Message from Karl

One of the things I have enjoyed and found helpful in my time ministering in the Circuit has been meeting with ecumenical colleagues working in the same area. In that vein, it was good to meet up with Lesley Charlton from Kingston United Reformed Church recently, and to talk about the challenges and joys of serving in this borough right now. Both of us agreed that the present situation – with the cost-of-living crisis, industrial unrest across a variety of sectors, and uncertainty about the future – is taking its toll on many people. Together with the after-effects of the Covid-19 pandemic still working themselves out, it is not surprising that we have both heard several people express that they feel like their spiritual and emotional batteries are running low right now.

When we feel tired out by the circumstances we face – by which I mean deep tiredness, which is more than simply needing to catch up on sleep – it is harder to be patient with one another, and the temptation to just shut the world out and hunker down can become significant. Being situated on the High Street has lots of advantages, but can also mean we face significant pastoral demands which are not always comfortable or straightforward to manage, and that becomes even harder when our energy levels are low and those demands are acute.

I am hugely grateful for the care various people in the church community have shown to some of our Wesley's guests and those who have dropped in during these past few weeks. One of our strengths as a church is the warmth of our welcome and compassion for others. However, in the midst of this, it is also crucial that we look after ourselves; after all, if we do not take care of our own wellbeing and put good boundaries in place, we cannot help other people.

So, in this month of February – and with the awareness that Lent is fast approaching – I'd like to invite you to make some time to recharge your own spiritual batteries.

What helps you to recharge and reenergise when you feel drained? For some of you, that might mean something structured like a retreat or a quiet day. It could be about getting away for a bit and having a change of scenery, even if it is just for one day, so that our minds and souls can have space just to be, rather than pondering what needs to be done next. Perhaps meeting with friends or pursuing a hobby is what helps you, or maybe even just snatching a few minutes of quiet with a cup of tea during the day that is simply your time, set aside simply for you.

Jesus was someone who was used to constant and acute demands being placed upon him, and so it is not surprising that the Gospels show him taking time out simply to be with God and to recharge his own spiritual batteries. He knew that if he didn't make space to focus on what mattered most, he would not be able to fulfil his calling to be the salt of the earth and the light of the world. The same is true for us, and it is good to remind ourselves every so often that Jesus invites us to come to him when we feel weary and/or weighed down by heavy burdens, for he offers us rest and refreshment (Matthew 11:28 – 30).

And so, in whatever helps you find that deep rest, I pray that this February, you will have the time to simply be, and to rest in the presence of God in Jesus.

Update on the Church Heating

Peter Bullett presented the following update to the Church Council on 22nd January. Replacement of the Church Boilers

- We have now received two quotations for the replacement of the church boilers.
 - disparate in cost, flue solution and building works
 - both are for condensing, gas boilers
- Given
- large capital expenditure
- possible changes in government regulation encouraging electrical and carbon-neutral energy sources
- implications for improving the energy efficiency of our premises
- We have decided to obtain the services of an independent heating-services consultant to:
 - analyse all aspects of our heating system
 - measure the thermal efficiency of spaces
 - make recommendations, including possible phasing if appropriate
 - draw up a tender specification
 - scrutinise the quotations and identify the most suitable
 - supervise the work and sign-off the installation

Circuit News

A letter of introduction from Rev Vindra Maraj-Ogden who will follow Stan as our superintendent minister and minister for SHMC in September 2023, subject to confirmation by the Methodist Conference.

Dear Friends,

I hope that you had a lovely Christmas and I take this opportunity to wish you a happy and healthy 2023! I am excited to be joining you in September 2023 and thought that it might be useful to share a little bit about who I am.

I was born and raised in the Caribbean island of Trinidad, educated at a convent school and I did my first degree in Business Management at the University of the West Indies. I came to the UK in my early twenties to complete my chartered accountancy exams, subsequently got married and stayed in the UK. I have now lived here



longer than I have in Trinidad and am comfortable in both cultures.

If pushed, I would say that my background is Asian Caribbean, and therein lies a story. In 1838, when slavery ended in the Caribbean the former slave population refused to work on the sugar cane plantations. In the UK, because Trinidad was a British colony (until 1962), it was decided to get indentured immigrants from India who would be indentured for a five-year period. This was an experiment to be tried in two islands, Trinidad and Guyana. The first Indian immigrants arrived in 1845 and they stayed, eventually starting small businesses and recognising the value of education, making huge sacrifices to educate their children. I am fifth generation and the only language I speak is English. My parents and younger brother and his family live in Trinidad and I visit regularly.

The only family that I have in the UK is my son Tim and my niece Vandita who is doing her Masters at Leeds University. Whilst both my nephews have attended UK universities, they have returned to live and work in Trinidad. So really the only blood family is Tim. He is 29 and works in Information Technology.

That being said, I am truly blessed by my church family. I did not become a disciple of Jesus until my mid-twenties. My family is not Christian and my only experience of Methodism is the British Connexion. Many stories of that adventure into faith will be shared in sermons, the joys and the heartaches. There are many people who have journeyed with me to this point, friends from the Wembley Methodist Circuit, where I discovered the Methodist church, to my first appointment in South Bedfordshire, then West Hertfordshire, Queenswood School and indeed my friends from my ecumenical training college. I feel well supported and accepted. I also have many friends who are not Christians and they are also very special to me.

I have enjoyed my time as a chaplain and learnt so much, but increasingly over the last 18 months, I have felt God's urging to return to circuit ministry and to use my gifts. I hope that together, in these challenging times, we can continue to prayerfully discern how best to serve God in the communities where we live and work.

I love reading, walking, going to the theatre and the cinema. I am completely content bingewatching Netflix and will make time to meet up with friends. I also like the ballet and opera. My favourite opera is Aida, but I am no expert. I just know what I like.

From memory, in 2011, I was in the stationing process and Kingston and New Malden were looking for a minister. It was my number one choice. The month before, Tim's dad had been diagnosed with Stage 4 lung cancer and he lived in Wembley. I did not put you on my list but opted for Hemel Hempstead instead as it was only twenty minutes away and I could support him. He sadly died after 13 months on the morning of my welcome service to the West Herts Methodist Circuit. Yes, I did attend the welcome service and Tim and I were wonderfully supported by the coach load of people who came from the South Beds Circuit. I had a God moment when I looked at the stationing profiles in November 2022 and there was Kingston, albeit a Superintendency role. You were very much on my list and I am grateful to God that we have been matched. I know that there will be challenges ahead but I am so excited to come to this circuit, to get to know you and to work together. I leave you with the words of Mary, having been told that she would bear the Christ child, "Here am I, the servant of the Lord; let it be with me according to your word". I am holding the churches in the circuit in my prayers.
