterling (!) efforts have been made for several months to this end, and you will see above the 'thermometer of progress' towards our target of £66k, (also displayed in Wesley's). With grants, coffee mornings, gin evenings, quizzes and generous donations, we have made very significant progress toward this target, which already seems more manageable than it did even a few weeks ago.

The Music Marathon is one of the biggest Fund Raisers we shall be organising as a Church and as a community. Community is after all at the heart of our Mission on the High Street, and the replacement of our boilers is of course not just so that 45 people can be cosy on a Sunday morning, but so that all our many functions can continue to happen in comfort for many years to come, serving as many people as we can possibly reach out to in our various activities and events.

We do need your support, so please come along if you can possibly do so. There will be food and drink available throughout the 5 hours and the music is varied, with something for all tastes. Most instruments are represented (though, sadly, at the time of writing we do not have a guitar, recorder, double bass, trombone or sax) and the performers range in age from 13 to several times that. The Grand Finale will be provided by 'our' Ukrainian singers Dasha and Oleksii who promise to get us all singing in some surprise items.

There will be opportunities to donate or sponsor particular items on the day – including a special Debut appearance by Karl. If you cannot attend, please send a friend instead, and consider making a donation so that the total justly reflects the efforts and generosity of all our talented friends. We are aiming to make £1000 and I am very confident we can get there with a bit of help from everyone. Let the music flow, and let's all ride this wave of Excitement and Optimism!

My thanks to all the people 'behind the scenes' too - the cooks, administrators, servers and general dogsbodies, without whom this idea would have died where it began; in my head.

Plans are almost complete for next season, with the first concert – a recital by Julian Hellaby (piano) – scheduled for Sunday 8th October at 3pm.



A couple of quirky religious elements to our holiday.




This had all sorts going on as it was Summer Saturday and Park Av was closed to traffic. But we got the impression it was a very happening church with a nice terrace for coffee after the services.

The Glory of the Garden by Rudyard Kipling

Our England is a garden that is full of stately views, Of borders, beds and shrubberies and lawns and avenues, With statues on the terraces and peacocks strutting by; But the Glory of the Garden lies in more than meets the eye.

And some can pot begonias and some can bud a rose, And some are hardly fit to trust with anything that grows; But they can roll and trim the lawns and sift the sand and loam, For the Glory of the Garden occupieth all who come.


Our England is a garden, and such gardens are not made By singing:-'Oh, how beautiful,' and sitting in the shade While better men than we go out and start their working lives At grubbing weeds from gravel-paths with broken dinner-knives.

There's not a pair of legs so thin, there's not a head so thick, There's not a hand so weak and white, nor yet a heart so sick But it can find some needful job that's crying to be done, For the Glory of the Garden glorifieth every one.

Then seek your job with thankfulness and work till further orders, If it's only netting strawberries or killing slugs on borders; And when your back stops aching and your hands begin to harden, You will find yourself a partner in the Glory of the Garden.

Oh, Adam was a gardener, and God who made him sees
That half a proper gardener's work is done upon his knees,
So when your work is finished, you can wash your hands and pray
For the Glory of the Garden that it may not pass away!
And the Glory of the Garden it shall never pass away!

Rudyard Kipling (1865-1936) was a writer who could entertain children and adults alike with such books as *The Jungle Book, Plain Tales from the Hills, The Just So Stories, Puck of Pook's Hill,* and countless others. He was also a hugely popular poet and won the Nobel Prize for literature in 1907. His now dated colonial stance and political views have led to a drop in his popularity in modern times, but the well -known poem **IF** was voted the UK's favourite of all time in a poll in 1995, and several phrases have passed into our national heritage... One is 'Lest we forget' from his poem **Recessional**, and the one that springs to my mind, from The Elephant's Child, is the wonderfully alliterative 'Great grey green greasy Limpopo river (all set about with fever trees)'.



So let's not cancel him completely.

If

If you can keep your head when all about you, Are losing theirs and blaming it on you, If you can trust yourself when all men doubt you, But make allowance for their doubting too ...

This poem was first published in Kipling's volume of short stories and poems, *Rewards and Fairies*, in 1910. Stoicism looms large in Kipling's poem – that is, the acknowledgment that, whilst you cannot always prevent bad things from happening to you, you *can* try and deal with them in a good way.

The Female of the Species

When the Himalayan peasant meets the he-bear in his pride, He shouts to scare the monster, who will often turn aside. But the she-bear thus accosted rends the peasant tooth and nail. For the female of the species is more deadly than the male ...

This 1911 poem's last line is often quoted. Focusing, as we might expect from a Kipling poem, on animals as well as humans – the Himalayan bear and the cobra are both mentioned – Kipling concludes that women are deadlier than men in many cases. Misogynistic fear, or feminist affirmation of women's power?

Additional Interesting Facts about Kipling


1. He used the word Grinch long before Dr Seuss and also introduced the word 'cushy' into the English language. Born in Bombay in 1865, Kipling spent much of his childhood in India, and knowledge of Indian culture and the country's various languages can be found in his work. The earliest known use of 'cushy' in a work written in English appears — as *khushi*—in a piece published by a young Kipling in 1887. He used it to mean 'relaxed', but it later

came to mean 'comfortable and undemanding'. In original Urdu, the word means 'pleasant' or 'good'. 'Squidgy' also makes its debut in Kipling's work, in 1891, as does 'stinky' (from *Plain Tales of the Hills*, 1888).

- 2. His first name wasn't Rudyard; it was Joseph. His middle name, Rudyard literally, 'red yard' was taken from Rudyard Lake in Staffordshire, and was the name by which he was known and under which he chose to be published from the 1880s when his first volume of short stories appeared (while Kipling was still only in his early twenties).
- 3. He used the idea of the 'daemon' over half a century before Philip Pullman. Kipling claimed that a 'Daemon' helped him to write The Jungle Book, which is probably his most famous work. In his final book, the autobiography <u>Something of Myself</u>, he wrote: 'When your Daemon is in charge, do not try to think consciously. Drift, wait, and obey.' This 'Daemon' is a part of the author's personality which seems to take over and 'dictate' the story to the writer. (collated by Alison Bullett, with acknowledgment to Dr Oliver Tearle)


