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Message from Karl

Greetings!

"In the last days it shall be, God declares, that I will pour out my Spirit upon all flesh ... then everyone who calls on the name of the Lord shall be saved" (Acts 2:17, 21). These words come from Peter's speech to the sceptical crowds, within a famous passage at the beginning of Acts. Following Jesus' crucifixion, the disciples were hiding in an upper room for fear of the authorities, when on the day of Pentecost, the Holy Spirit descended upon them with tongues of fire, transforming them from people cowering in the corner into disciples proclaiming the Gospel of Christ to all-comers.

This is a fascinating text from a biblical studies point of view, which is useful as I had to write a six-thousand-word essay on it at theological college! The quotation put into Peter's mouth comes from the prophet Joel, and referred to God's Spirit being poured

out upon all the people of Israel, as God's chosen people. However, Luke makes some subtle changes to the wording (we know which version of the Greek translation Old Testament was used, and hence can precisely pinpoint the edits) which massively

expands the scope of this prophecy. All the world, Jews and Gentiles alike, can call upon the name of the Lord and be saved, because of Christ's life, death and resurrection. The events of Pentecost, therefore, kick-started the process of the Gospel being proclaimed to all nations.

This year, the festival of Pentecost falls on the 20th of May, and the sanctuary will be decked out in red, to mark the coming of the Holy Spirit in flame and rushing wind, and thus the birth of the Church. On the same Sunday, we will also be having our Annual General Meeting, the main focus of which will be mission planning. It represents a great opportunity to hear about where my thinking is at, get an update on things like the rebranding of the coffee bar, and to contribute to shaping the direction of travel for the church over the coming year.

As we move forward as a community, the theme of renewal which pervades Pentecost Sunday is a great one for us to keep in mind. We're already doing some fantastic stuff to make connections with, and reach out to, the wider community of New Malden. Our location at the heart of the High Street gives us a launchpad from which to further develop our mission, and take risks for God which open up the potential for growth in all sorts of ways. God is nothing if not a God of surprises, and when we step out in faith, God honours that.

However, you don't need me to tell you that mission is also hard work. Receiving the Holy Spirit did not stop the early Church having to wrestle with some hard questions about its character, priorities, scope and survival in an often-hostile climate. Acts and Paul's letters reveal some of the conflict and arguments which took place. Moreover, while Luke

tends to focus on the 'successes' of Peter, Paul and so on, we also see some of their failures. Stepping out in faith means risking failure, which isn't something we're always very comfortable with in church life, but is part of the process of growth.

So, as we look to Pentecost, my invitation to you is to join me in prayerfully exploring the possibilities for renewal and growth here in New Malden.

Singing in care homes

A small group of singers has been singing on a regular basis at the White House Nursing Home for about 3 years now. We are repeatedly told by the Activities Coordinator there that we are very much appreciated, and the residents look forward to our visits. Certainly the number of participants has risen over the years, although of course we have sadly seen many individuals come and go over that time.

But we soldier on! Our repertoire is wide, ranging from folk songs that the older folk remember from their school days, through to classic songs of the 30s, 40s and 50s, interspersed with favourites from Musicals such as South Pacific, The Sound of Music and Oliver. We sing for about 45 minutes and then enjoy a cup of something together. It is a very jolly and convivial time, and it is good to see some people who would

otherwise be sitting in silence, joining in with a smile at recollected words and melodies.

Recently we were asked if we could go and sing some hymns at Speirs House, where a few of our members were residing. We did this on 3 occasions, including a Maundy Thursday Service, before Margaret Eccleshall , one of our most enthusiastic and appreciative supporters, sadly died. Monika Schaffer is moving out shortly, so Doug Bryan will be the only member of our congregation still there and able to participate. However, it has been very gratifying to see that a number of the other residents are very keen to take part in this activity, and we will be continuing it on a monthly basis as long as the need is there. We mostly take large- print hymn books and ask for requests, but from time to time we will add prayers and readings. The room was full on Maundy Thursday, and last week it was good to be able to follow this up with some Easter Hymns, and then sing Happy Birthday to Monika and share a beautifully decorated birthday cake with her. It is good to see what excellent progress she has made in recent months, and we are glad that she now feels able to move out into a flat where she will have support but also more independence. We also remembered Margaret at the start of the session by singing Make Me a Channel of Your Peace.

If you would like to join us on any occasion, we would welcome some additional support. You do not have to 'Sign up' for a regular commitment, neither do you have to have a particularly good voice.

We tend to stick to Thursdays: 10 am for the White House and 3 pm for Speirs House. Why not give it a try? Informal singing is very good for the brain and the soul, and although you might be surprised at how much you know already, words are provided. Please speak to Alison to get the next dates.

Moving Stories Conference: 20-22 July

The London District has arranged a conference under its "Moving Stories" initiative at which attendees will share stories, learn about migration, and be equipped to make a difference in their community. The conference will take place from 20-22 July in Hoddesdon, and the cost will be £60 for adults, £40 for children (under 16) and students, and it is free for under 5's. Volunteer Opportunity: Circuit Safeguarding Officer

The Circuit is seeking a new Safeguarding Officer from summer 2018. We are very grateful to Mike Bibby who has filled this role for several years and helped lead us through the transition to new and much stronger safeguarding arrangements. The Circuit Safeguarding Officer supports the Circuit in developing and implementing its safeguarding policy. The officer keeps records of appointments, DBS checks and safeguarding training for Circuit posts helps to co-ordinate our Circuit safeguarding training (we already have two qualified trainers within the Circuit), and ensures that we stay up to date with policy and procedures.

Training is available to support the role and there are regular District safeguarding conferences. The Methodist London District also has an employed part time Safeguarding Officer who supports the work of our Circuit and local safeguarding officers. Virtually all

our safeguarding administration is no "on line" and the safeguarding officer will need normal internet and email access.

This is a really vital role in the life of our Circuit and the support of all our local churches. We are absolutely committed to building safe spaces for everyone in all our churches. If you would like to know more or to explore volunteering please get in touch with Stan:

Keeping Your Information Safe

We live in a society where data is easy to store and easy to share - this helps us to communicate quickly and efficiently but it also brings an obligation for organisations to keep information safe. From the end of May new legislation about "Data Protection" comes into force and this affects all organisations and businesses - including our Circuit and Churches. Each local church is already working to make sure that the information we have is held properly and securely. The Circuit also holds data and must do the same. The change which affects most people is that we will need your explicit consent to include any names and contact details in the Circuit Directory (and your local Church directories). As we prepare the next Circuit Directory this summer those whose details are normally included will receive an email or a letter asking them to agree to their contact details being stored and included in the directory. Behind the scenes there is quite a lot of other work going on to make sure we are ready for the new legislation - our thanks to everyone in the Circuit and local churches who is helping with this.
