MESSAGE FROM KARL

One of my favourite sights at this time of year is the explosion of daffodils in the grounds of Hampton Court Palace, and in particular in the gardens around the back of the palace towards the tiltyard. It is a sign that Spring is finally on its way, and after the particularly wet and miserable Winter we have experienced this year, these glimpses of new life and colour are very welcome indeed! They also invite us to look ahead to the completion of our journey towards Jerusalem and the foot of the cross, through to the new life of that first Easter morning when the women who had come to care for Jesus' body discovered that he is risen indeed!

The season of Lent is a time of letting go – laying down those idols which get in the way of our putting the love of God into practice as well as

we might – and hence it is a demanding period of self-examination and reflection if we take it seriously. A friend of mine recently wrote about the cakes and pastries stand in a Danish bakery being labelled 'not food', in that while they may be delicious to eat, they actually have no nutritional value. Lent is about weaning ourselves off the equivalents of 'not food' in our lives, to embrace what really nourishes and feeds us. As such, to ready ourselves to come to the foot of the



cross, and dare to look up at the dazzling grace of God laid bare as Jesus' outstretched arms embrace our world in love, is to be ready to die. This is symbolised in baptism: going under the water means dying with Christ and being crucified with him, before emerging triumphantly as those who have risen with him to new life. The good news is that God's love is bigger than even the very worst we can throw at it, and Good Friday can be called 'good' precisely because it is not the end of the story.

Easter, then, is a season of rejoicing in the irrepressible love of God, which is so important that it lasts for seven weeks and long after the Easter eggs have slipped out of the shops! Rowan Williams describes the resurrection as being like a second 'Big Bang', an explosion of fresh creative energy into the universe, and in its way, the blooming of colour as the daffodils spring to the surface and the trees put out their blossom is a reminder of this hope. The resurrection is our

sure foundation and the basis of Christian hope, because it points towards God's ultimate end for creation in which the Kingdom of God will be fully present and there will be no more tears, no more pain, no more suffering. In the meantime, we are called to be people who embrace this creative energy, and follow the Holy Spirit in enabling new life to pop up in unexpected places and to transform them. We are not to zap the life out of the world, but are to bring the colour and vitality. God is a God of abundance and overflowing joy, and even in the toughest situations, God's love is always present – leading us on, coaxing us forward, breaking down barriers.

So, friends, may you have a blessed Lent that brings you closer to God, and when Easter does come, may it be a time for you of hope and joy and new life.

SO FAR, SO GOOD

It was a year ago (10 March to be exact) when my wife messaged me with a picture of a job advert and accompanying job description. She had popped into Wesley's for a cup of tea between her exercise classes at the Malden Centre. The job in question was Administrator at New Malden Methodist Church. At the start of 2025 we had decided that I needed to look at ways to supplement our income.

Since 2007 I had been self-employed as a freelance web and graphic designer. As most self-employed people will tell you business seems to go through a feast or famine cycle. I had always been quite fortunate since starting out to have a lot of regular clients and a pretty steady flow of work. There was one period around the end of 2016 (a bit too early to blame Brexit) when business was flirting a bit too much with the famine side.

The church we were then attending, Morden Baptist Church, had advertised for a new role of Operations Manager. Initially I didn't apply for the job (I'm not sure why!). The person who was offered the job ended up turning it down (evidently he hadn't realised it was a part-time role) and so they re-advertised it. A friend at the church encouraged me to apply for it. I did and got the job.

I happily combined this role with my freelance work up until the summer of 2020 when I was made redundant. Covid and lockdown had drastically affected the churches income, a large part of which was made up from room hire, and the role of Operations Manager was surplus to requirements.

Fast forward to 2025 and I once again found that famine was becoming more prevalent than feast. A situation I didn't think would change any time soon, if ever. The rise of AI (sounds like a film title) is having an impact

on various industries and professions; web and graphic design seem to be near the top of that list.

I read the Administrator job description with interest, it was almost identical to the one I had at Morden Baptist Church (just with a slightly less grand title!) and decided to apply for the job. I was invited to interview on Wednesday 9 April and was subsequently offered the job.

My official start date was 14 May and following a month's handover with Sarah the armbands came off on 6 June when Sarah officially retired. Thankfully I floated. It's a bit daunting following someone who's been doing a job for over 14 years (a bit like following Sir Alex Ferguson at Manchester United) but it's great that Sarah is still a part of the church and is always happy (well it seems that way) to help and answer any queries I have. November saw the end of my six-month probationary period. Spoiler alert, I passed.

