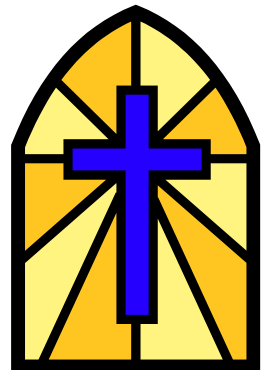

Dear friends,

It was a great privilege to take a sabbatical for three months, which not many people can enjoy. Of course, it's not a holiday but a time for reflection, refreshing, recharging, and relaxing as well. As Christians, it sounds biblically correct. But, I wonder whether Jesus had ever taken a sabbatical during his public ministry. In my understanding he didn't. (Some of you may argue that he had just finished his public ministry in three years! Therefore, he was not entitled for a sabbatical which comes every seven years!). My question is, if it is something we should keep, why is it not applied to everyone, whether lay or ordained, volunteers or paid workers? I was feeling it was a bit unfair and even guilty that only ministers take this opportunity.

However, I had a great time during my sabbatical, half of which I spent in Korea, visiting family members, meeting friends, and of course spending precious time with our son, and also hosting our daughter's engagement party, which was not initially included in my sabbatical plan. It was such a busy schedule, and I found it not easy to handle all those occasions even though I didn't have any language problems, unlike here in England. What made things difficult for me was following 'the technology' which is far advanced in every corner of daily life. Particularly 'smart phones' seemed to be an essential part of life, not only for communicating, but also for buying, paying, banking, and even ID checking. I was feeling awkwardly alienated in my home land, as if I came from the world of a few decades past.

Although I was struggling to catch up with the modern hi-technology, I enjoyed and appreciated a lot the opportunity of doing my research project about North Korea, which actually gave me an amazing eye-opening experience. Even though it was just brief, not deep academic research, I was getting to realise the seriousness of division, the seriousness of the biased education and distorted history, and the serious influence of unbalanced mass media, and the consequences of these. I was almost shocked to become aware of how limited and controlled the information

and education I have had all through my life was, which has prevented me from the actual facts.

But, don't get me wrong. I don't mean that all the information we have is wrong, but that is not all. There must be another story on the other side. What saddened me was that I have been half-blinded. My left eye was always closed.

But, what matters may not be that I am now trying to see with two eyes, but that I need to learn how to see as God sees and how to find the way forward to make reconciliation as He wants us to do. This seems to be my next task.

And, I really, really give thanks to you all for praying for us and covering all the work during my absence.

War tears lives apart

Love can help piece them back together

‘The Lord is my rock, my fortress, and my deliverer... in whom I take refuge.’ (2 Samuel 22:2-3)

For a growing number of people across the world, the horror of war is a part of daily life.

Right now, fuelled by the devastating violence in both Syria and the Democratic Republic of the Congo, the numbers of people driven from their homes by war is on the rise.

It stands at 42 million people – an appalling statistic and a stain on the conscience of humanity. We can't turn our backs. We must act now.

The good news is that your church can make a real difference.

Last year, a magnificent 20,000 churches across the country helped raise over £12m for Christian Aid Week.

This Christian Aid Week (11–17 May 2014) we want to go even further. We want every church in Britain and Ireland to get involved – whether by giving, acting or praying.

FOOD FOR THOUGHT

People are going hungry as a result of cuts in welfare for the most vulnerable in our society by the Coalition. The pressure on Food Banks is enormous.

The campaign against those receiving benefits by the Coalition has been so successful that many people support it. Most people on benefits are in employment which simply does not pay enough.

Housing benefit cuts for the under 25's within 7 years will result in 150,000 young people unable to rent according to a survey by the charity Centrepont and Cambridge University. I despair at the lack of concern for the disadvantaged under the present system of wealth distribution.

As Methodists, we are called to speak up and campaign on behalf of the vulnerable in our society and I hope that we will.

Readers may be interested in looking at The Methodist Church website (www.methodist.org.uk) to find out more about action being taken by several churches, including the Methodist Church, to challenge recent Government changes. For example:

19 February 2014 - Four major British Churches have criticised David Cameron for neither understanding his Government's own figures nor recognising the reality of more and more people facing destitution.

The Church of Scotland, Baptist Union of Great Britain, Methodist Church, United Reformed Church and charity Housing Justice, which collectively represent more than a million people, have responded to an article by the Prime Minister in [today's Daily Telegraph](#). In the piece, Mr Cameron claims that the number of workless households doubled over the last decade, when ONS data shows that they increased from 3.7 million in 1997 to 3.9 million in 2010, not 7.4 million as his claim would suggest.

27 February 2014 - Three major British Churches have attacked the Government's Child Poverty Strategy, saying that it fails to provide a credible plan to tackle child poverty.

The Baptist Union of Great Britain, Methodist and United Reformed Churches welcome the Government's pledge to eradicate child poverty by 2020, but argue that the strategy fails to provide a credible plan to achieve this aim.

