#### **Message from Karl**

One of my heroes is somebody of whom I suspect many people have never heard, but whose courage and integrity have long inspired me.

Hans Litten was a lawyer working in 1930s Germany. He was passionate about human rights at a time and in

a context when few people were talking about the subject, and he pursued his cases as if his life depended upon it.

The Stormtroopers, sometimes called the SA as opposed to the SS, operated under the leadership of Ernst Rohm and attacked as the street thugs of the Nazi party, though at enough of a distance that Hitler tried to deny their violence was anything

to do with him. He claimed he did not know what the Stormtroopers were up to, and denied that their violence was Nazi policy. When a group of four Stormtroopers attacked a gathering of the Nazis' political opponents, Hans Litten sought to join the dots,

> and connect their violence to its origin. During the trial of these men, Litten took the opportunity to summon Hitler to aive evidence and to cross-examine him at length, highlighting how he overtly planned to take power by force, using the Stormtroopers, if democratic means failed. This triagered Hitler into ranting and raving, undermining his pretence of calm respectability and



his supposed commitment to nonviolence.

The consequences for Litten of taking on the Nazis were significant. He was attacked, hassled and spat at in the streets, vilified in the press and hounded by opponents inside and outside the legal profession. This did not deter him, even when it became clear that the Nazi tentacles had reached deep into the police and judiciary, so that evidence disappeared and attempts to bring further prosecutions were blocked, and opportunities for other work suddenly started drying up.

When the Nazis came to power in 1933, Litten was arrested and sent to a concentration camp. He did not survive.

At a time when democracy is profoundly under threat in the United States – witness the sacking and/ or prosecution of Trump's political opponents on fabricated charges, deportations to torture facilities outside the country with no hope of return even for US citizens, the deployment of troops on the streets of Washington DC on the basis of false claims about crime, and so forth - and fascism and far right ideology is on the rise in the United Kingdom among many other countries, it is vital that we learn the lessons of history, and that we do not repeat the same mistakes that led to the rise of Hitler and other dictators in the 1930s. Yet, tensions and scapegoating are, if anything, being fuelled by politicians and media alike in a way that gives the impression that extreme views are actually normative.

In these times, we need people like Hans Litten, who did what they could to speak truth to power and wake people up to what was really going on. We need people with the integrity and courage to do the right things, even when it may well be personally costly.

As such, we need to speak up against the co-opting of our national flag by those driven by racism and xenophobia, who want to turn something which should be about pride in community and hospitality and togetherness into a symbol of fear and hatred. We need to counter the lies told and propagated about asylumseekers, Muslims, trans people and others who are being scapegoated for all of society's problems, and we need politicians who will act to address the rising inequality and the housing crisis which are creating the ideal conditions for the rise of fascism.

In Wesley's and in other places in New Malden, I have heard some profoundly racist tropes and hateful comments recently about minority groups such as the above, which are not acceptable or welcome here. God's love is for all, and if we cannot reflect that even over a cuppa in Wesley's, then we are doomed to repeat the mistakes of the past and give into fear, hatred and demonisation of the 'other'. Remember that the rise of Nazism did not begin with Auschwitz, but progressed there after years of dehumanising, othering and scapegoating.

Please, therefore, be more Hans Litten, for all of our sakes.
