Message from Rev Choi

Dear friends,

Last month (in October), I paid a short visit to Stuttgart in Germany with Sarah, to meet a missionary who works at EMS (Evangelical Mission in Solidarity) as an Asian region Co-ordinator. He is an expert on mission in Korea, South and North. The reason for my visit was to get some advice for my Sabbatical project, in which I am going to research the current situation of Christians and churches in North Korea.

To me, it was a meeting, not only useful for my research, but also a kind of eye-opening moment which enables me to think and see differently. And, what's interesting was that, to my surprise, we had a meeting, using Korean, although he was a German! I have never thought I would talk with a German in Korean, even in Germany. I was so much impressed by his fluent Korean, which he learned while he was working in Korea as a missionary for 8 years.

But, what amazed me was that we could talk and share our thoughts and vision freely with open hearts, without any barriers, though it was our first encounter. I could feel clearly the presence of God in our meeting and brotherly love as the family of God. It was such a blessing that I felt the sense of belonging to God's family.

As we know, there are only two ways to get into a family: either being born into it, or being adopted into it. But, the great thing is that God does both, to make us His family. As His children, we are the ones to be born again and adopted. And, in Roman law, it is said that you could disown a child you birthed. But, if you adopted a child, you were forbidden to ever disown that child. What it means, therefore, is that, born and adopted into His family, we would never be disowned by God. That is good news! But, the challenge to us is that we have to live our lives as members of God's family, the Church, loving each other and accepting each other as brothers and sisters in Christ.

We know that Christianity is a belief system. But, it is actually more than that. It is a belonging system.

Romans 15: 6-7 says,

"You will all be joined together, and you will give glory to God the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ. Christ accepted you, so you should accept each other, which will bring glory to God." Every blessing,

I am pleased to report that the Prayer Web is up and running. There are now 15 people praying for others; 11 have Internet and 4 receive prayer requests by telephone. Twelve prayer messages have been sent out so far, two of these were thanks for the support of our prayers.

There may be more people willing to join and maybe some people who did not read the article published in the June edition of Ubuntu. Therefore to encourage you I repeat the content of that article below:

Purpose

The purpose of the Prayer Web is to enable us, the Church Family, to offer prayers for anyone who is ill or bereaved or facing difficulties or in need of support as quickly as possible.

Who will pray when and where?

Anyone who is willing to participate in this ministry of prayer will be able to pray in their own time at home or work. It takes only a few moments to send an 'arrow prayer'.

How will this be organised?

Requests for prayer will be sent to Jenny Reid, the Pastoral Secretary, who will forward these to members of the prayer web by email; we will need some of these members to volunteer to pass messages on by telephone to one or two others, who do not have email.

Guidelines

When sending a request for prayer, please observe the following guidelines in order to protect confidentiality and to show respect for the person or family concerned.

1. If the request is for someone known within the church please make sure they have no objection to being prayed for in this way. It would also be helpful if you would indicate if the person(s) concerned would like this request to be passed on to the Saturday Prayer group.

2. If the request is about a person not known within the church and it is not easy to obtain their permission please use your discretion in wording the request so as to protect their identity. For example:

a) my friend Mary who is having an operation on Thursday.

b) my cousin who has been diagnosed with cancer.

Around the Circuit ... Nov/Dec 2013 - news from your Circuit Coordinator

We held our first circuit meeting of the church year recently. It was good to see familiar faces but good that new members were joining us. Liz Moore a Chessington member of long standing is the latest Circuit Steward to come on board. We dealt with business side of things and this included a change to our constitution following a new ruling from Conference which stipulates that Ministers residing in the circuit who are not in pastoral charge will have to annually indicate their wish to be a member of the circuit meeting. Several of our ministers have chosen to do so. An entertaining part of the meeting is when a steward from each of the churches shares news of events past and future.

Some of you may wonder why we have a circuit. This topic was brought to the meeting by our Superintendent Bonni-Belle. We were asked:

- "What is important to you about being part of a circuit?" Responses included: fellowship, support, sharing experiences, ideas and inspiration, "unity of purpose with diversity of expression" of our theology, encouragement and accountability.
- * "How does being a part of a circuit affect your local church?" Response to this included sharing financial resources – where the financial liabilities of the circuit/district/connexion are divided according to the affordability of each of the four churches. This Christian sharing is greatly appreciated by the "poorer" churches but comes at significant financial cost to the churches with greater means. Our services are enriched by the number of preachers available across the circuit. When a crisis affects one church, help from the others quickly follows.
- * "In what ways might the "connexion" between your church and the circuit be improved?" Several ideas were put forward: worshipping in another church in the circuit, rotating Sunday evening services around the circuit, providing a greater transparency of finances within the circuit, raising our congregations' awareness of the other churches, praying for one particular church in the circuit each Sunday.
- * Finally we were asked to go away and think about what the essential elements for "projects" that "belong" to the circuit using as examples the 3six5 fresh expression and the Korean

Christian Fellowship.

Our meetings are open to all and you are welcome to come along. The next one is at 8pm on 28th January at New Malden.
