

Message from Karl

Each month, I try to think of something sensible to say, but right now, the honest truth is I feel much too overwhelmed.

Following the Supreme Court judgement about the meaning of 'sex' in the Equality Act 2010, and the announcement from the head of the Equalities and Human Rights Commission (EHRC) on 17th April that trans people will soon be forced out of any gendered space, from hospital wards to toilets in cafes, it feels like my life has suddenly been turned completely upside down.

Despite the Court's judgement not mandating the automatic exclusion of trans people from spaces we have been using for decades without issue, the Labour government has decided to go much further and take this route. Thus, when the Equality Act Statutory Guidance is updated shortly, as a trans man, I will not be able to access facilities I have been using for years without issue, such as public toilets, making it extremely hard to live a normal life in the UK.

The only thing I can compare this to right now is the overwhelming rollercoaster of grief when my mother had her brain haemorrhage. When we see stories about this in the media, with anti-trans campaigners toasting with champagne and children's authors puffing on cigars like wanabee Andrew Tates, it is so easy to forget that the impact is on real human beings, made in the image and likeness of God, like me, who do not have anything like the same platform, power or influence.

I therefore will just leave you with this poem by Pastor Martin Niemoller, which in the midst of this – and seeing innocent people imprisoned in brutal prisons in El Salvador without trial, even when the Supreme Court in the USA unanimously rules they should be brought home – feels apt. Please pray for me, for wisdom as to where my future now lies, and for all trans people (especially trans women who cannot readily go under the radar) who are frightened and hurting right now. If you would like to know what else might be done, please come and have a chat with me.

Plus we go to a well-stocked library in the local café, so I can always find something I haven't read B4! However, I do keep my fingers flexed – don't intend my hand joints to seize up!".
