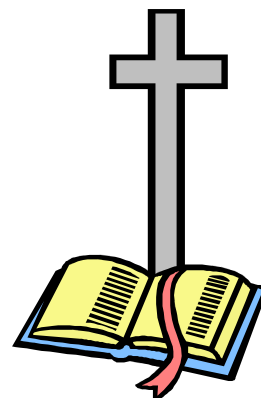

Superintendent's Letter

"How are we ever going to find the right people to do all the jobs at the church?"

It's a question often asked amongst the members of a congregation, often accompanied by looks of either panic or despair! In many churches, the next comment is something to the effect of *"all our people are getting older now and the young ones are all working"* or *"well it would be very hard to replace So-and-so because s/he's been doing it for 23 years and no one else will take it on!"* Early on in my ministry in the British Methodist Church, I heard such complaints – along with an expectation that the Minister (me!) and the Stewards would be the ones to find such mystery persons to carry out all the work of the church... And I, especially being the *new* Minister, didn't really know the congregation well enough to know who could fill which roles... and it was very easy to see that the Stewards already had enough to do, and in fact, it was hard to find people to be Stewards because the role was too large!

At that point I dug deep in my well of prior experience of working with other church and para-church organisations to propose the concept of the Nominations Committee, known affectionately as the "Nom Com". Since then I've proposed Nom Coms at several British Methodist Churches, and, invariably, the plan has worked. It follows a basic precept that I heard long ago: **God has already planted in each congregation the people needed to fulfill all the roles in that congregation. Our job is to identify those people and provide the encouragement and tools they need to fulfill those roles.** And that is the basic premise of the Nominations Committee.

Back in October, the Church Council approved the formation of a Nominations Committee for New Malden Methodist Church. I then set about, with the help of the Leadership Team, to identify people to form that Nom Com for the current year. Those who accepted the invitation were Judith Jewell, Greta Curry, and David Knowles, with Donald Finnan providing pastoral input and leadership. A few Saturdays ago, this group met at Chessington Methodist Church, along with the Nom Coms from Surbiton Hill, Kingston, and Chessington, to begin work. At that meeting, we went through the general principles and schedule of how we would carry out the work that would hopefully see the task completed in time for each church's Annual Church Meeting in the late spring. Some of the churches in our circuit have had Nom Coms for a few years now. I enjoyed watching the interaction and cooperation between the various groups, each recognising its own set of challenges and looking to the others for tips on how to succeed!

Superintendent's Letter

Basically, the Nominations Committees will be meeting over the next 3-4 months to review *all* the roles and jobs that are being done – or need to be done – in their own church. They will also be reviewing the lists of members and adherents to determine who-is-already-doing-what. Their most important task will be to ensure that all the roles on Church Council are filled. Church Council positions are only elected/appointed for one year at a time, so everyone on Church Council will need to be asked (by someone on the Nom Com) if they are willing to continue for another year. It is also a Methodist “rule” that no-one should remain in a particular Church Council position for more than six years (except the Minister and lay workers). If someone has completed six years in a Church Council position, the Nom Com will be looking for a replacement for that person in that role.

One of the benefits of the Nom Com is that they can have a “bird’s eye view” of the church membership. They can identify those who need a new or different job to do as well as those who are perhaps doing more than they can or should be doing. They can look at committees and groups strategically to see how they are fitting in with the overall mission of the church and, in some cases, identify positions that need to be added or deleted in the present context. They can have confidential conversations with a wide variety of people about where their talents might best be used in the life of the church or suggest new possibilities of how God might be using their gifts.

The end results of the Nom Com’s deliberations will come first to the Church Council and then to the Annual Church Meeting (as some positions in the life of a local Methodist Church are appointed by Church Council and some are elected by the Annual Church Meeting). When the Nom Com brings its “slate” (an American word which refers to a suggested list of persons), we can be assured that it has sought out the best persons for each job, and that each suggested person has been given careful consideration to whether s/he is willing and able to fulfill that role. It is still the ultimate responsibility of either the Church Council or the Annual Church Meeting (as appropriate) to appoint/elect its officers, but in this system the hard work of identifying and receiving consent will already have been done in a careful and thoughtful – and prayerful! – way.

