Message from Karl

It was a great pleasure during September to be involved in the welcome service for our new Superintendent Minister, the Reverend Vindra Maraj-Ogden. This marked a new phase of our life together as a Circuit, and so it was fitting that in his sermon, our District Chair – the Reverend Nigel Cowgill – reminded us of the two-fold calling of the Church to be pastoral and prophetic. Our calling is just that – our shared calling, as part of the Body of Christ. It is something we exercise collectively, and not something we delegate to the ordained alone.

To be pastoral is to care for the most vulnerable in our communities, a calling to which God's people were brought back time and again in the Hebrew Scriptures, as they were reminded of their time in Egypt and their responsibility to care for the orphans, the widows and the outsiders among them. Related to this, to be prophetic is to challenge injustice, not only to bind the wounds of the broken but to address those conditions and power structures causing their injury in the first place. I would add that this includes caring not just for our fellow human beings, but for all God has made.

This calling or vocation is shared, and we support one another in both the individual ways we fulfil this in the midst of everyday life and in the corporate actions we can take together. Speaking of being pastoral is a lot more comfortable than being prophetic; to paraphrase a famous quote from Hélder Câmara, when we feed the hungry we are called saintly, but we are demonised when we ask why people have no food. Yet, while the focus may necessarily be more upon one or the other at different times, we cannot ignore the cries of the oppressed in favour of tending the sick alone.

In practice, this finds particular focus in the face of the climate crisis. Chris Packham's recent documentary considered whether it is ever acceptable to break the law in order to attempt to bring about change, and no doubt there will be a spectrum of views on this among you all. However, wherever we take the boundaries of appropriate action to lie, one thing we cannot do is to bury our heads in the sand. This is the biggest and most urgent crisis facing humanity, and it is not enough to feel we have done our bit by fundraising for something like All We Can and assuming that is the end of our work. To be prophetic is to

challenge the powerful for the sake of the powerless, whether human or non-human, so that all might have the chance to flourish.

Consequently, friends, every one of us has a role to play. May we have the courage to step up to the plate, in whichever ways we practically and morally can, so that we might do justice and love mercy as we walk humbly with God towards a better future for the planet.

Welcome Vindra

The Chair of the London District, the Revd Nigel Cowgill, gave the sermon which he began by describing, tongue in cheek, what people generally wanted from a Minister – someone to be available at all hours of the day and night, someone to chair all the meetings and make all the right decisions but at the same time agreeing with everyone and keeping everyone happy by taking all their views into consideration, and many other similarly

He went on to talk about our Calling and Service; themes that were reflected in the hymns which were 409 Let us Build a House; 157 God has Spoken through the prophets; 662 Have you heard God's voice;395 Spirit of the living God and 663 I, the Lord of Sea and Sky. All were ably accompanied and supported by Linda Bridges at the organ and piano, and the

singing was worthy of that number of Methodists with the bit well and truly between their teeth.

The central part of the service was the Welcome to Vindra which was done with formal questions and responses. She then replied with informality, warmth and good humour, alluding to her family background in Trinidad, to her son and to her amazing life and journey doing God's work in a variety of situations.

The Service was livestreamed and is available on the YouTube channel.





Although Vindra will be based at Surbiton, this is an exciting new appointment and beginning for our Church Circuit as a whole. Vindra's first service here at NMMC will be on Sunday 8th October and we do hope as many people as possible will be there on that occasion to meet her and welcome her to our church.

Here is the letter that Vindra sent back in February, introducing herself.

Dear Friends,

I hope that you had a lovely Christmas and I take this opportunity to wish you a happy and healthy 2023!

I am excited to be joining you in September 2023 and thought that it might be useful to share a little bit about who I am.

I was born and raised in the Caribbean island of Trinidad, educated at a convent school and I did my first degree in Business Management at the University of the West Indies. I came to the UK in my early twenties to complete my chartered accountancy exams, subsequently got married and stayed in the UK. I have now lived here longer than I have in Trinidad and am comfortable in both cultures.

