#### **Message from Karl**

Whatever else one might say about 2023, nobody can accuse it of being uneventful!

As a church community, we have dealt with the many trials and tribulations of the boiler project, seen a change in the Staff Team as we thanked Hilary for her contribution and welcomed Lee on board, enjoyed a range of music, craft and other activities which have enriched our life together, and even hosted a royal visit. We have said goodbye to old and dear friends, and experienced the joy of welcoming new people into the church family – not least young Holly, whose infectious smile throughout her baptism service was one of my highlights of the year.

On the wider stage, we have seen the terrible ongoing conflict in Ukraine and the unspeakable suffering being played out in Israel and Palestine, the Covid-19 inquiry seeking to learn the urgent lessons of the pandemic, and a cost-of-living crisis impacting so many across the country. Less seriously but still noteworthy, the death of Shane MacGowan means hearing his famous Christmas duet with Kirsty MacColl this Christmas is now somewhat more poignant than Fairytale of New York usually feels. Much of this reminds us of the fragility and preciousness of human life.

With this mixture of events and emotions, I find myself thinking of a line from O Little Town of Bethlehem, in which we sing of the birth of Jesus taking place in what at the time was one of the least significant small towns in one of the poorest parts of Israel. Chiming with the importance that Matthew's Gospel attaches to Bethlehem as the home of King David (see Matthew 2:6, which modifies Micah 5:2 to big up the status of the town), the greatest monarch the people of Israel had, Phillips Brooks' lyrics proclaim that, 'the hopes and fears of all the years are met in thee tonight'.

What does it mean to see the birth of a child in very modest circumstances to ordinary parents, in a backwater of the Roman Empire, as meeting with all of our hopes and fears across time and place? Well, there is so much one could say that it would take up several

editions of Spotlight by itself, but in light of the events of 2023, one of the most important is that by becoming one of us and sharing our life, God takes the risks of profound vulnerability and defenceless love to show us just how much we are valued. In the very person of Jesus, whether as a crying baby in Mary's arms or a grown man healing, teaching, liberating and suffering, we can touch and see and hear the reality of how each and every person matters infinitely to God.

It is upon this firm foundation that we can stand with all of our hopes and fears, questions and doubts, visions and dreams, joys and wonders. Whatever life throws at us - whether that is the everyday stuff like errant boilers and filling coffee bar rotas, or the darkest episodes to which the last few years have borne witness in our world – God is with us. That does not mean, like Jesus of Nazareth himself, we will never face hard times and tough challenges as well as hope and joy and contentment, because real life is a mixed bag. However, it does mean that God's outrageous and extravagant love is never exhausted, and we are always loved and valued.

So, when the bells ring out for Christmas Day and we later embark upon the adventures of 2024, may we place out trust in God, to whom we can bring all our hopes and fears this and every night.

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#### The Visit of His Majesty King Charles III

His Majesty The King visited the Royal Borough of Kingston on Wednesday 8<sup>th</sup> November 2023 to spend time in New Malden and meet the area's Korean community.

Large crowds gathered along New Malden High Street to give King Charles III a warm reception, pavements packed with people waving flags and cheering.

After spending time greeting the delighted crowd, which included local school children and families in traditional Korean dress, he was welcomed to New Malden Methodist Church. There he was met by the Mayor of Kingston, Cllr Diane White, Leader of Kingston Council Andreas Kirsch, the Korean Ambassador to the UK Yeocheol Yoon, New Malden's Korean councillors and a number of other dignitaries.

During a tour around the church His Majesty met community, faith and cultural groups and signed the visitors book for a new exhibition marking the 140th anniversary of UK-Korea diplomatic relations organised by the Korean British Cultural Exchange. He was then treated to a short musical performance by the London Korean Hummingbird Choir accompanied by a dance performance by local Korean dancer and choreographer Su young Park. He also visited a stall showcasing a selection of Korean specialities prepared by Chef Hyungsoo Yim.

The King was accompanied by Justina Jang (KBCE) to local business Cake and Bing Soo Cafe where he was presented with an Earl Grey flavoured birthday cake with 'Happy Birthday' in Korean, by the owners, Mr Jongsoon Kim and Mrs Soyoun Jun. He met some young people from the local Korean community, before making his way across the road to the New Malden War Memorial to meet members of the local Royal British Legion branch and two Korean Veterans.

New Malden's Korean community is one of the largest in Europe, the area is sometimes described as London's 'Koreatown'. Earlier this year the Royal Borough of Kingston became the first place in Europe to declare 22 November as 'Kimchi Day' to celebrate this special connection. People across the borough are immensely proud of its rich diversity and multiculturalism and the King's visit was a wonderful way to enhance the celebrations of the central role Korean communities play in the cultural life of Kingston.

The atmosphere in the Church was very relaxed and Karl chatted to him for some minutes when he was presented as was part of the faith group.

#### The bells, the bells!

Advent got off to a very tuneful start in New Malden when St Lawrence Chobham Handbell Ringers regaled us with a fabulous concert in the evening of 27th November. Numbering around a dozen players and each with multiple bells making a range of 2 octaves give or take, the group took us through some festive favourites, the later numbers with some with some audience participation. Tim Willetts, the music director, correctly sussed out that knowledge of handbells did not run deep in the audience (though Mick and Gloria had seen some in St Louis) so many nuggets were forthcoming, some of which I fully expect to crop up on University Challenge shortly:

- 1. The bells were cast at the same foundry as Big Ben in Whitechapel.
- 2. Their design is largely unchanged over the years and incorporates a clever spring mechanism to stop the bell ringing whenever it's moved (clearly this is a good idea).
- 3. Some of the players also had chimes, which are the same pitch as bells but softer, more muted thus adding to the complexities of the timbre.
- 4. Some of the arrangements might have sounded familiar because they included tower peals aka what you might hear church bells do.
- 5. Handbell ringing is popular across the world thanks to the...er...British Empire, and the work of missionaries.

