

Message from Karl

We hear a lot these days about Artificial Intelligence (AI), and its potential for improving our lives. In particular, there are some who see it as the catalyst to economic growth, even as concerns about human beings being replaced by machines, and meeting the challenges of re-skilling people whose current roles become redundant, are very real. Watching a programme about AI showed a somewhat dystopian vision of the future, with even ministers being replaced by robots designed to trot out platitudes and a pre-written blessing in place of clergy. Now, while some might consider this an improvement(!), I think there is still something to be said for human beings.

As we read the Gospel accounts of the stories of Jesus, one thing which comes through time and again is the way Jesus was moved to act by empathy, compassion and care. We see this when he meets people in desperate need of healing and who are seeking wholeness, as well as when confronted with large crowds of directionless and anxious people, acting like sheep without a shepherd. Perhaps most movingly of all, we find Jesus weeping at the tomb of his good friend, Lazarus, when faced with the stark reality of his death. Perhaps because of the way we read the Scriptures in church primarily for clarity of hearing, we don't always get the full force of the emotion present, but it is there and is key.

Part of the reason for developing AI is to mirror, if not surpass, the human brain in problemsolving and creativity. However, one thing that differentiates the two is the centrality of emotion. Research with people who have experienced brain damage has provided some fascinating insights into how the mind works, and in particular, on the importance of emotion in enabling us to act. I remember reading about a sample of folk who had been left unable to feel any emotion following accidents or illnesses that had impacted their brains, even as they could still rationally see and describe what might be required in a given situation. The lack of emotional impetus rendered them unable to take that action, however; it wasn't that they did not care, but feeling was the crucial bit of the jigsaw that was missing. We are a complex mixture of thoughts, feelings, genetics, environmental factors and impulses we cannot always understand, and indeed some claim that our knowledge of the brain is still less than what we know about the dark side of the Moon. Now, whether or not that is true, it seems to me that there are some things machines will never be able to do as well as a human being, as much as they do already have great potential to improve our lives and make things easier. I cannot deny being impressed with the summary of a recent Zoom meeting that its AI produced for me, and with a bit of tweaking, I could probably have passed off the words of Microsoft Office's AI as my own and saved myself the time it took to type this. Yet, our capacity to love one another, to have empathy and care, to be moved by beauty and kindness, to cheer with those who cheer and weep with those who weep, cannot be replicated by a piece of machine coding, however sophisticated. Alexa is great, but she cannot give us a hug or sit with us when we need a friend.

I suppose the upshot of all this is that we need to recognise the value of these things, so often taken for granted and overlooked. In these troubling times, in which we see 'Christian' pastors genuinely appalled at the idea that someone might act with empathy and ask for mercy for the vulnerable and marginalised, we risk losing some of the very humanity that is God's great gift to us. Our capacity to feel and be moved, to be motivated to act, to embrace the care and compassion modelled by Jesus in our own lives, is precious. The Enlightenment of the 18th and 19th centuries emphasised our capacity for rational thought, and that is obviously important, but so is our ability to feel, and we should not undervalue the emotion without which we are stuck.

May we embrace the fullness of who we are, then, so that there might be that bit more love in our world, and others might catch a glimpse of God's infinite care for them.

Kingston Churches Against Homeless Night Shelter

KCAH will aim to open the Winter Night Shelter from 6th January 2025.

Running for 3 months, we will offer a place of sanctuary, safety and warmth for those who may otherwise have to rough sleep.

We need volunteers to get involved to ensure we can provide the safe space for those that need it. If you are not in a position to sign up, please support us by sharing this ask far and wide. We are also recruiting additional paid staff, if you or someone you know would like to apply please see our website for more details (kcah.org.uk).

This winter we are offering space for up to 30 people, twice as many as last year and a direct response to the demand. To enable this we have been fortunate to have support

from the Local Authority and a local landlord of a currently disused space in the centre of Kingston.

This past year we have seen a record number of new approaches to KCAH, of those that find themselves in a situation beyond their control and face homelessness or significant financial hardship.

Sleeping rough and homelessness has become normalised and yet there is nothing normal about being homeless in a modern, wealthy society. Please help us to intervene in the local issue by sharing this email or signing up to volunteer. Thank you.

