Message from Reverend Karl

In the past few months, I've stumbled across more than one opinion piece arguing that the problems faced by this country stem from the loss of so-called 'Christian Values'. This isn't a new lament, and in my experience, what people usually mean is either that they're uncomfortable about the presence of other significant faith groups within our society, or that they are uneasy about the legal recognition of other types of family beyond the nuclear model of mum, dad and 2.4 children, or that they're angry about the Church no longer having a privileged voice within the national discourse and the power to influence commonly-held views of morality. Hence, I tend to be on my guard whenever I hear people talk about 'the loss of Christian values'; what follows is often something I want to robustly challenge.

However, pondering the seasons of Advent and Christmas in the context of the General Election on December 12th has led me to reflect on what lies at the core of my own values as a Christian person, especially as someone who finds themselves in the position of having a modest public voice through pieces such as this and, most obviously, in the pulpit. For me, the fundamental starting point has to be what God's character and actions (which are inseparably linked) can tell us about what it means to be a human being. In Advent, we're invited to explore the most amazing, wonderful and frightening fact – in Jesus Christ, God's life boiled over into our world, in the form of defenceless love.

This year, our Gospel reading for Christmas morning is the majestic prologue to John's Gospel (John 1:1 – 14), which tells us that the Word of God who became human was with God from the beginning, and indeed was God. In other words, God is eternally a God of relationship, and Jesus Christ is God from God, Light from Light, as the fourth century Nicene-Constantinopolitan Creed puts it. When we gaze upon the baby in the manger, we're therefore looking at the fullness of God – needy, vulnerable and primarily dependent on a remarkable young woman (who was anything but meek and mild) who would soon need to flee with her husband and child from the wrath of Herod. It seems that God was willing to take extraordinary risks to come among us humanly and transform creation from the inside.

I think we can thus see from Jesus Christ's birth that God's very nature is indeed that of defenceless love, and if we were in any doubt about this, surely the events at the other end of his life, and opening his arms wide upon the cross to embrace our broken world, confirm this. There is even more to say, however, because God's choosing to be become human in order to both reveal the divine character, and bring about salvation from the relationship-destroying and insidious nature of sin that blights our experience, says much about the value God places on each and every person. The incarnation – to use the proper theological term - should make us look upon one another with awe and wonder: God thought that this face was worth quite literally everything; this face was worth living and dying for.

It would make a tremendous difference to our world, and the systems which govern and shape it on both a national and international scale, if this basic 'Christian value' of recognising the infinite worth of each person was reflected. I doubt so many people would be dreading being cold, scared, hungry or lonely at Christmas time if it was. Advent is a season of getting ready to encounter this truth. May it shape not just how we vote on December 12th, but how we live every minute of every day.

There are four main headings in our action plan with details of how we will work towards our aims, who will progress them, and when we expect to get them done. As you can see, our main concern is to ensure that we have continuity of ministry in the circuit, and especially at Chessington as Andy and Liz move on in Summer 2020.


A summary of the priorities and targets we have agreed for 2019-2020:

Staffing: Enter stationing process and seek a 0.5 minister for Chessington Methodist Church from Sept. 2020 // Develop an alternative staffing plan if no minister is available, using existing circuit budget and rental of vacant manses to employ new professional lay staff

Safeguarding: • Develop the work of the new Circuit Safeguarding Officer and the safeguarding role of the Circuit Co-Ordinator // Ensure an effective Safeguarding Officer in each church // Complete all outstanding Foundation and Advance level training

Governance: Clarify the formal relationship with Korean Christian Fellowship at CMC// Succession planning for new Circuit Stewards

Training: Circuit Consultation on Marriage and Relationships Report // Circuit training event to help those leading "Local Arrangement" services



GOD IN LOVE UNITES

is the title of a new Methodist report on marriage and relationships. The report proposes some important changes in our understanding of marriage – including a

recommendation that it should be possible

for same sex couples to marry in a Methodist Church. But the report is about far more than this. It reflects deeply and prayerfully on our understanding of marriage and relationships. It explores what it means for couples to "cohabit" without being formally married, it seeks to understand the needs of those who don't easily fit into our usual ways of thinking about "female" and "male". It looks at the qualities of good Christian relationships of all kinds.

The Conference has formally "received" the report and asked for a wide consultation before making a final decision on the key issues in summer 2020. If you would like to know more and share your views please come along to an open meeting:

CHRISTMAS CARDS

Time to write your Christmas cards again – what designs have you picked to send this year? Are they religious ones?