I am looking forward to working with New Malden’s new Nominations Committee over the next few months. I hope each of *you* will also be a willing participant in the process when someone comes to speak to you! If there is a position you would like to take on (or give up), please feel free to speak to one of those on the

Nom Com or to me. When you are approached, I urge you to take the request seriously – it is entirely appropriate for you to say, “No, this is not right for me now” if that is the case – but it’s also wonderful if you can say, “I’ll give it a try!” Altogether, we can realise the plans God has for us in this time and in this place!

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NMMC Church Council Meeting – 11th January 2012

Summary of main discussion points

The meeting was chaired by Rev Bonni-Belle Pickard (BBP) with 25 members of the CC, plus 1 observer. Rev Donald Finnan attended by invitation.

Tony Chalk was pleased to report that as a result of contributions received from members and friends, the church expenditure for the purchase of “**Singing the Faith**” had been £100. It was agreed that there would be a Dedication Service for the new hymn books, led by BBP, on 12th February.

Clive Edwards has volunteered to take over from Sarah Moore as the NMMC representative for **Action for Children**.

BBP confirmed that the **NMMC Nominations Committee** has been set up and the first meeting already arranged for January. The Committee would be tasked with ensuring that key officers and CC members were happy to remain in post and to look for replacements where necessary.

Doreen Downey (Pastoral Committee) reported that NMMC membership totalled 119 in October 2011, a decrease of 2 since March 2011. The Committee had considered ways of ensuring that newcomers felt welcome at NMMC and it had been suggested that offering free tea and coffee (on a trial basis) might encourage visitors to stay and meet members. BBP suggested that using a “donation bowl” might be an option. The wearing of name badges by church officers on Sundays was considered to be helpful to newcomers. The Committee had talked about how we might encourage adherents to become members of NMMC and BBP mentioned that she was hoping to run some Membership Classes after Easter. Doreen said that more pastoral visitors were being sought to supplement the existing team and 4 more “Getting to know you” lunches are planned for 2012. The next Pastoral Committee meeting will be on 28th March at 7.30pm.

Julia Morton (Service Committee) reported that the Christmas Fair had been a great success and it was agreed that it would be held on a Friday evening in future. The next Service Committee meeting will take place before Malden Fortnight, and this will be a useful forum for looking at fundraising ideas for the Sanctuary refurbishment.

Irene Chalk (Property Committee) updated members on the estimates she had received for the redecorating and re-carpeting of the Sanctuary. The total cost will be around £23,000 and after a short discussion, her proposal to go ahead with the work in July/August 2012 was voted on and carried. Tony Chalk will prepare a letter to members and friends requesting contributions and fundraising

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ideas will be considered. Later in the meeting, Irene was warmly thanked for her work in organising the refurbishment of the toilets in the welcome area.

BBP (Worship Consultation) sought views from members about our Easter services. It was agreed that NMMC will host a Circuit Service on Ash Wednesday. Kingston Church has extended an invitation to attend a “Seder” supper on Maundy Thursday and on Easter Sunday NMMC will have Communion Services at 8.00am and 10.30am, together with a breakfast, but no evening service.

Julia Morton (Youth Work) said that NMMC would again be sending young people to Fort Rocky and Greenbelt in 2012. She thanked those who had sponsored Greenbelt places last year and mentioned that there would be a further appeal and fundraising to help cover the costs for this year.

Des Hancock (Mission Outreach) confirmed that the KCAH night shelter would start on January 19th and continue for the next 6 Thursdays. Contributions towards the cost had been received through donations; including the proceeds from a recent coffee morning and a collection would also be made on Sunday, 15th January. He asked for help with the supply of pillows and also with the provision of breakfast and cleaning on Friday mornings. BBP gave members some information on the Joel Community Project which is seeking to provide a permanent shelter at St Peter's Church, Norbiton. They have asked people who have been involved in the night shelters to help them, if they feel able to, by writing to Kingston Council to support their work. BBP suggested that anyone who wanted to help with this should contact her for more information.

