We are delighted to announce that Wesley's Coffee Bar is open again following the latest relaxing of lockdown restrictions. In our first week we have welcomed back familiar customers, met some new ones and found each day busier than the one before.

Our opening hours have changed and for the time being we shall be open Monday to Friday from 11am until 1pm. This allows us to operate with just two volunteers each day instead of four and to do all the extra tasks required to keep everyone safe. So what will be different? Royal Marsden Knitting Project

I have been a volunteer at the Royal Marsden (Sutton) for some time - wheeling the shopping trolley round the wards with a colleague and taking time to chat with patients- and their friends and families too. (Currently, I am on furlough.)

One of the many ways the hospital supports families during very difficult times is in the making of bereavement boxes for children; each of these boxes contains a knitted teddy. More are needed; please read the information provided by the hospital and see if you might be able to help.

We have recently been asked by the Play Specialists from the Oak Centre for Children and Young People whether we could assist them with a knitting project, by **creating teddy bears** for the bereavement boxes that the hospital sends out to families of young patients who have sadly passed away.



• The teddy bears should be no larger than 30cm long and no smaller than 10cm long so that they will fit in the boxes - ideally something around 15cm would be perfect.

- The teddy bears should include a small heart knitted onto the front of their chest, as in the attached example photo.
- The teddy bear's faces should be neutral rather than smiling or sad.
- Ideally, we would like the teddies to be posted to us by the **23rd of June**, but if you manage to complete them sooner, that would be great.
