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Message from Karl

February is a big month for me personally, partly because I'll turn thirty-five (and therefore will have had half of my biblical three-score and ten) on the thirteenth, and partly because on that same day, I go before the District Probationers' Committee. The latter will decide whether the Church considers that I am ready to be ordained during the Methodist Conference, at the end of June. For me, all this represents the culmination of a long journey which began many years before I actually candidated, and that has enabled me to grow in my relationship with God in Christ.

When we talk about vocation, we often refer to ministers and ordinations, and thus I suspect that we sometimes forget how every Christian has a vocation. The God who has known each and every one of us from before we were born calls us and equips us to make our own unique contributions to the Body of Christ, without which we are all impoverished (1 Corinthians 12:26). This means we all have gifts to offer, even if we find that hard to accept – I remember being told once that I'm not so special that I'm the only person God hasn't given gifts to, when I was struggling with this idea!

One of the tasks of the Church, then, is to help people recognise their own gifts and use them well, to the betterment of us all. There are theological pitfalls to avoid, of course. To talk about vocations is not to suggest that we each need to discover a map which leads us along one inescapable route, as God honours our choices. Nor is it to say that the end goal of this is greater usefulness, which is one of the traps it's very easy to fall into with a capitalist mindset forming the backdrop to our thinking; the Covenant Prayer reminds us that faithfulness to God may mean being laid aside for a season.

However, it is to say that each of us has a contribution to make to the whole, and that when we put barriers in the way of some because of ethnicity, disability, gender, sexuality and so forth, we harm not just the person or people in question, but ourselves and the rest of the Body of Christ, too. Thus, as I reflect on my own experiences in recent years, and my time here as your minister in particular, I am grateful to those who have affirmed and encouraged me, although I do not fit the stereotype of a minister in various ways (not least because I'm indifferent about steam railways!).

There's always more to do, though, if we're to be a truly inclusive Church, not least recognising how even talking of inclusion raises questions of power – who gets to decide who's 'in', and who's 'out'? As we seek to develop our ministry and mission in this place, and hence what it means to be at the heart of the High Street, we need to wrestle with these questions. One of the key challenges will be, I think, the perennial task of filling key roles in the life of the congregation, and supporting those who do step forward. However, if we begin with openness to the gifts of others, we're off to a good start.

So, I suppose this is a long-winded way of saying that as we move forward together, seeing the fruit of the Rebranding Project and the new Bereavement Café beginning as just two examples of God's work among us, may we be open to recognising and liberating the gifts of others, for the betterment of us all. Oh, and I'd appreciate your prayers for February 13th!

African Palms



The African Palms project was started in 1965 by Fr Alan Talbot, an Anglican priest who served for 6 years as a missionary in the diocese of Masasi Tanzania. His aim was to give really poor villagers the means to earn some extra money to supplement their meagre income.

The Palm Crosses are made from dried branches of the dwarf palm Hyphaena coriacia. These grow wild in the Masasi area, so are not cultivated, furthermore no trees are cut down in the work of collecting the Palm Leaves for plaiting the Palm Crosses.

The work of making the Palm Crosses does not interfere with the villagers' normal work of producing the food they need to live, it provides some additional income.



The crosses are sent once a year to the UK where they are sorted and packed.

Over the years the number of Palm Crosses sold has increased and now 3 million are sold worldwide each year. In 1986 African Palms Itd was formed, which is a company owned by the African Palms Association, a charitable trust formed at the same time.

Any profit made by the company is transferred to the trust and used for health and education projects in the Masasi area.

At present the trust is working on a project to get clean water supplied available in all eight of the villages where the Palm Crosses are made. This is an exciting project! On a recent visit, villagers who make the Palm Crosses without exception told us how this would make a huge difference to their lives. Past projects have included other water projects, hostels and safehouses, work on clinics (dispensaries), books and desks for schools, and working to improve special needs schools.