You may also remember articles in Ubuntu in April and June 2013 which gave details of a Church Report entitled "Truths and Lies about Poverty" (March 2013). The report used some words of John Wesley who said in 1753,

"So wickedly, devilishly false is that common objection, 'They are poor, only because they are idle'." Yet today church-goers and the general public alike are willing to believe that the key factors driving poverty in the UK are the personal failings of the poor – especially idleness'.

In addition to this campaigning by the Church as a whole, we can all do what we can as individuals to support the vulnerable. The Night Shelter project has been a wonderful example of this.

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CHRIST AROSE

The story behind the hymn

This Easter marks the 140th birthday of this much-loved hymn, sung each year by millions of Christians worldwide. It all began on a little pump organ in the living room of a college professor in Pennsylvania, back in 1874.

Robert Lowry was professor of literature at Bucknell University, and pastor of a nearby church. He had a passion for poetry and music, and explained his 'muse' this way: "I watch my moods and when anything strikes me, whether words or music, no matter where I am, at home, on the street, I jot it down. My brain is a sort of spinning machine, for there is music running

through it all the time. Sometimes the words come and the music follows.”

Easter 1874 was approaching, and on this particular day, Robert Lowry had been meditating on the gospel narratives of the Passion and Resurrection. The angel’s words at the empty tomb, ‘He is not here, but is risen’ kept running through his mind. There was something there... Lowry moved to the little pump organ in his living room and gave himself up to the moment. Soon the words and the music for this joyous Easter hymn just fell into place.

Christ Arose

Low in the grave He lay
Jesus my Saviour!
Waiting the coming day,
Jesus my Lord!

*Up from the grave He arose,
With a mighty triumph o’er His foes;
He arose a Victor from the dark domain,
And He lives forever with His saints to reign,
He arose! He arose!
Hallelujah! Christ arose!*

Vainly they watch His bed,
Jesus my Saviour!
Vainly they seal the dead,
Jesus my Lord!

Death cannot keep his prey,
Jesus my Saviour!
He tore the bars away,
Jesus my Lord!

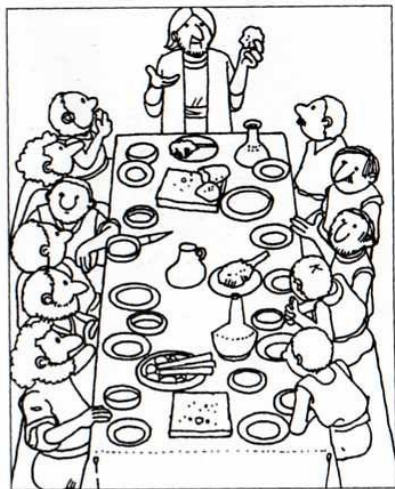
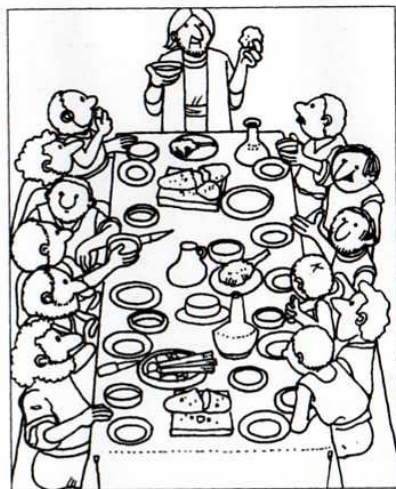
God cares for each of us so much that he shared his son with us. What a wonderful way of sharing his love. Would give God your last sweet? He would.

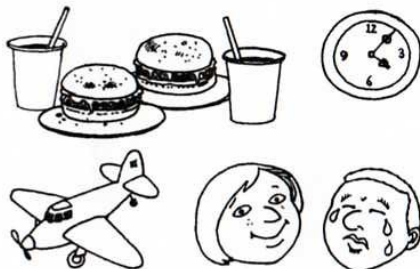

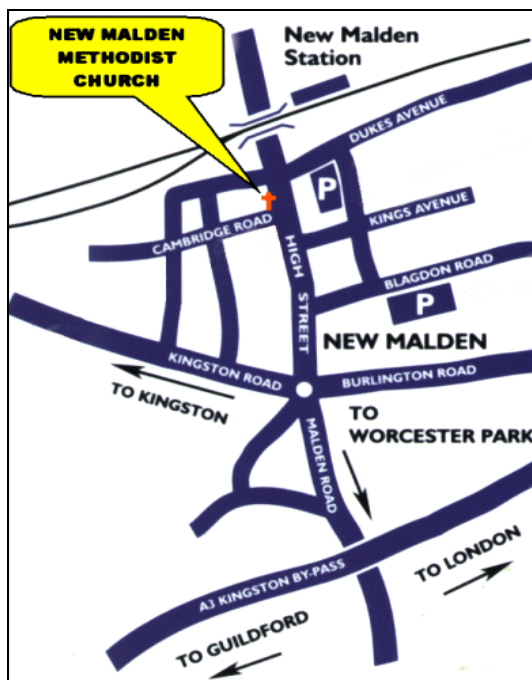