William Walker saves Winchester Cathedral

I can thoroughly recommend a trip to Winchester for an excellent day out. We went on one of the many extremely wet days we've had this month and so spent a lot of time in the cathedral. We were fortunate to have an excellent guide all to ourselves so were able to ask plenty of questions and exploit her extensive knowledge. (Incidentally, we also had lunch at The Ivy and were surprised to find you could get out of there for under £25 for 2 courses, including service but no vegetables.)

All History is here, of course, but amidst the Saxon remains and the Norman architecture, the Elizabethan mortuary chests and the ravages and restoration of the Civil War, nestling amongst the better-known names of King Alfred, King Canute, Saint Swithin and Jane

Austen is a statue to one William Walker, a deep-water diver whose name will be forever associated with the continued existence of this great cathedral.

Winchester is built on a very high water table, partly as a result of early settlers diverting the River Itchen to give themselves more land to build on. The land is peat and although the foundations



of thousands of beech trees held up the cathedral for hundreds of years, cracks had started to appear in the walls by the turn of the 19/20th centuries. It was clear the building was listing to one side – sinking into the peat and in danger of collapse.



To enable bricklayers to build supporting walls, the groundwater had to be lowered. Without intervention, the removal of the groundwater would have caused the building's collapse. So to give temporary support to the foundation walls, 235 pits were dug along the Southern and Eastern sides, each about 6 metres deep. Walker went down under the water in full diving gear and shored up the walls by removing the peat, handful by handful, and setting concrete underneath them. He worked 6 hours a day, alone in complete darkness, with air being hand-pumped to him from the surface, for five and a half years from 1906-1911. He would take a lunch break above ground, removing only his helmet, and smoke a pipe which he thought might help protect him from whatever germ-ridden horrors might be lurking beneath the waters.... bones and bodies at the least.

After Walker finished his painstaking work, the water could be pumped out and the concrete bore the weight of the foundation walls. There are some quite staggering statistics here: He used 25,800 bags of concrete, 114,900 concrete blocks and 900,000 bricks. He was honoured for his amazing dedication and achievement by being awarded the MVO, and by a special service of Thanksgiving in the Cathedral where he was presented

with a rose bowl by their Majesties King George V and Queen Mary. (This was their second encounter; see below.)

He is supposed to have said that the work was not difficult but had to be done carefully. His chief reward was the knowledge that he had almost single-handedly saved the fabric and unique heritage of this fascinating building for generations to come. He certainly caught my imagination and we will definitely be going back. The Gift shop was shut by the time we emerged from this very special place to view William Walker's second statue in the Cathedral garden.

More interesting facts about William Walker's life:

- He was also involved in work on the Blackwall tunnel 1891-97 and was Foreman on the construction of the new naval docks in Gibraltar.
- He did important work on developing linear decompression tables. Water pressure was the main problem facing underwater divers and many died in their work. (Ask a physicist.)
- He was diving instructor to George V when the latter was a naval cadet.
- At some points during his Winchester work he cycled the 70 miles home to South Norwood at the weekends, returning by train on the Monday.
- Perhaps somewhat ironically, William Walker died in the Spanish flu outbreak of 1918.

Protect your house from being stolen

In recent years there have been a few reports of people arriving home from holiday, or a long stay away, to find their house occupied by someone else who claims to have recently bought it. On calling the police, the police find that the occupier is named on the Land Registry as the legal owner of the property. This unfortunate situation seems to arise from

a fraudulent identity theft but the Land Registry offers a free service that can help prevent the transfer of house ownership. This is called HM Land Registry's Property Alert service. If you ask for the service, you need to give them your name and address and the Title number of your house; the registry then monitors the title number and notifies you of any enquiries or changes to the entry on the register.

If you receive cards and letters through the post, could you save the stamps to send to us? We will recycle them into much-needed funds for our services, such as our Letter from Santa in accessible formats for children with vision impairment to help them feel included at Christmas.

How stamps make a difference

By collecting stamps you're helping to break down the barriers that stop people with sight loss living life to the full. We accept all stamps: new or used, first or second class, foreign, first day covers, presentation packs or albums. Stamps are sold by weight and we raise £20 per kilogram of stamps, so it's a brilliant way to raise money.

This is just a reminder that we have a collection box in Wesley's (to the left of the pigeonholes) so you can bring your stamps in and when the box is full, I will send them off to the RNIB.

For stamps to be worth anything to the RNIB it is really important that they are not damaged in any way, so, don't try peeling the stamp off the envelope, leave it on and cut around it leaving at least a 1cm margin around all sides.
