#### Isabel Elves is fundraising for Help Musicians

I have recently turned twelve years old and play three instruments: violin, piano and saxophone but I can also play the drums - I have played violin and piano at the church. My family is very musical (as you know from numerous concerts) and I want to do something to help other musicians during lockdown. I go to Coombe Girls School (I used to go to Burlington Juniors) and have most of my instrument lessons with Kingston Music Service. This is a great music service which I have been in since Year 1 (I am in year 7 now) and I also play in their Kingston Youth Orchestra on my violin.

Professional musicians have not been able to have the usual working year as concerts and much more were cancelled. Many have not been paid due to this and so Help Musicians provides support for them such as giving money to those with financial problems. Help Musicians is an independent UK charity for professional musicians of all genres, from starting out through to retirement. They offer support to emerging, professional and retired musicians – whatever the genre.

I will be raising money for this charity by playing all my instruments for 100 minutes (in total) on one day; it will take place on the 1st of June. During the time I will play lots of different pieces of music including some of the pieces from the ABRSM Grades for all the instruments. This is part of the Captain Sir Tom Moore 100 scheme which is in memory of Captain Sir Tom Moore walking laps around his garden till he was one hundred. His family set this up in time for what would be his 101st birthday. This is to get the country doing the same as he once did by doing something around the number 100 for a charity. That is what inspired me to do this for Help Musicians.

# **Update on the Development of the Tudor Williams site** 53-59 High Street New Malden KT3 4BU

The group charged by the Church Council to submit comments on the planning application on behalf of NMMC did so well before the deadline on Tuesday 27<sup>th</sup> April.



Various studies and data were missing from the Applicant's supporting documents and incorrect assumptions had been made about the internal layout of our premises. Our contention that this made independent verification or challenging some deductions difficult, if not impossible, is being put to the Applicant for comment by RBK Planning.

The next significant date in the planning process is the determination deadline of 21<sup>st</sup> June 2021. We will keep you informed about developments, such as the recommendation to councillors and the date of the determination planning meeting.

# An Update from the Wings of Hope Nursery

Following our report last month from Stella Chattle that she had sent nine bags of teddies, hats, scarves and bags to South Africa, she has had news from her nephew that two of the nine bags have arrived, hopefully the other seven will arrive soon! Paul Horn, the Executive Director of the nursery has recently completed a year end report for 2020 from which the following extracts are taken.

### "Giving children wings of hope

The Kgosi Neighbourhood foundation (KNF) Wings of Hope School offered 120 children preschool education in 2020 at the cost of R100 a month. (Only 60% of parents could pay.) The children in our care receive a hot breakfast, fruit snack, and hot lunch each day. To be selected for our school, families in the community must demonstrate that they are residents of the community and earn less than R3500 a month. Home visits are conducted annually to ensure that these criteria are met.

CHALLENGING TIMES Covid-19 had a devastating impact in our children's homes in Jeppestown. The average household income of the families we serve was already less than R1000 a month before lockdown. After lockdown, the little informal work our parents did dried up and our children experienced greater insecurity than ever before. In response to these challenges, the Kgosi Neighbourhood Foundation took on the task of providing a monthly grocery parcel to each family. We also sent specially formulated homework to parents via text message, taking into consideration that most households did not have pens, paper, scissors, or other educational supplies that many of us can take for granted. Despite these efforts, we know that nothing is a substitute for in-person schooling, and we are so grateful to see our children back at school".







# Christian Aid Week 10<sup>th</sup> – 16<sup>th</sup> May 2021

Although our usual events for Christian Aid Week have had to be cancelled due to Covid 19 restrictions, we should still celebrate the week if only in a very limited way. My original idea of a coffee morning in our garden - 6 people at a time – was soon ruled out as being too complicated and a logistical nightmare so we are going to try another venture. . .Bread and Cheese Lunch in a Box!



This is how (hopefully) it will work. . . A box containing cheese rolls, tomatoes, fruit and a biscuit will be 'on sale' in the garden of 5, Fritham Close, New Malden from 12 noon to 2pm on Sunday 16<sup>th</sup> May. We would ask you to ring us (020 8942 6867) on SATURDAY 15<sup>th</sup> if you wish to



participate so we can prepare the boxes and have an idea what time you would be arriving. Also, would you mind bringing face masks just in case there is a rush of clientele! More than 6 people in a garden are not legally permitted until the 17th! As much as we would love to ask you to stay and sit in our garden so we could eat together, I'm afraid this won't be possible (unless only 6 people turn up, of course!).

If you cannot or don't want to take part in this experiment but wish to make a donation to Christian Aid, we do have a supply of CA envelopes and will be very happy to deliver one to you during the week – just let us know.

Over the past year charities in general have been affected by a lack of funding because of the pandemic but the need for help worldwide continues. So please, please support this small but, we hope, fun fundraising effort. . .especially as this will be our only Christian Aid event of the week.

