

Message from Karl

Some things seem sent to try our patience!

At the time of writing, I am waiting for the transfer of my work e-mails from the old system onto the new, which I do not doubt will be a significant improvement. However, not having access to either my contacts list or previously stored messages is a little frustrating, as it means simple tasks take longer. It feels like being in a strange kind of limbo, albeit a very minor one in the grand scheme of things; not knowing quite when things will be sorted out does not help. I am reminded of a t-shirt I used to own which said, 'God, please give me patience, but make it quick!'.

When we look at the conflicts raging across the world at present – most notably, but sadly far from limited to, those in the Middle East and between Ukraine and Russia – it is tempting to join in with the cry of the Psalmist: how long, O Lord, do we have to wait for peace to come? In November, we pause to remember those who have fought in the many conflicts since the Great War, which was meant to be the 'war to end all wars', and this year we recall the D-Day landings in 1944. Eighty years since Allied troops landed on the beaches of Normandy, destined to put an end to the tyranny and horror of the Nazi regime, our world still seems very far from finally putting darkness and evil to bed. How much longer will we have to wait for peace to come?

True peace, as the Bible shows us it, is not merely about the absence of military conflict. That would, of course, be a good start; however, the vision of Shalom to which the Scriptures point is one in which all people are enabled to flourish, and the value of all creation is respected. When the Kingdom of God comes in all its fullness, we are promised there will be no more tears, suffering and pain (Revelation 21). In the meantime, we are in that waiting place, that painful limbo in which we know the ultimate direction of travel but have no idea when we will get there. Jesus does little to ease our discomfort, by pointing out that we cannot know the date and time of God's final setting right of all things (see, for example, Mark 13). Our job is to get ready. To be ready for peace to come means making a start in the here-and-now. How we relate to one another matters, because it says something about the value we believe we and others have. My uncle is a veteran who served in the Army in Northern Ireland in the 1980s and 1990s, before the Good Friday Agreement and thus amid some of the worst years of the Troubles. I know he really struggles with knowing how badly some veterans have been treated, and especially about a lack of adequate mental health provision which too often results in addiction and homelessness issues. Where we disagree is that addressing this means we should turn our backs on refugees, on those displaced by conflict, climate change, prejudice and crippling poverty. Compassion is not like pie, and there is no limit on how much love there is to go around in a world which only exists in the first place because of the inexhaustible love of God.

Some of the most profound tensions in our society are exacerbated by groups of people being pitted against one another, by those whom it benefits to sow division. We therefore see, for example, veterans being set against refugees, pensioners against public sector workers, people in work against disabled people who cannot work, trans people against women, Muslims against seemingly everyone else, and so forth. These divisions keep ordinary people angry with one another, and serve to distract from how deeply unequal our society is. It is abhorrent that those who are already wealthy continue to get even richer while so many do not have enough to eat, a decent and secure home, or enough money to not worry about putting on the heating in winter.

True peace will not come to pass when injustices like this are allowed to fester, and getting ready for it means challenging divide-and-rule narratives. It means valuing in material terms every single person, as there is simply no such thing as a human being who does not matter to God. Society will continue to be divided if we refuse to address rampant inequality, and the stacking of the system in favour of those who can afford to shower politicians with freebies in return for access to and a voice in the corridors of power. Wars will continue to rage while those in power do not recognise the equal value of Palestinians and Israelis, and cannot even bring themselves to condemn the burning alive of displaced people in tents seeking shelter in Gaza. The sacrifices of armed forces personnel, then and now, will not be truly respected while international law is rendered meaningless by inaction in the face of war crimes and genocidal actions.

Friends, if we want to see peace, we cannot sit idly in this time of limbo. We need to actively seek peace by using our voices to speak up for the voiceless, and by learning to see others as God does, as infinitely valuable. Getting ready for peace is hard, but nobody said authentic discipleship would be easy. The Church is called by God to be an agent of reconciliation and peace, to break down barriers between people and embody the peace Jesus himself came to bring. May we have the courage to do so, even when the waiting and the longing feels agonising; after all, if not now, then when?

