Message from Reverend Rutlidge

Greetings!

My name is Karl Rutlidge, and I'm very much looking forward to meeting you all when I arrive, along with my wife (Sally) and stepdaughter (Immy), in New Malden. For my first contribution to the church newsletter, I thought it would be useful to share ten things with you that hopefully begin to give some idea about what your new minister is like, so here goes:

- I'm originally from Preston, and my family still live in that neck of the woods. While I've since largely lost my Northern accent, I'm definitely a proud Lancashire lad.
- 2. Though I was baptised (by Steve Wild as it happens) as a baby, I didn't grow up in the Church. I became a Christian in my early twenties, after agreeing to go to an evening service primarily for the pizza afterwards, and unexpectedly meeting Jesus.

- 3. I got confirmed, and so made a public commitment to Christ, a week before graduating from Bath University and moving up to Durham to begin studying for my PhD in maths. The Bishop of Bath and Wells injured my knee during the service, but that's another story!
- Joining the Methodist student society in Durham enabled me to deepen my faith, and it was also there that I met and fell in love with Sally. We got married in 2013.
- 5. After leaving university, I moved to Milton Keynes, home of concrete cows and roundabouts. I worked for a high street bank for five years in back-office roles, firstly in mortgage credit risk and then in a team validating mathematical models.
- 6. I'm passionate about social justice, because there's no such thing as a person who doesn't matter to God, and my proudest achievement in my working life was helping persuade those in the hierarchy that the bank should become an accredited Living Wage employer.
- 7. I completed my local preacher training while in MK, and eventually ran out of excuses not to candidate. Having hoped someone at some point would tell me I was being silly, no-one did, and so for the last two years I've been training at the Queen's Foundation in Birmingham.

- 8. Theological college has been an immensely enriching experience, but alas also a fattening one, so encouragement to go to the gym more and eat less cake would be appreciated!
- I've been nurtured by worship at the more sacramental end of the scale, as well as the more contemporarystyle stuff, which is reflected in my style of leading services. I'm also committed to both ecumenism and building relationships beyond the doors of the Church.
- 10. Most importantly, though, encountering God in Christ has transformed my life in a myriad of ways, and I know from personal experience that following Jesus is the most exciting and life-giving thing anyone can do. I'm looking forward to working with you as together we share this Gospel of love and hope, through our words and actions, with those we meet.