### **Anyone for Tennis?**

### **Surbiton Hill Methodist Church Tennis Club**

At the end of March we were delighted to be able to resume playing tennis at our club in Manor Drive, Surbiton.

This club is probably quite unique as it is owned by the church and run by the members of the club who come from the church and the local area. It is a wonderful facility which is well used for tennis and for community also.



The club has six courts, a play area for children, a patio area well laid out with picnic tables and benches, a clubhouse and gardens.

Saturday afternoons are club afternoons where organised social tennis takes place. Standards vary of course but that is to be expected. Play takes part at other times in the week with the men playing on Wednesday mornings and the ladies on Thursday mornings. Informal coaching is held on Wednesday evenings in the Summer. We also have resident coaches so it is possible to easily get coaching. There is also a thriving junior club which meets during the Summer on a Friday evening.

Fees are very reasonable, £150 for a year's subscription or £350 for a family.

This is a self-help club so the maintenance of the grounds and club house are done on a rota basis by the members and delicious Saturday afternoon teas also are provided by members.

The club is available to be of use to the community too and is well used. Children's parties are held there, also many charity events to raise money, also class meetings and wellbeing groups meet there, as does the regular Greek dancing group. Our Oasis mums and toddlers group meet here in the Summer and the Guides and Brownies have meetings there too.

Church services are held here run by our church, as well as informal Carol services and Easter breakfasts etc. The circuit and other local churches enjoy use of the premises.

The club was set up by members of the church in the 1930s and the ethos that existed then is still apparent today, the Christian care and welfare of the members being of paramount importance.

We welcome new members to play tennis or groups that are looking for somewhere to use for church activities or community use.

What will coming to church look like under the Covid-19 security measures?

Well, with a bit of help from Mikey the Bear and friends, Karl has put together this picture guide:

1) Please queue up outside the church, using the 2m markers. Doors will open at 10.20am.



2) When you are invited in (one household or support bubble at a time), you'll need to sign in at one of the two Registration Desks.

While there, please do the following:

- 1) Sanitise your hands
- 2) Scan the QR code for NHS Test and Trace if you have a compatible smartphone.

If you can't do this, and are not in the church directory, then we will need to take contact details. Any data we record will be held for 21 days, as per government instructions.

- 3) Put on a face covering, unless you are exempt
- 3) Please queue up by the central doors, and wait for a steward to invite you into the Sanctuary.

Note that the side aisle doors are out of use.









4) If you need to use the toilets, please follow the arrows and use the hand sanitiser (which will be at a more human-friendly height!).

Until we've all had time to get used to the system, and because social distancing isn't possible in the corridor outside the cubicles, this area will be stewarded.



- 5) We're operating a 'clean as you use' system in the toilets. Please use the wipes provided to clean:
- the toilet lid and seat
- the wash basin and soap dispenser
- the sanitary bin (if used)

Please don't flush wipes down the toilet, as this may block it. If you have any problems with cleaning, just ask the stewards.

6) Wash your hands for 20 seconds, following the instructions.

When you're all done, please leave the door open for the next person





7) When leaving the toilets, follow the arrows and enter the Sanctuary using the central doors.



8) The Sanctuary looks a little different to how you might remember it...

The preacher will stay in the pulpit behind the screen.

One side of the Sanctuary has been turned into family 'boxes', with two tables and seats for four or five people (more children could be accommodated, if we know who's coming in advance).

The other side has rows of seats with spaces for groups of one, two or three people.





9) A steward will show you to your seat.

Seats with pink ribbons can be used, but those with a red cross on them are out of bounds and must be left unoccupied.

Keeping gaps of four chairs between households/bubbles enables 2m distancing to be observed.



10) We hope to put together activity packs for children using the family boxes.

We understand that not being able to go out for Junior Church or enjoy the Craft Corner is hard for children and young people, but we hope they will enjoy what can do in worship.

Please can parents/carers do their best to ensure that children stay in the boxes, to keep them and others safe ©





11) While we can't sing during services (the law is clear that this includes when wearing face coverings), we can enjoy organ and piano music, as well as prerecorded music.

Please resist the temptation to sing along, even when Roberta the Bear plays a catchy tune!

12) Wesley's Coffee Bar remains closed, and so we won't be serving refreshments after the service.

Please leave by the fire doors in the Sanctuary.

The stewards will ask you to leave in order, starting with those nearest the fire door.

Please also move away from the doors, so that social distancing can be observed as we head on our way.





### 13) Some other things to note:

- The hymn books and worship books have been put away. All the words needed for the service will be on the screen.
- Unless you need the toilet, once you've been shown to your seat, please stay there and do not walk over to others to greet them.
- Services will last at most 45 minutes.
