

### **Message from Reverend Choi**

"Imagine a complex, multi-cultural society that annually holds an elaborate winter festival, which lasts not simply a few days, but several weeks. This great festival celebrates the birth of the lord and saviour of the world, the prince of peace, a man who is divine. People mark the festival with great abundance – feasting, drinking, gift-giving. Special events, such as song, dance, sporting events, happen almost daily. The economy booms, and the sales of goods flourish as at no other time of the year. The poor are recipients of generous giving by the rich. In all, a great festival, which brings a sense of civic unity while honouring the saviour."

This is part of an article, written by Richard Horsley, an American theologian. He seems to talk about the current trends of Christmas celebration in details. But, that is not true. He is describing one of the biggest festivals in Roman Empire – the festival of celebration of the Emperor's divinity. And, this was celebrated at the time of Jesus'

birth. And, Jesus was born into a world in which the Emperor was called 'the lord and saviour of the world', 'the prince of peace'. What's surprising is that those titles were used exactly the same way, when Jesus was born. What would it mean, then? It means, through the birth of Jesus Christ, God was offering a very different Saviour to the world, the Saviour, who was born of a peasant girl, in a little town of Bethlehem, with no worldly power background. Therefore, in those days, it is said that the early Christians were being asked an important question: 'Who is your Saviour? The Emperor or Jesus Christ?' So, we can imagine the tension and conflict between two groups, and the cultural differences they had to cope with. It must have been a spiritual battle they had to face in their everyday lives.

Then, what about the world we live in now? What do we celebrate on Christmas? And, how do we celebrate it? By the time you read this message, most of you may be in the middle of busyness of the Christmas preparation: buying and spending, eating and partying. But, what we need to remember is it is a time of quiet, a time to discover God's presence amongst us, and a time to wait for the Christ child. While we are waiting, I hope we may be able to sense his coming with the light, the light of love and truth.

#### The Christmas Fair

The Christmas Fair was another roaring success on Friday Nov 25<sup>th</sup> November, and a total of just over £2000 was raised for Church projects.

Recently, this day has become known in some circles as 'Black Friday' and has had some unfortunate consequences in terms of traffic, public spending habits and particularly irritating e mails. We in New Malden however have always had it styled rather as 'Lights Friday,' as this is the day when Santa comes to the High Street and switches on our Christmas lights. This year there was a little delay-possibly due to the heavy traffic, but also variously attributed to Santa suffering a sleigh-puncture or having trouble breaking in a new reindeer. However, he did show up, and the crowds inside the church surged out to greet him and then surged back in again for a top-up from the wide range of goodies on offer on our stalls. We were very happy to encourage this kind of Public Spending.

It is quite amazing what is produced for sale, representing a huge amount of effort by a number of people right through the year — the knitting, craft work, preserves-making and gathering together of all the various items does not happen overnight. Some of the cooking inevitably does, however, and we are grateful to all those people who baked, sold and plied their various skills in whatever sphere. Thanks too to those who donated and spent, and of course to the team of people who set up and cleared away. The whole venture was masterminded once again by Julie Haines, who seems to run on Duracell batteries.

Our 'presence 'on the High Street is a great asset in this and many other ventures and it continues to grow. We hope it will continue to do so, particularly throughout next year's 150<sup>th</sup> anniversary celebrations. Most excitingly, we have now reached our target for the mosaic, which will be produced as a central focus to our celebrations and will be a lasting reminder of our Mission in New Malden.
