

#### **Message from Karl**

Back in March, I attended the Churches Together in England Forum, which takes place every three years and includes representatives from a wide range of churches and para-church organisations. It took place in Swanwick, at a retreat centre which apparently used to be a prisoner of war camp – make of that what you will! – but the focus was on unity and living well together even, or perhaps most especially, when we disagree. As we were reminded, unity and uniformity are not the same thing, but there are nonetheless important theological commitments we all share as Christians. It was against this backdrop that the Forum marked the 1700th anniversary of the formulation of the Nicene Creed, which is one of the great statements of the Church's faith and that emerged from the very first ecumenical council in 325 CE.

I found myself reflecting upon how we don't make much use of the Creeds in our worship in the Methodist Church these days, even though the later Nicene-Constantinopolitan Creed of 381 CE is included in the Holy Communion services in the Methodist Worship Book. Perhaps this is because most such services turn straight to the Prayer of Thanksgiving when we use the Worship Book, but do not tend to draw on the content preceding it. Maybe it is because there's something about standing together and proclaiming our shared faith that somehow makes us uncomfortable. Certainly, I know some people who would really struggle with being asked to do so, precisely because it can feel like the Creeds leave insufficient wriggle room for questions and for doubts.

With that in mind, it is important to note that although the Creeds were attempts to pin down what could be agreed upon by the earliest bishops – a real mixture of the privileged folk of the Roman Empire, people pushed to the margins of society who found their worth in Christ, survivors of brutal persecutions that took place just a few years before the conversion of Constantine made Christianity one of the official religions of the Empire, and others – they were never intended to be the last word on key questions such as the nature of Christ. As Rowan Williams puts it in his classic book 'Tokens of Trust', the Creeds are holding formulae that point, however imperfectly, to the experience of God in worship centred on the person of Jesus of Nazareth. In him, the early Church encountered the fullness of God in human form, and in particular discovered new life as they prayed together and shared in bread and wine.

I find it fascinating, particularly in the context of this season of Lent and the approach to Holy Week, that very little is said about the cross and atonement. We are simply told that Christ was crucified, died and was buried, before rising again three days later in accordance with the Scriptures. As was suggested during the discussions at the Churches Together in England Forum, the understanding of salvation which comes through appears to have been centred on the fact of the incarnation, of Jesus Christ being both fully God and fully human. To turn again to Williams, what is not assumed is not saved, and it matters that we are freed from the power of sin (both our own and the impact of the sins of others upon us) by one who shared our human nature, even as we cannot save ourselves and needed God to open up the path to redemption and new life. This is the focus in the Creeds, and it puts centuries of competing ideas about the cross into perspective.

There is much to be said, I think, for reflecting on both what is said in the Creeds and the silences they leave unfilled by words, perhaps wisely as none of our words can truly touch the heights and breadth and depth of God's nature as unceasing love. Perhaps recognising the latter in particular could help us as Methodists to get over the psychological barriers to embracing the Creeds in worship, because they are (at least in our modern contexts) not there to exclude those who doubt and question and wonder; if that were the case, meaningful faith would be impossible. Instead, they provide a scaffolding upon which to build, and invite us into the mystery of God's immense love for all creation. As we come to the foot of the cross and celebrate the resurrection, may we follow in the footsteps of our forebears and embrace that love with everything we've got.
