Message from Karl

March is one of the turning points of the year, as it witnesses two changes of season. The arrival of Spring brings with it longer, warmer and lighter days, and gardens and parks begin to show signs of new life emerging from the bleakness of Winter. Accompanying the shift in the weather this year – due to the

date of Easter – is the start of Lent on 6th March, with Ash Wednesday.

Lent is probably the most challenging season of the Christian year, which began back in December with Advent and the anticipation of the birth of Jesus, and culminates in June with the celebration of the birth of the Church at Pentecost. These six weeks of Lent form a time of self-examination and reflection, in which we're encouraged to invite God to ask us some hard questions. This may mean making changes in how we use our time, money and skills. It

could require saying sorry and seeking to make amends, or it might mean working for peace or challenging injustice. Either way, Lent isn't a season that leaves us unchanged.

Asking hard questions has been something of a theme of 2019 thus far, as the deadline for leaving the European Union on March 29th fast approaches. Whichever way you voted in the Referendum, and whatever your opinion on the way forward, what's inarguable is that the whole debate has raised contentious questions about the nature of British life. What kind of country are we, and where are we going? How we answer them will have a profound impact upon how things go for many years to come, and so it's a serious business.

Now, although we might not be sure how all this will pan out, what we do know is that there's a real need to bring people together and break down those things which divide us, one from another. The Church has a particular role to play, as we live as people reconciled to God in Christ Jesus, and are charged with furthering God's work of bringing life in all its fullness to not just all people, but to all of creation. Being rooted and grounded in love (Ephesians 3:17) gives us a firm foundation from which to undertake this kingdom-building work.

I would argue, therefore, that the season of Lent brings with it a greater urgency in 2019 than it has in some previous years. If we're to be a loving and non-anxious presence in the midst of a potentially very bumpy period, we will need to be sufficiently selfaware to be able to recognise our own trigger points, prejudices and shortcomings. When we can do this, we're far more likely to be able to bring people together, and to make a positive difference in our community. Just as Jesus had to honestly face up to his own sore spots and temptations in the wilderness, so we each need to allow God to take us on our equivalent journeys.

So, as we rejoice in the early signs of Spring breaking through, and begin this testing period of Lent, my prayer is that we might have the courage to stand honestly before God, so that in the presence of others, we might bring hope, peace and blessing here in New Malden.
