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Message from Reverend Karl

Greetings!

October brings with it the changing of the seasons, the beautiful autumn colours of the leaves upon the trees, and of course the harvest celebrations. In recent years, some have questioned whether it makes sense to continue to mark Harvest Festivals in urban churches, like ours, which are removed somewhat from the large-scale production and harvesting of food. It's true that, despite New Malden having a tame sheep for hire(!), the vast majority of us have little first-hand knowledge of agricultural and farming life. However, if anything, that gives us more reason, not less, to celebrate Harvest.

One of the consequences of living in urban environments can be that we rather 'lose touch' with the land, especially if we don't have the space or time to grow our own fruit or vegetables. Especially as we're used to having easy access to fresh food from across the world, we can forget the rhythms of the

seasons and the need to tend and care for the land. Harvest is important, therefore, as it provides us with a timely reminder of not just the productivity and potential of the earth, of which we are God's stewards, but its fragility and delicate balance.

For me, Greta Thunberg has been a real inspiration, not least because, in simply being herself as a young autistic woman, she blows apart many of the stereotypes of both effective leaders and climate activists. In highlighting the emergency facing our world, due to the well-documented and evidenced impact of human activity on global temperatures, she's reminded us of our obligation to take care of the planet – not simply for the benefit of future generations, important as that is, but because of the displacement, devastation and suffering already being experienced by some of the poorest nations.

Harvest is, therefore, much more than an opportunity to sing once-a-year hymns like 'We plough the fields and scatter'. It's a time to focus upon questions of environmental and social justice, which are bound together when we look at the impact of climate change and food insecurity. Turning closer to home, we'll be collecting for the Food Bank again this year, and that reminds us of how living within an affluent borough like Kingston upon Thames doesn't mean that everybody in our local community has enough food to eat, something that will only be made worse if supplies are disrupted at the end of this month, in the event of a 'no deal Brexit'.

All this may sound rather grim, but it's important that we both face the realities bound up with Harvest Festival services, and practice 'doing hope'. As Ann Morisy argues, it isn't enough for churches and others to simply talk about hope; instead, we need to show other folks (and perhaps ourselves) that hope in Christ is real, by putting hope into practice. Our God is a God of outrageous generosity, and overflowing love, who delights in abundance and in blessing. That's why so many of stories of Jesus feature over-the-top 'harvests' of bread, fish, crops, mustards seeds and so on.

So, may we use this harvest time to show that another way to be is possible, which holds at its core the infinite value God places on everything God has made, and which reflects the generosity of the One who became flesh in Jesus Christ, so that all might be blessed.

Around the Circuit

Circuit Staff – Developments

On September 10th the Circuit Meeting spent time prayerfully and carefully considering the future staffing of our Circuit. There were two main options – to carry on as we are with 2.5 ministers for our four churches or to change to 2 ministers plus additional lay staff.

There were four important outcomes from the meeting:

- Rev. Stan Brown has been invited to serve as Superintendent for a further two years (from 2020 to 2022)
- 2) Rev. Andy Clark has given formal notice that he wishes to move on in 2020 one year earlier than originally expected. There is strong support for Andy's ministry in the Circuit but also understanding that he and Liz need this opportunity to explore different kinds of ministry. We will therefore agree a "curtailment" with him. This is a mutual agreement between the minister and

Circuit allowing the minister to move on before the expected end of their appointment.

- 3) The Circuit Meeting voted by a small majority to continue with our current staffing of 2.5 ministers. We have prepared a "profile" which describes the work in the Circuit and at Chessington Methodist Church and have asked for a half-time minister to be stationed to the Circuit from 2020. We are unlikely to know the outcome of this until the New Year.
- 4) As it is uncertain whether a half-time minister will be available, we will continue to develop a "Plan B" to work with 2 ministers only from September 2020.

Methodist ministers normally come to a Circuit for an initial 5 year period which can then be extended by agreement. Rev Karl Rutlidge of course continues with us — his current period of "invitation" is due to end in 2022. Conversations about whether Karl wishes to stay longer in the Circuit would take place in 2021. Not forgetting of course Michael Axton — our Circuit Coordinator/Administrator who works on a normal employment contract.

I'd like to thank the Circuit for its continued support and prayers towards me and for the care and understanding extended to Andy and Liz as they explore new paths in ministry together.