If pushed, I would say that my background is Asian Caribbean, and therein lies a story. In 1838, when slavery ended in the Caribbean the former slave population refused to work on the sugar cane plantations. In the UK, because Trinidad was a British colony (until 1962), it was decided to get indentured immigrants from India who would be indentured for a five-year period. This was an experiment to be tried in two islands, Trinidad and Guyana. The first Indian immigrants arrived in 1845 and they stayed, eventually starting small businesses and recognising the value of education, making huge sacrifices to educate their children. I am fifth generation and the only language I speak is English. My parents and younger brother and his family live in Trinidad and I visit regularly.

The only family that I have in the UK is my son Tim and my niece Vandita who is doing her Masters at Leeds University. Whilst both my nephews have attended UK universities, they have returned to live and work in Trinidad. So really the only blood family is Tim. He is 29 and works in Information Technology.

That being said, I am truly blessed by my church family. I did not become a disciple of Jesus until my mid-twenties. My family is not Christian and my only experience of Methodism is the British Connexion. Many stories of that adventure into faith will be shared in sermons, the joys and the heartaches. There are many people who have journeyed with me to this point, friends from the Wembley Methodist Circuit, where I discovered the Methodist church, to my first appointment in South Bedfordshire, then West Hertfordshire, Queenswood School and indeed my friends from my ecumenical training college. I feel well supported and accepted. I also have many friends who are not Christians and they are also very special to me.

I have enjoyed my time as a chaplain and learnt so much, but increasingly over the last 18 months, I have felt God's urging to return to circuit ministry and to use my gifts. I hope that together, in these challenging times, we can continue to prayerfully discern how best to serve God in the communities where we live and work.

I love reading, walking, going to the theatre and the cinema. I am completely content bingewatching Netflix and will make time to meet up with friends. I also like the ballet and opera. My favourite opera is Aida, but I am no expert. I just know what I like.

From memory, in 2011, I was in the stationing process and Kingston and New Malden were looking for a minister. It was my number one choice. The month before, Tim's dad had been diagnosed with Stage 4 lung cancer and he lived in Wembley. I did not put you on my list but opted for Hemel Hempstead instead as it was only twenty minutes away and I could support him. He sadly died after 13 months on the morning of my welcome service to the West Herts Methodist Circuit. Yes, I did attend the welcome service and Tim and I were wonderfully supported by the coach load of people who came from the South Beds Circuit. I had a God moment when I looked at the stationing profiles in November 2022 and there was Kingston, albeit a Superintendency role. You were very much on my list and I am grateful to God that we have been matched. I know that there will be challenges ahead but I am so excited to come to this circuit, to get to know you and to work together. I leave you with the words of Mary, having been told that she would bear the Christ child, "Here am I, the servant of the Lord; let it be with me according to your word". I am holding the churches in the circuit in my prayers.

I am very pleased to report that our corroded old friends which had served us so well for some twenty-five years were given a dignified send-off and didn't have to witness the arrival of their gleaming, young replacements last week. These are now mounted proudly on new stands and are being connected into the heating system, protected from any sediment which lingers in the flushed radiators and pipework by shiny heat-exchangers. Everything is running to schedule and the project should be signed off by 27th September, well before any forecast cold weather. One aspect of the present

circulation system has been identified for modification which will hopefully reduce the quantity of gas we consume, which will of course be monitored closely. Plans for a celebratory party in the Boiler Room are not yet very far advanced, but guided tours will be available on application!

We are well over halfway towards repaying the advance from reserves for this project and with some of our key fund-raising events ear-marked for this purpose and the launch of a campaign for significant personal donations, we hope it will be possible to clear the debt within this Church Year. Check the thermometer in Wesley's. Very many people have supported the various aspects of this project and it is a tribute to an active sense of community commitment that we are now so well placed.

Come along with your camera – doesn't need to be anything fancy, and a mobile phone is perfectly ok – and take photos in beautiful surroundings.