Tony Chalk (Financial Report) reported that most figures for income are up on the previous year and expenditure is down (partly because of the cost of replacing the windows the previous year). We have more surplus now than we had deficit last year and consequently are in a stronger financial position.

BBP (Circuit/District matters) introduced a Deferred Special Resolution to members before it was voted on and approved. The DSR has been sent to churches, circuits and districts with the aim of bringing in an amendment to the Deed of Union in order to clarify that the term “minister” in official documents includes presbyters and deacons. Having consulted throughout the church, a decision will be made at Conference.

NMMC had not been able to find anyone to attend the **MEDAL 2012** conference but delegates from other churches in the circuit would be going. (There is still space if someone would like to come forward.)

BBP informed members about “**More Than Gold**”, an ecumenical group set up to encourage and organise church involvement in the Olympic Games. For

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example, hosts are being sought to help with accommodation for family members of athletes who cannot afford hotels.

BBP invited discussion on a request by **Korean Christian Fellowship** to hold quarterly, Sunday afternoon, worship services at NMMC. It was noted that Rev Alex Jun and Rev Sang-Don Han (Paul) are on our circuit preaching plan; accountable to the circuit through BBP. KCF has been holding regular services and meetings at Chessington church and now wishes to broaden its worship to include NMMC. It was stressed that KCF is not a church and that those attending are already members of other churches; for example, many of those attending KCF worship at Chessington have also been members of the congregation at the morning service there. Several possible ways of encouraging integration were suggested; such as NMMC members attending the KCF quarterly worship and KCF contributing to our morning service. It was agreed that the CC would approve the KCF request and that this action would be reviewed in one year's time. The possibility of KCF making a contribution towards the use of the premises would be raised with them.

It was announced that there would be a **Spring Fundraising Supper** on March 17th. All members and friends are invited and the children will be preparing and serving the meal. The proceeds will go towards the refurbishment of the Sanctuary. A **pantomime** has also been arranged for May 5th.

It was agreed that NMMC would purchase some **new advertising posters** for the outside of the church.

The next meeting will be held on **Monday, 12th March at 8.00pm.**

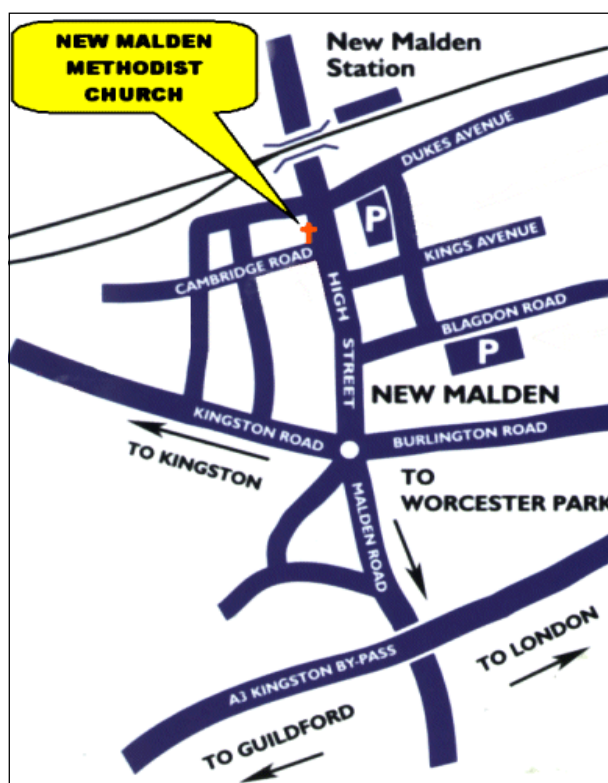