Chichester Cathedral's Font

Malden Camera Club had a weekend away in Chichester in early October. During a visit to Chichester Cathedral Alan Vincent took this photograph of the font designed by John Skelton and installed in the Cathedral's Baptistry in 1983. The font is a marvel of artistry and craftsmanship carved from 180 cubic feet of exquisite green stone from Polyphant Quarry in Cornwall. The selection of the stone's colour and the copper bowl lining the font were specifically chosen to complement the adjacent painting "The Baptism of Christ" by Hans Feibusch on the west wall. The words around the font, "One Lord, One Faith, One Baptism," are from Ephesians 4:5. (Information from the Cathedral web site)

Beverley Brook

A few weeks ago we found ourselves with a free Saturday and put it to good use walking the length of Beverley Brook*. We'd done something similar with the Hogsmill in lockdown and enjoyed our lunch in Bourne hall park surrounded by rats...! This time we set off from New Malden station, down Cambridge Avenue and under the



underpass. Here you can pick up the Beverley Brook almost at its start and follow it through Wimbledon Common into Richmond Park at Kingston Vale and along to Roehampton Gate. We had a nice lunch and coffee in the cafe at this point and the walk was taking us familiar territory so far. From Roehampton Gate the route takes you through some woods onto Palewell Common which we didn't know but is very lovely indeed. From Sheen and its very impressive houses we weaved through to Barnes Common and wiggled through by Barn Elms to join the river Thames near the start of the boat race. We needed another cup of coffee by this stage but there are countless places on the Upper Richmond Road in Putney so we were ok. We caught the 265 back to New Malden. Despite the start and end of the walk being a little bit industrial or maybe urban, the bit in the middle is really pretty and at 10km or 6 miles it's a perfect distance.

Sudan – A Forgotten Crisis

Nearly 25 years ago a young man took up his first posting as a diplomat in Sudan in Africa. His mother, Patricia, wanted to see where he would be working and visited him there. They were appalled at the abject poverty in which children were living and determined that they had to find a way to improve their lives with projects that would transform their lives longterm.

Whilst travelling across the desert to North Darfur they met a 9 year old boy called Ibrahim. The river beds had dried up and he was returning from a 7 hour walk for water which he carried in two jerry cans for his family. Under Darfur lies one of the largest aquafers in Africa which could be reached with the help of handpumps, but none were available.

They found Ibrahim's mother camped out under some trees with her other four children. They were there because their three goats could eat the twigs and leaves on the ground under the trees. Patricia was offered their evening meal – a bowl of goat's milk, and she quickly realised that goats were crucial to the health of the children. They provide the nutrients and protein to ward off malnutrition. She could see how important these little goats were to the family, but three goats were not enough to sustain them. If they could "loan" 5 kids to a family, within a couple of years the herd (with the help of a Billy goat) would have grown and 5 could be loaned to another family.

Patricia spoke to the women and young girls in the village to find out what life was like. They told her how terrified they were of childbirth. The only help in a village was an untrained Traditional Birth Attender, someone who had "survived" childbirth but had little knowledge of even the basics of hygiene or first aid. Many of the women had died because of lack of trained healthcare.

She had identified the need for providing loans of goats, hand pumps for clean water, "paravets" to care for the animals and trained midwives and first aid workers. She went back to Khartoum. Five days later, with the help of friends there, KIDS FOR KIDS was founded (<u>www.kidsforkids.org.uk</u>).



23 years on the charity continues to work in the most remote areas and despite continued conflict it has now adopted 110 villages each with a trained committee to run the projects, to repair the water handpumps and ensure that the goat loans pass on from family to family. It has lent donkeys to carry heavy loads, chickens to provide eggs for the elderly, seed and agricultural tools to help produce more crops, and mosquito nets to reduce malaria cases. It has built health centres, trained midwives and built kindergartens to give children an education. It is now planting trees to slow the encroachment of the Sahara desert. Ibrahim, whom Patricia first met as a boy, is now a man who has been to university and has a family of his own.

Almost since the start of independence in the 1950's Sudan has suffered civil war, genocide and misplacement of people. The UN reports that "the complete loss of communications across Sudan hinders all efforts to coordinate the delivery of humanitarian aid, which is urgently and vitally needed by more than 25 million Sudanese". Over 10 million people have lost everything and are homeless. The UN has said that Sudan is the worst humanitarian crisis in the world today. Children are dying right now from starvation in Darfur. The charity's latest initiative is providing Kids Kitchen Kits including lentils, ground nuts, vegetable oil and fresh vegetables to families who have children aged 5 and under. The Kits will supply the essential proteins and minerals for malnourished children who face stunted growth, bone, teeth, hair and even brain damage through lack of vital nutrients.

In our prayers for Ukraine and other crises in the Middle East let us add Sudan, areas in our world suffering from man's inhumanity to man, and for the many charities who are trying to help. Gloria Taviner