I don't know if it was the red shirts of the players combined with the sound of bells but I was transported back to my one and only winter trip to Switzerland so it seemed appropriate to end with a hot drink and something sweet to eat – Wesleyan punch and a mince pie it was. A very enjoyable evening was had by all, I think.

We have been running our Bereavement Café here at NMMC for over three years now and have welcomed and listened to many guests during that time. Some have needed our services for only one or two visits, others have come back again and again because they find it helpful to be with other bereaved people in the safe space that we offer every month. Some hear about us from Princess Alice Hospice in Esher or from Coop Funeralcare in the High Street, others see our flyers in Wesley's and a few just happen to be passing while the Bereavement Café is on and see the welcome poster in the window, guided to us by God in answer to our prayers and theirs.

Are you bereaved and struggling? You are not alone. I recall one afternoon when one of our guests said that his brother had died and another guest said, "So has mine." Of course no two bereavements are the same but this kind of connection can really help people. Do you know someone who might need us? Why not pass on one of our flyers letting them know when we meet and what we offer. We also have a new leaflet "Coping with



Christmas" which highlights many of the challenges bereaved people face at Christmas time when expectations are so high and merriment seems to be required. Both of these can be found under the Wesley's welcome board. This link also covers much of the same material:



# Week of Prayer for Christian Unity 2024 - Go and do likewise

Reflections on the story of the Good Samaritan have been prepared by an ecumenical team in Burkina Faso in Africa for use from 18 to 25 January.

The Week of Prayer for Christian Unity (WPCU) takes place each year from the 18 to 25 January. This special week provides an opportunity to focus our prayers on Christian unity, as well as speak about and experience Christian unity personally, in our village, town or county as well as engage with what happens at a national level.



This year the theme has come from an ecumenical team from Burkina Faso, facilitated by the local Chemin Neuf Community (CCN). They have reflected on the familiar story of the Good Samaritan, and all are encouraged to Go and do likewise. It is a story about crossing boundaries that calls our attention to the bonds that unite the whole human family. Brothers and sisters from the Catholic Archdiocese of Ouagadougou, Protestant Churches, ecumenical bodies and the CCN in Burkina Faso collaborated generously in drafting the prayers and reflections.

An ecumenical group of writers brought together by Churches Together in Britain and Ireland, including Doral Hayes from CTE, have created additional resources to encourage reflection in the British and Irish context. The resources include daily reflections, a suggested service outline, an all-age service and customisable posters.

#### **Recipes from Barbara Cavalier**

Anyone who has had the joy of eating any of Barbara's baking will be thrilled to have a couple of her recipes.

#### **Last Minute Christmas Mincemeat Cake**

Grease and line with grease proof/ baking parchment the sides and bottom of a 20cm (8inch) round cake tin. Heat oven to 170C/ 325F/Gas 3/ 150C fan

450g (1lb) good quality mincemeat

225g (8oz) wholemeal flour

3 level tsp baking powder

150g (5oz) dark brown sugar

150g (5oz) softened butter or soft margarine

175g (6oz) mixed dried fruit

50g (2oz) walnuts, chopped

grated zest of 1 small orange

grated zest of 1 small lemon

3 eggs (size 1 or 2)

If you don't want to ice the cake you could place 140g whole blanched almonds across the top before baking the cake.

Use the bowl of a large mixer, or a large mixing bowl to use an electric hand whisk or a wooden spoon.

Give the flour an airing through a sieve into the mixing bowl, then add the bran back into the bowl. Place the other ingredients in the bowl, just break the eggs in, no need to beat first.

Mix together thoroughly, it will take longer with a wooden spoon.

Spoon the mix evenly into the prepared tin, level the surface, if using almonds arrange them over the top.

Bake the cake for about 1hr 30mins or until the centre springs back when lightly touched. Let cool in the tin for 30mins before turning out on to a wire rack to finish cooling. Then wrap in grease proof and put in a tin.

#### **NOTES**

It is important to use a good quality mincemeat, as cheaper brands can be too wet. The cooking time can vary between ovens some could take 2hrs. It is important to use the gentle press to the centre with your finger, if it is firm and springy and no impression is left, it is done.

If you have to leave in the oven for longer, cover loosely with a square of foil, to prevent the cake becoming too dark on the top.

If the cake is being kept, it can be fed with brandy weekly. Pierce the bottom with a fine skewer several times and then feed with 1 tablespoon of brandy. Re wrap.

#### **Microwave Muffins**

Serves 1

1 egg

2 tsp extra virgin olive oil or 1 knob of butter

50g ground almonds

1/2 tsp baking powder

1/2 tsp vanilla extract

1/2 apple or pear, grated

In a bowl whisk the egg, add the oil and mix together with a spoon Add the other ingredients and stir well Spoon into a mug Microwave on full for 3 minutes

**VARIATION** 

Add to the recipe:

1tsp cocoa powder, 1/2 tsp vanilla extract, and pieces of 90 per cent dark chocolate


#### **SAVOURY**
