Message from Reverend Choi

"I tell you the truth, unless a grain of wheat falls to the ground and die, it remains only a single seed. But if it dies, it produces many seeds." (John 12. 24)

Dear friends,

Although I am not a keen gardener and don't know much about planting or gardening, I am always amazed at the great act of faith which is shown by planting a seed. How can you imagine that a tiny seed becomes a harvest of fruits or vegetables, or beautiful flowers? I dare to say, 'Unless you have faith, you cannot plant a seed'.

With great hope and expectation, you place a seed in a small hole, wondering whether anything will happen. And then, you water, fertilise, and weed. In a sense, it is an agonising process, which demands patience and endurance of the planter. But then, just when you are about to give up, particularly if you are a novice, you see the first blades appear, then the stalks... It is a miracle, the miracle of a single seed, fallen to the ground and buried.

This season of Lent, in the springtime, is very symbolic, as it calls us to such faith that new life can spring up from barrenness, and that there is hope even in the midst of despair. But, what's more important to us is to believe that it is the promise of the risen Lord that the seed we plant will take root and produce a miraculous harvest at the end.

So, it is my prayer to us all, as we journey towards Easter: "Gracious God, giver of all life, plant the seed of your Word in our broken hearts. During this time of Lent, may your Word take root in us, that we may see the greatness of harvest, the harvest of joy, peace, and love, in every season of life. Amen." Every blessing,

Pilgrimage

This is the theme of this year's Lent course. At the first session on Monday 15 February, Rev Peter Flint of the URC led us in a reflection on four varied pieces of writing. One in particular really struck a chord with me, and led me to think about journeys I have made, and to what extent I have experienced them – or merely been an observer. How much am I truly living in the present, or am I too often looking back, or wondering about what's over the horizon?

"The road is not a line between places; it is a place between places. You cannot understand the ravishments of the road unless you overcome the logistical way of looking at things, which is perhaps the most powerful impediment that our hustling way of life puts in the way of experience. Since we cling to a mainly instrumental view of the road, we have forgotten how to be travellers and we are tourists instead, sitting still before the window and watching the world speed past, when in fact we are the ones who are speeding and it is the world that is still, for those who possess the capacity for stillness.

We are too enamoured of destinations. We hunger too much for arrival. We treat the road as an interval between meanings, an interregnum between dispensations, and so we are blinded to the richness of meanings and dispensations in the road itself. If departure is the past and arrival is the future, then the road is the present, and there is nothing more spiritually difficult, or spiritually rewarding, than learning to live significantly in the present. This is accomplished by a schooling in transience, and the road is such a school.

Almost as powerfully as the sea and the sky, the road is an emblem of immensity: the horizon into which it disappears is the promise of a release, which is the promise of a horizon, which is the promise of a release. From the stretch of even the most ordinary road, you may infer a suggestion of infinity."

Leon Wieseltier The Art of Wandering We reflected on these questions:

- What does this passage evoke in you?
- What does it call to mind, or help you to remember?
- What Bible passages come to mind?

As you can see, the Lent Course is a challenging and interesting way to journey through Lent – why not come along for one or both of the remaining sessions, here at our church, on 29 February and 14 March?

CIRCUIT NEWS

From the Superintendent

Friends, you have already put up with me as your superintendent for 6 months – God bless you for your patience and understanding whilst I find my way into this new role. I thought you might find it helpful to have a bit of a round-up of some of the interesting things which are happening in our group of churches. In particular it is important that everyone feels they know something about the things which are occupying the minds of our Circuit Meeting and our Leadership Team. I hope you will find this summary useful and will draw these themes into your prayers for all our churches.

From the Circuit Meeting

"What does the Circuit Meeting do?" It might not be the most important question on everyone's lips in our churches but it is worth asking! The Circuit Meeting has a lot of responsibilities for our property, finance and ministers – so much of our business is about giving permissions and allocating resources. More importantly the Circuit Meeting is the place to talk about the mission of the circuit to the local community. At the January Meeting we had two particularly interesting conversations about our work together.

The January Meeting began with a "Swop Shop". We broke into groups and made two lists from each of our churches – one of things we had in our church that other churches might want to "borrow" and the other list of things we needed in our own church which we thought others might be able to "lend" us. It wasn't a very scientific way of auditing the resources of our local churches but we had a fun conversation! One thing which came out of the "swop shop" quite clearly was that all our churches are looking for help and leadership in our work with children and young people. We will take up this theme in our Circuit Leadership Team and begin to think about what we might do better together as a circuit with our young people than we can do separately in our own churches. There have been suggestions before about a circuit youth worker/minister – such things are always possible but resources have to be found and that can be a struggle but not one we should shy away from. We cannot promise an answer to this difficult question but we will give it serious, prayerful and hopefully imaginative attention.

The Meeting was then joined by friends from the Korean Christian Fellowship based at Chessington Methodist Church. John Lee (one of our local preachers) gave a fascinating presentation on the story and the future vision of KCF. We broke into groups – with a friend from KCF (all of them young adults) joining in each conversation. KCF is currently an independent charity which has a partnership with the Circuit based at Chessington. A vision is beginning to emerge within KCF that it might become part of the Methodist Church in Britain - a Korean Speaking Congregation which is fully part of our circuit (though a congregation without its own building). This vision is for KCF to become the Methodist mission to the Korean speaking community in our Circuit and Borough. More than half the Korean speaking people in Britain live around New Malden (about 8% of the population of Royal Borough of Kingston). We have a real opportunity to develop a distinctive Methodist outreach to our Korean friends and neighbours.

This is quite a vision and quite a challenge. It would raise issues about ministry, staffing, finance and organisation as well as integration and diversity. There would be exciting opportunities as well as difficult questions. There will be no rush towards any kind of new formal relationship with KCF. We need more information and better understanding of our own vision and calling before making any firm decisions.

From the Circuit Leadership Team

The Circuit Leadership Team meets regularly to help the Circuit Meeting in guiding the Circuit. Like most Methodist meetings we have lots of "routine business" to do, so we will be spending some time away together in April to take a step back and look at the bigger picture. With pressure on our resources and membership which is declining slowly across the circuit we need to have a longer term vision for the mission of our circuit.

New Members at Chessington

We are happy to receive five members into the Kingston- Upon -Thames Circuit through Chessington Methodist Church. The Kingdom of God continues to grow and we warmly welcome our sisters as they take a step of faith to join the Methodist Church. It was such a happy occasion as the whole Circuit came together to receive them at our Circuit Service on 31st Jan. 2016 in the Chessington Methodist Church. May God bless and continue to work His purpose out in them.

Some of our new members are from the Korean Christian Fellowship and the number of KCF friends who have joint membership with Chessington Methodist Church continues to grow.

New Local Preacher

Jilly Bridges has now completed her local preacher training and is to be admitted as a local preacher with the joyful support of the Local Preachers Meeting and the Circuit Meeting. We have arranged Jilly's service of recognition for the evening of May 15th at Surbiton Hill (her home church). This is Pentecost Sunday and will be a wonderful occasion to celebrate the worship life of our churches and the contribution of all our Local Preachers.
