



Message from Rev Choi

"Remember this, whoever sows sparingly will also reap sparingly. And whoever sows generously will also reap generously". 2 Corinthians 9:6.

Dear friends,

This is the very basic principle of 'sowing and reaping', which we all understand. No farmer will get any crop, unless he goes out to sow the seed (give it away). And, the greater thing in this is that once it is sowed, it reproduces and multiplies a hundredfold. That is a divine logic, the grace, which we don't understand. But, we may need to see that it is also true with money, and everything in our lives. Obviously, it doesn't seem to be sensible that when we have a need, we need to give. But, that may be the reason why it needs faith, the farmer's faith that the seed will multiply.

This year, for the first time in my life, we planted some vegetables at the back of our garden, such as tomatoes, potatoes, strawberries, courgettes, chards, chives, carrots,... Perhaps we were too ambitious, or too ignorant. During summer, we did put our efforts to grow them as much as we could, although we didn't know much about how to grow vegetables. Nevertheless, I realised again that God was faithful, and we were given 'a great harvest', much bigger than I expected. It was a great joy and fun, though sometimes I was feeling tired and pointless in doing it. To me this year was just a trial year, and I have learned a lot, of which the most precious one is that unless you sow or plant, you will never know the great joy of harvesting.

This harvest, gladly we have seen many generous and cheerful givers in various ways: donations, and giving their time and energy in all the preparations of the Harvest Service. I believe that your sowing (giving away) will be multiplied enormously and be given back to you with all the blessings as well as immeasurable joy.

REMEMBERING DAVID WILLIS

David's Life Story by his Daughter Hilary

David Lindsay Willis was born on 2nd February 1930 and lived at 13, Castleview Gardens in Ilford, Essex, to parents Marjorie and Stan and a younger brother to Jean. He was given a girl's name for his middle name not because there was any confusion, but after the surgeon Mr Lindsay who operated on Jean's feet soon after she was born. David grew up in Ilford attending the Methodist Church there and went to Highlands School for both his infant and junior education. He enjoyed dancing round the maypole, excelled at the 3 legged race and even developed a special winning technique for the sack race which he has passed on to his grandchildren!

After the outbreak of war in 1939, David aged 9 was evacuated with Jean first to Ipswich and then to South Wales where they ended up in the valleys living in Aberdare for 2 years. While in Wales he developed a taste for custard tarts which were his chosen weekly treat paid for by his Mum, and he sat and passed the scholarship exam for Ilford County High School for Boys which had also been evacuated there. Returning to Ilford and his own family at Easter 1942 aged 12 David continued at this school now in Barkingside. Dad particularly enjoyed the story of his Chemistry teacher there challenging the boys to measure 'half a drop'! He joined the Methodist Youth Club and cut quite a dashing figure. There is a story in the family that some girls there used to call the shoe shop Freeman Hardy and Willis 'Freeman Hardy and 'sigh'' in his honour! It was here that he met Mary Sones whom he subsequently married in 1958 in Cobham, Surrey.

Dad progressed to study Classics at Kings College, London University from 1948 -51 followed by 2 years National Service in the RAF as an Officer working as an Air Traffic Controller at various bases around the UK, including that at Middle Wallop – the name of which always made us laugh! He was stationed at REF Felixstowe in January 1953 when it was submerged by the East Coast Floods and made uninhabitable.

Demobbed in Autumn 1953, David needed to find work. He considered a career as a solicitor, spent some time working in management at a Chocolate factory and then entered the world of insurance working for Friends Provident and then Legal and General.

However these careers were not for him and in Spring 1954 he was offered a job in the City of London working for Henry Bath. David found dealing in the import and export of steels on the London Metal Exchange fascinating, and stayed there for 15 enjoyable years during which he passed accountancy exams and became an Associate, and later a Fellow, of the Chartered Institute of

Secretaries, which enabled us to tease him later about 'filing his nails' and 'taking a letter'!

His next move was to the National Dairy Council at Oxford Circus as Assistant and then the actual Company Secretary which opened up another new world of advertising and public relations activities. There David was heavily involved in the launch of Lymeswold cheese – an English soft blue, and instrumental in the 'Milk has gotta lotta bottle' campaigns. We were lucky enough to accompany him to Norwich to watch the launch of various hot air balloon flights using balloons in the shape of a pint of milk, and also on several occasions to the Milk Cup (the FA Cup Final) at Wembley. These were tremendously enjoyed by us all.

