A REPORT ON THE ANNUAL CHURCH MEETING

The annual church meeting was held on Sunday 18th May with 36 present. Choi introduced the meeting by thanking Sarah Moore for putting together the annual report and for all who had contributed to the work of the church. He said that it had been an interesting year. His 3 months on sabbatical had felt like a year but he was pleased to see that everyone had continued the hard work for the church in his absence.

We all discussed the life of the church and some interesting ideas were put forward. It was agreed that the church was very welcoming and caring and we should all be proud of keeping the coffee bar open 7 days a week. We do Christmas well with the trees and the sheep trail being much appreciated in the wider community. Suggestions for improving church life ranged from the spiritual (finding opportunities for more to come together to study the bible) to the social (have 2 or 3 lunches a year at which we bring along guests). It was agreed that we really need to find ways to make

younger adults feel part of the church life. It was particularly pleasing to hear that those who took part in the pantomime wanted to continue to meet regularly.

After the discussion we moved on to the business including electing two new stewards: Jane Bennett and Julie Haines. The representatives to the council for the next year were agreed as Sue Abell, Nicola Horton, Alan Vincent, Peter Bullett, Greta Curry, Judith Jewell, Carol Dadds, Rosemarie Lester, David Knowles, Alan Downey, Doreen Downey, Brigit Cowan and Mary Brown. Room bookings would be incorporated into the role of the administrator. Rebecca Bland will be the new safeguarding officer and Caroline Auty the new editor for Ubuntu.

The church is still seeking a new property steward to be elected at the church council meeting in June.

Liz Edwards thanked all those who were finishing their roles: Pam Wardley as safeguarding officer, Julia Morton as circuit steward, Rosemarie as Ubuntu editor, Irene as property steward. There was an especial thanks to Julie Haines for her role in the junior church where she had seen a whole generation of children pass through. She was thanked for her patience and care to both the children and all the adults who have helped alongside her.

There was some discussion about money matters. Monthly direct giving is down by about £300 and we really need to address this decline soon.

There were suggestions of a gift day and to appeal directly to those who had not increased their giving for many years. Irene Chalk had enquired about a new cleaning contract which would include maintenance of the cleaner but this would be a lot more expensive. Given the fact that giving is going down it was not thought prudent to spend more on cleaning. Rather we may look at ways to share out responsibility for the management so that individuals can feel responsible for ensuring their part of the church building is cleaned. We were also reminded that the cleaner cannot clean where clutter is left out and to tidy up after ourselves.

Also on the subject of money it was agreed that for one year only the money raised through the coffee bar would go towards renovating the

welcome area. We should be able to replace the chairs and carpets, although the church will have to subsidise this as the amount raised will not meet the full costs.

The next annual church meeting will be on the 17th May 2015.

“The Reason for God” – Belief in an age of Scepticism.

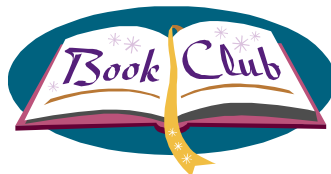
Timothy Keller

Aptly winning a place in the New York Times top ten best sellers, this is a book with a rating of 5/5 for believers and sceptics alike. It opens up the reasons for what people believe or think about God, in an engaging, intelligent and understandable conversation often leading to the heart of the matter, stimulating both faith and rationality. You get to know what the other person is thinking and what you are thinking too! Dr Keller deals with many modern issues perplexing people, arranging it so that you can dig into the sections most relevant to your immediate needs at any moment, ranging from “How could a Good God send people to hell?”, “Christianity isn’t Culturally Rigid”, “The problem of Sin”, “Defending Human Rights”, and many more. A credible, sophisticated and intelligent book, it is a delight to read. Anyone leading or in a discussion group would find this book eye-opening and stimulating.

CHALLENGES IN CARING FOR THE VULNERABLE

All Christian denominations strive to reach out to the marginalized and vulnerable with varying degrees of success. Go to any church or chapel today and you will see evidence of support for food banks and/or a night shelter project.

However, there are other vulnerable groups needing help who are perhaps harder to reach in quite the same way. I am thinking, for example, of mentally ill teenagers and their parents who struggle to understand and support their sons and daughters. Other groups might include those with physical disability or young people with autism - the list could go on.

For some teenagers the greatest challenge is how to tell their parents that they are gay. Some parents are supportive, others bewildered and some are hostile. In extreme cases teenagers leave home and become homeless. It is here that charities such as Centrepont provide accommodation and support.

The challenge for the church is how to fulfil its calling to provide care and universal love. We sing with gusto the hymn "Let us build a house where love can dwell" (*Singing the Faith* 409) in which the last line of each verse is, "All are welcome". I have never sung a hymn more challenging!

With reference to this article, you may be interested in a new ecumenical initiative called: Exploring the Family Ministry Landscape: Major UK Research Project.

This major research project will reveal the scope of families work in the majority of UK Churches. Exploring the Family Ministry Landscape is thought to be the first project of its kind in the UK and will look at what churches are doing to support families, as well as the range of training and resources that are already available for families work.

"Families come in all shapes and sizes, and society's understanding of what 'family' means has changed over the years," said Gail Adcock, Families Ministries Development Officer (Methodist Church), who is taking a lead on the research. "Whatever a family looks like, the Church should care about and seek to support that family in life and in faith. We hope that this project will help us to see how that is already happening and learn how we can do it better."

"Family matters," added the Rt Revd Paul Butler, Bishop of Durham, "whether it's a single parent family, blended families, immigrant families or everything in between. The Church has a duty to support people in their relationships and in the challenges they face. We haven't got it all figured out just yet - and I hope this project will help us learn and grow as a community of faith for whom family matters."

Exploring the Family Ministry Landscape is a partnership between the Methodist Church in Britain and the Consultative Group on Ministry Among Children (CGMC). CGMC is a network of CTBI and brings together all those with national responsibility for work with children in churches and Christian charities for the major Christian Churches in the UK, including the Church of England, Methodist Church, the United Reformed Church and the Baptist Union of Great Britain. The research project is due to report in Autumn 2015. Gail is also conducting more in-depth research into families work within the British Methodist Church, which will report this Autumn.

"CGMC seeks to inspire people to act as advocates and change makers in children's and family ministry for all of our churches and organisations," said CGMC's Moderator, Penny Fuller. "This project is an ecumenical collaboration that seeks to challenge and support those who equip and resource the development of ministry with families." Find out more at: www.methodist.org.uk

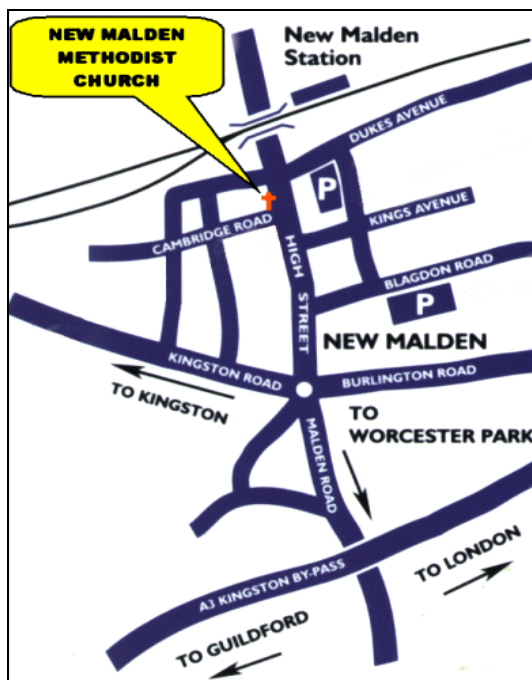
