Message from Karl

During the month of July, I started several days by going for a walk to Richmond Park and a coffee with friends, mirroring a little of my experience when I was walking the Camino to Santiago de Compostella. For me, the biggest part of the challenge was not so much the walking itself, which I really enjoy, but getting going early in the day, as I am not a



morning person! However, the walks were very rewarding, despite being plagued by wasps on more than one occasion while having my cuppa at a picnic bench in the park.

There is something about having people to walk and talk with that can make the effort involved in exercise, whether that's hiking up Trap's Lane and over to the Ladderstyle Gate or something more substantial, easier to manage. Moreover, I have found myself having some pretty deep conversations while walking along, and it highlights why the Princess Alice Hospice has begun offering 'Walk and Talk' sessions alongside the Bereavement Café. It can sometimes be easier to grapple with tough topics and emotions while walking alongside another person than it is when we are sitting across the table from them.

The importance of connection and conversation in all our lives, whether it comes together with exercise or something more relaxed like having a cuppa, is not to be underestimated. Loneliness is an increasingly prevalent issue in our country, which can affect anybody of any age. Indeed, there is a particular stigma, in my pastoral experience, attached to admitting to feeling lonely as a young adult, especially in a world of carefully curated social media profiles that can give the impression that everyone else is having a fantastic time. Yet, as Age UK highlight, older people are

the most likely to say they experience loneliness in their lives.

This is one of the reasons why Wesley's has such a pivotal part to play in the life of the church and in terms of what we can offer to the wider community. I love spending time sitting in the café, because even on days when things like worship preparation and the burden of administration force me to spend time stuck behind a computer screen, there is still a really positive feel of connection and community with others. Having this facility is a real gift and privilege, and I hope and trust that my successor will be excited about working with Lee and others to develop its mission further in the coming years.

For now, as we all slow down a bit during the long summer days of August and many people go on holiday, I would like to encourage you to not forget those you know who might be feeling lonely at this time. Perhaps you could invite them down to go for a walk in the cool of the morning, pop into Wesley's for a cuppa and chat, or simply call in on them if they are not able to get around and about. We all need community and connection, and it can be one of the most valuable gifts we can give to others. Furthermore, never forget that God sees all of our acts of kindness, and nothing is wasted in Christ, who renews the heavens and the earth.

My sister, Georgina asked if I would join her on this walking adventure. Her interest stems from her volunteering work as a SSAFA case worker in her home county of Devon.

We left New Malden at 6:30 to make our way to the start line near Tower Bridge for our 8am slot. Being a military based event you'd have thought it would be all run on clockwork timing. Unfortunately, that was not the case. We were ready on the start line for 8 am, no one seemed to be in charge meaning we didn't actually start until 8:06.

After a strangely sparsely signed start, we made our way across Tower Bridge, the first of 13. Not too hot as yet, a bit of cloud cover was doing a good job of maintaining a pleasant temperature.

Once underway all was good. There were military personnel at every route decision-point signalling the right way to go.

It's great walking alongside the Thames, as there is so much to see.

The bridges kept on coming, often with many

steps to climb getting to the right level to cross and then lots more to descend.

We walked on both Golden Jubilee bridges that straddle Hungerford bridge, each counting as a 'bridge' in its own right, a bit cheeky, but technically they are individual bridges!

I found my pace would increase when I saw a snack stop in the distance. This is always my favourite part of every event, and these stops did not disappoint. Even though there were many sweet treats which were irresistible, I'd always take a banana for balance.

The weather was warming up now and our pace was slowing, but the 13th bridge was in sight.

Upon crossing the 13th bridge there was a sense of achievement, although sadly short lived when our next direction master pointed the way and said "just over mile to the finish", eeeek!

The clouds had gone and the sun was on max.

Our final stretch turned out to be nearer a

mile and half, mostly along the King's Road to Fel Brook Common.

Once we were over the finish line and our names had been called out over the sound system, we had a very welcome ice cream whilst trying to hide from the sun.

My head counted the 13 bridges and my 'smart' watch measured 11.2 miles. Hmmmm, another slip in military tolerance? It's not like the old days!

I would like to thank you all for your consistent support across my many

challenges over the years. I am always very humbled by the way the church community pulls together and supports whatever is needed, I love how that feels.

It's incredibly impressive and kind the way you all make cakes (sometimes from a list of choices), donate cakes then sometimes buy back your own cakes!

The amount of tea consumed was fantastic and cash donations were incredibly generous. Together we raised just under £400 for SSAFA. Thank you very much everyone.