I feel like I'm in a place where the weekly and monthly things that need doing are becoming second nature. With the routine things taking up less time this will allow me to focus on some of the other areas covered in the job description that have taken a back seat up until recently. The revamping of the NMMC website is at the top of that list.

I enjoy the blend of having a part-time job and the security of a regular income, alongside the freedom of self-employment, even with the unpredictability of feast or famine income. The fact that the part-time job is enjoyable is a bonus for which I am very grateful.

LET IT SHINE

Thanks to all who made this talk possible on Sunday 15 February where we heard about the talent in the church.

Why are we so reticent about sharing our talent?

It could be fear of envy, insecurity, a desire to avoid being judged. Or just not wanting to be perceived as showing off!

The reading from Matthew was originally about sharing faith, secular talents – personal, professional or artistic. By definition by placing your light under a bushel or bucket you keep your abilities or good qualities hidden from other people. It's only by revealing your talent that it can fulfil its true function.

Sometimes others can see our strengths more clearly than we can see ourselves. Ask trusted friends, family and church leaders to share what they believe your talents are. This can provide a valuable insight and confirmation.

Often talent becomes evident as we begin to serve in different areas. Volunteer in the church or community and see which activities resonate with you. By

actively engaging in service you may discover gifts you didn't realise you had.

If we were asked to write a job description for your role as a Christian 'Be the light of the world' should be the inspiration. Use your God-given talent and abilities for the purpose of good. Make the world more user friendly. This echoes Robert Louis Stevenson's phrase 'Our call is to puncture holes in the darkness of the world.' We are meant to shine and not play it small, not hide and think you have nothing to offer. Whatever you have – abilities of kindness and volunteerism you can produce that

light. Don't hide it, amplify it.

One of the ways we amplify the shine is to come to church. When you bring your light near to others it transforms from a bunch of little flames into a beacon of hope diffused over the whole community. It becomes the beacon of the church.

DEMYSTIFYING ... THE LITURGICAL YEAR

Welcome to the second in a short series of pieces trying to demystify some of the things we do in the Methodist Church that might not immediately make sense.

Have you ever wondered why the colours at the front of church change through the year, and what they mean? Here, we explore the character of the different parts of the Church's year.

One of the interesting things about the Christian year is that there are at least three ways to measure it:

- **Calendar Year:** While this now begins on 1st January, until 1752, the new year was actually marked on Lady Day - 25th March - and thus nine months before the birth of Jesus is celebrated at Christmas.
- **Methodist Year:** In line with the academic year, the Methodist, or Connexional, year begins on 1st September, which is why it is a busy time with Church Councils, Circuit meetings and other forums that feed into them taking place.
- **Liturgical Year:** Unlike the others, the start date varies as the First Sunday of Advent changes each year, even as it is always four Sundays before Christmas Day. The exact timings of Lent, Easter and Pentecost also vary, this time in line with the lunar calendar.

The liturgical year functions a bit like a wheel on a bicycle, in that while it continues to turn as we journey through the seasons over and again, it also moves forward through time. Each season is associated with a colour which highlights its significance and purpose, such as purple for reflective seasons and gold/white for periods of celebration, with the times in between (known as Ordinary Time) symbolised by green. The pattern reflects the

calendar variations noted above, as well as aspects of the biblical narrative:

- **Advent (purple):** four Sundays in which we prepare ourselves to celebrate and be transformed by the birth of Jesus.
- **Christmas (gold/white):** twelve days, and thus two Sundays, in which we celebrate the birth of Jesus.
- **Epiphany (white):** between four and nine Sundays from Twelfth Night (6th Jan) to Shrove Tuesday, this marks the coming of the Magi to the infant Jesus. Just to be confusing, not everyone marks Epiphany as a season, and some treat the Sundays after 6th January as Ordinary Time, so that it becomes a green period.
- **Ash Wednesday (purple/black):** the beginning of Lent, a day in which ashes made from burning the previous year's palm crosses symbolise both our mortality and our need of God's grace.
- **Lent (purple/blue):** a period of reflection, self-denial and repentance, which covers forty days (not including the six Sundays) between Ash Wednesday and Maundy Thursday, reflecting the length of Jesus' time of testing in the wilderness. Includes Palm Sunday (red), which marks Jesus' entry into Jerusalem.
- **Maundy Thursday (gold):** marks the Last Supper shared by Jesus with his disciples.


