

MESSAGE FROM KARL

In the past month, the world has witnessed the bizarre sight of an American President standing up at the United Nations, and spouting so much nonsense that even the normally positive BBC News reporter described him as "vainglorious". Having complained about a malfunctioning escalator, which it turns out had stopped because his own photographer had triggered the safety mechanism(!), Donald Trump made a series of sometimes highly questionable, and at other times outright false, claims about stopping wars, the Mayor of London and a supposed 'free speech crisis'. The irony of his administration implementing censorship and cancelation on anyone not mourning hard right activist Charlie Kirk as he would like seemingly escaped the Orange One, as he claimed yet again to the smartest guy around while attacking others.

The story of 'The Emperor's New Clothes' by Hans Christian Andersen came to mind while watching this spectacle. In this tale, a pair of conmen manage to persuade a vain ruler who loves fancy clothes that they can weave

him a special outfit for him to wear that will look amazing, but which only those smart enough will be able to see. He agrees, and the conmen set up their looms and pretend to work. A series of officials inspect proceedings and notice that nothing is happening, but they are too fearful to say anything. Finally, the conmen pretend to dress the emperor, who parades through the streets naked because nobody in his entourage dare tell him he is not wearing any clothes. Eventually, a small child points out the obvious...

Now, setting aside for a moment the ludicrous nature of the statements Trump makes all too frequently and which point to him being an egotistical fantasist, what disturbs me most is the way in which those around the American President, the media in both the UK and USA, and other world leaders (including Kier Starmer, who had the red carpet rolled out for him at the recent state visit) seem to go along with it all so readily. Surely, I find myself thinking, they can see that the emperor has no clothes, but they nod along with everything like crawling sycophants, and



it seems there is no equivalent of the young child there to name what the 'grown-ups in the room' will not.

This stuff matters for a range of reasons, including the damage done by false claims:

- Paracetamol does not cause autism. I remember the anguish my mother felt when equally false claims were made about the MMR vaccine; she believed that getting my brother vaccinated may have caused his disability. Claims like that of Trump and Robert F. Kennedy Junior cause real harm, and fuel stigma towards neurodiverse people and their families.
- Climate change is not some great scam.
 Instead, the overwhelming majority (i.e. 99.9%+) of scientists agree that global warming driven by human activity is all too real and is already having devastating impacts. It may not suit Trump's 'drill, baby drill' agenda, but it is true that fossil fuels are central to the problem and renewable energy key to the solution.
- The Mayor of London, Sir Sadiq Khan, is a Muslim, but is not seeking to impose Sharia Law on the city. As much as Trump

- seems to have a real grudge against Khan, the Mayor is actually far more socially liberal than most of the Labour front bench, for example, including on subjects such as LGBTQ+ rights.
- The UK is not being overrun by immigration. The government's own statistics show that only 0.7% of the population are refugees, for example, and UN data shows that we are well down the league table of those countries welcoming refugees, as most people flee to a neighbouring country and stay there. Moreover, one-in-five NHS workers are migrants, and far from taking away access for Brits, the whole system would collapse without them.

Jesus said that the truth will set us free (John 8:31 – 32). In a world in which the emperor is stark naked and waving around the willy of untruth and lies, may we be like the child who sees through the nonsense, and recommit ourselves to being people of truth in an age of dangerous lies.

TIME OUT



I wonder how many people have visited Strawberry Hill House, home of Horace Walpole (1717-1797,) the youngest son of Robert Walpole who was Britain's first and longest-serving Prime Minister. It makes a very interesting day out. Located a short walk from Strawberry Hill station - though there is also a small car park with five Blue badge spaces - it is an astonishing white fairytale castle-type building, complete with pinnacles, battlements and a round tower. It is Britain's first and finest example of a Georgian Gothic Revival villa which inspired an architectural style for decades to come. Walpole junior had it developed from two small 17th century cottages overlooking the Thames and used it as a Summer residence where he could entertain foreign

ambassadors, aristocrats and Royalty. It has recently been carefully restored to reflect as closely as possible how it must have looked in those days. Sadly the view of the Thames has become obscured by tall trees, however.

The Blue Plaque in Arlington Street, his London residence, refers to Walpole as a 'Connoisseur and Man of Letters.' He followed his father into Whig politics and was an MP for 28 years though he rarely if ever visited his more far- flung constituencies. He made large sums of money mainly through the well-paid sinecures that his father secured for him, in Customs and the Exchequer, for which he apparently had to do no work. He never married, so had no dependants and was thus free to travel and indulge his extravagant tastes for fine art, antiquities

and historical curiosities - Cardinal Wolsey's hat and a lock of Edward 1V's hair being just two examples. If he saw something he liked in a famous building at home or abroad, he had it re-created at Strawberry Hill. The Robert Adam fireplace, for example, was based on the tomb of Edward the Confessor in Westminster Abbey. His collection became so valuable and wide-ranging that he wrote his own descriptive catalogue of the artefacts in the house, and where they were positioned. This information was very useful when it came to trying to reassemble the collection after a huge sale of the house contents in the early 19th century. Articles were reclaimed and donated from all over the world, though a large number still reside in the library at Yale University.

There is still plenty to admire in the house however: an impressive library, an art collection including portraits by Reynolds and Holbein as well as Renaissance glassware, ceramics and fine Chinese porcelain. Skilful trompe d'oeuil wall coverings in the entrance hall give the impression of intricate raised plasterwork, but perhaps the most famous exhibit is a large Chinese porcelain urn in which Walpole's cat drowned. This episode was immortalised in the mock-heroic Ode on the Death of a Favourite Cat, Drowned in a Tub of Goldfishes by the poet Thomas Gray - he of the 'Elegy Written in a Country Churchyard' - a friend with whom Walpole did the Grand Tour in his youth.

'...The hapless Nymph with wonder saw:
A whisker first and then a claw,
With many an ardent wish,
She stretched in vain to reach the prize.
What female heart can gold despise?
What cat's averse to fish?

Presumptuous Maid! with looks intent Again she stretched, again she bent, Nor knew the gulf between. (Malignant Fate sat by and smiled) The slipp'ry verge her feet beguiled She tumbled headlong in.....'

Horace Walpole, although not a poet, was indeed a Man of Letters: he left over 7.000 of them which have been collected into 48. volumes. They are an invaluable resource as a witty social commentary and political history, much as Pepvs' diaries were for an earlier age. He even had his own printing press - one of the more practical oddities in the house. Perhaps his best-known work is The Castle of Otranto, inspired by a nightmare and said to be the first Gothic novel. I must confess to not having read it or indeed anything else by (either) Walpole, but this trip certainly piqued my interest in this eccentric individual and I thoroughly recommend this trip. The guides were very informative and there is a secondhand bookshop.