After 15 years, David moved in 1984 to Froebel College as the Bursar working locally in Roehampton with a lovely commute to work through Richmond Park. In this role he was responsible for finance, accounting, personnel and property and it was at this time that he caused much hilarity when, consulting on a new road layout and traffic calming measures for the college, he rang up the local police station to ask for the dimensions of a sleeping policeman!!

During Dad's working life he was also involved in many other activities: he was active on school PTAs- including helping to dig the swimming pool at Coombe Hill School, he studied German and took swimming life-saving classes which led to an embarrassing encounter when he and Mum bumped into a lady from the class in New Malden High Street only to hear her say 'Oh hello David, I didn't recognise you with your clothes on!' He was also a Sunday School teacher – the only one ever to pronounce 'Noah' as 'Norr' and confuse everyone in the play! He and Mum were original members of the Malden Care Scheme regularly delivering people younger than themselves to appointments! and they enjoyed many carefree family camping holidays with us when we would take off to France Holland or Spain and go in whichever direction they fancied!

After slightly early retirement in 1993 David helped with Meeting Point here and also with Victim Support and enjoyed holidays to visit far-flung family in Zimbabwe and South Africa. He also enjoyed playing short tennis and ball games with his friend Peter Mills and the club in New Malden, and he relished his role as 'Grampy' to all 7 of his Grandchildren.

Dad was, like all of us, devastated to lose Mum in 2003, and had to adapt to learn to shop, cook (excelling at breakfasts and wonderful toasted sandwiches but not a lot more!) and even had to learn to work the washing machine! He joined Rotary and very much enjoyed the meetings, fundraising and fellowship he found there. The Honorary Membership of Rotary recently offered to him would have been gratefully received we are sure. Dad enjoyed several holidays with his mate Doug Bryan and joined our 3 families on holidays to the South

Coast and Cornwall, to Sardinia, Minorca, Ireland, Sicily and Brazil as well as family camping trips to Cousin Andrew's farm in Oxfordshire, although in later years he did stay in the lovely farmhouse overnight and enjoy flashing torchlight messages from his window in the warm and dry across the dark field to us shivering outside our tents!

Dad was a gentleman- trustworthy, honest, reliable and loyal, he preferred crosswords to Sudoku despite my best efforts!), he liked anything coffee-flavoured (except candyfloss or anything in a bun!), he was a big reader and a grammatical expert, a man who could be relied upon to speak his mind- even when we would rather he didn't! Dad had a talent for fun poetry (of a sort) an example of which is on the table at the back for your amusement and in which he rhymes' pianoforte' with 'well past forty' and the like! He also had a love of cringeworthy puns which made us groan and a hearty laugh which has I expect caused us all embarrassment at various times!

Dad was first diagnosed with prostate cancer in January 2001 and after slow progression he became markedly worse in 2012. He accepted all his treatment with good grace and a 'let's get on with it' positive attitude. He willingly took part in trials of new drugs which we hope will help in further treatment breakthroughs in the future.

Dad and Mum were very active members of this church since moving to New Malden in the early 1960s. Their faith was very important to them both and they enjoyed the fellowship and friendship of you all enormously. We are so glad Dad was able to have his 80th birthday barn dance here with so many of you three years ago, and that he was able to dance EVERY dance. We would like to thank you all for the many lovely cards and kind words we have received and for the support you have shown us all.

To us 3 girls, Dad, with Mum, was supportive, full of fun, encouragement and love, and we will always be grateful to them both for that. Now we must each strive to re-create our own upbringing using the example they set us for our own children. We can only try!

THE FEAR ENGENDERED BY MENTAL ILLNESS

The word schizophrenia strikes fear into people; with thoughts of crime and violence. We are now into the 21st century and mental illness is still a taboo subject. The story of Jonny Benjamin is a harrowing tale of suffering in silence and a feeling of complete isolation and hopelessness.

Jonny first heard voices when he was 10 and thought everyone else did. Even when he was diagnosed with depression he did not disclose that he heard voices. He went to university to study drama and his flat mates did give him support. Eventually, he was diagnosed with schizoaffective disorder - depression and schizophrenia rolled into one, and hospitalised for treatment.

Three weeks into his treatment he realized that he was not getting better, so he ran away. He found himself on Waterloo Bridge and a stranger, a little older than himself, said, "You can get through this". It was a life changing moment. He went back to hospital and in 2010 he came off medication and was declared well.

He now makes documentaries and campaigns on mental health issues. His aim is that young people suffering the same illness as he did should not endure the loneliness, fear, isolation and hopelessness he did.

Sadly mental health spending has fallen and 2000 psychiatric beds in England have been cut. Jonny Benjamin is now 26 and is an inspiration for all who are concerned about mental health and the fear engendered by it.
