Message from Karl

Greetings!

The month of May brings with it the opportunity to really get stuck into the Easter season, which will continue until June 5th when we celebrate the birthday of the Church at Pentecost. During this period, we will encounter various stories of the risen Jesus meeting with his disciples, and perhaps the most powerful of these saw Peter reconciled to Jesus. After an unexpected breakfast on the beach, each of his denials on Maundy Thursday were met not with



condemnation, but with the calling to shepherd God's people. It's a good example of how words have the power to hurt, and to heal.

Consequently, what we say to those with whom we disagree on matters political makes a difference, as does what we say about those who are different to us, especially in terms of ethnicity and religion. When we divide people into 'them' and 'us', we run the serious risk of dehumanising the other person and sowing the seeds of further division. However, it doesn't have to be this way; embracing Christ's resurrection invites us to engage with a larger perspective, in which those distinctions we often hold onto are put into proper perspective (Galatians 3:28).

The last person to encounter the risen Jesus before his ascension was Paul, and looking at the early churches he founded, arguments over how Jewish and Gentile Christians were to worship together, and form a common community, were complex and heated. Yet, although Paul and Peter profoundly disagreed on many such matters, they did still meet and discuss things together (Acts 15:2). Though the issues that our nation is split on today are different in form, some of those same questions about integration, living with difference and cultural misunderstanding underpin them.

The resurrection offers us a fresh lens through which to view the current state of affairs. The imagery of the Body of Christ reminds us that we can't just cut others off because we disagree with them, or because they're different to us (1 Corinthians 12:21). That doesn't mean that anything goes; racism and other forms of hate have no place in the Methodist Church. What it does mean is that as God's people in this place, we have a responsibility to use our words in ways which seek to heal, and bring about reconciliation, rather than stoking further mistrust and hurts.

So, let us pray that we might we have the courage to engage in this costly work, the resilience we'll need when conflicts arise, and the wisdom to know when it's best to walk away. May our words heal and set others free to know the reconciling love of God, and may the common humanity which holds us together in this diverse community in New Malden be affirmed.


Tools with a Mission

Like many people when life changes maybe because of death, moving or downsizing we have to make decisions as to what we need, what we want to keep and what we want to get rid of.

The latter is relevant to me, and the time has arrived to really sort out the garage. I basically want to keep it for my car and gardening materials.

We came to Burford Road in 1969 in the age when Maurice had to be able to totally service our car, carry out plumbing and electrical needs and of course do all the decorating. This meant that over the years he accumulated many tools as well as inheriting everything you need for decorating from his father, a painter and decorator by profession. As you can guess I will not be using any of these. I have a drawer now containing all that I need.

This is where TWAM, Tools With A Mission came to my rescue. A charity empowering people with the tools that create livelihoods and transform lives. A short Email to the local Representative Philip Smith

living in Surbiton resulted in him coming a week later to see my collection. I laid out all I had on my garden bench and on a table. Many of the tools I did not know how they would be used, especially the car tools. I have to say too, they looked a sorry lot old and rusty including ten saws. Philip took one look and said "Amazing I will take the lot"!

The tools will be cleaned and sharpened where needed and then shipped out to countries in Africa. Last year they sent 19 containers and the dream for this year is 26.

I felt I had to write about the Charity as there maybe some of you in my position. Thank you Julie and Gloria for helping me find TWAM. A leaflet will be on our notice board.

If you Google the charity you will get all the info you need, including local collection information.

Finally I also had 19 litres of old tins containing emulsion and gloss paint. These cannot be taken to the Kingston dump. They have to be dealt with the by the City of London Corporation Hazardous Waste Collection and Disposal Service 020 7332 4971. If you are living in a London Borough the collection is free. The wait for pickup is about a fortnight. The tins do have to be packed in a lidded and labelled box. Stella

Best Places to Live 2022

In a recent article in the Sunday Times, New Malden was named as one of the best places to live in outer London. Here is an extract:

NEW MALDEN O

Thanks to Squid Game, Parasite and BTS, Korean culture is all the rage, but New Malden has been loving it for decades. An estimated 20,000 Koreans live in and around this suburb on the southwest fringes of the capital - there are more than a dozen Korean restaurants and shops on the high street alone. Foodies queue for up to an hour for the £25 all-you-can-eat barbecue at K-Town, and the kitchen at Han played a starring role in series three of Killing Eve.

Why New Malden? No one knows for sure, but the national K-pop competition was held in nearby Kingston upon Thames in the autumn, you can make kimchi at the Kimjang festival or hone your self-defence skills at a martial arts academy. The South Korean ambassador's former residence is off leafy Coombe Lane West, and Samsung set up its UK headquarters here in

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1980. Whatever the reason, the Korean community is woven into the area's fabric - it raised £22,000 for Kingston Hospital during the pandemic.

K-prop(erty) is also big here. Beyond the bibimbap and bingsoo, New Malden ticks plenty of househunting boxes: Waitrose on the high street, superior state schools (the Tiffin grammars in nearby Kingston are among the best secondaries in the country), direct trains to central London (Clapham Junction (14 minutes) and period family homes for those priced out of Wimbledon or Putney. Richmond Park, Wimbledon Common and Bushy Park are an easy drive or cycle away, and you can walk the dog at the Green Lane Recreation Ground or by the Hogsmill River.

New Malden's main drag is short on period charm, but long on delicious Korean food: restaurants to trý include Chick and Beers, Tongdak, Imone and Tree Stone, where you can choose your barbecue meat at the butcher's next door. And if you're inspired, you can pick up ingredients at Seoul Plaza and H Mart. **Best place to live if...** Your exercise regime includes regular workouts for your tastebuds.
