

Message from Karl

It is often quite pleasant to sit in Welsey's and just watch the world go by – the people walking or cycling down the High Street, the lorries struggling to get out of Cambridge Road having made their deliveries, the many buses and cars that pass the church – and to observe the changes of the seasons as leaves and skies gradually turn from one shade to another. The recent shift in the weather towards the cooler end of the spectrum, and the emergence of yellows and browns on the trees, make it quite clear that autumn has firmly arrived.

This is my favourite time of the year, not least because of the array of colour that makes an excellent subject for both landscape and wildlife photography. Together with the cool and crisp mornings, the dark gradually drawing in sooner making for snug evenings curled up on the sofa with a hot chocolate, and never having quite lost my enthusiasm for kicking the leaves on the ground, there is much to enjoy. However, I recognise in all of this that not everybody has a warm, safe and comfortable home to relax in, and in the absence of that, autumn can feel very different.

On October 4th this year, an event called 'The Big Sleep Out' is being held in the grounds of All Saints Church in Kingston to raise money for and mark the thirtieth birthday of Kingston Churches Action on Homelessness. The invitation is to spend one night experiencing some of the challenges faced by people sleeping on the streets, and to learn more about what is happening locally. Those sleeping out are seeking sponsorship, but donations can also be made online directly to KCAH by going to <u>www.justgiving.com/campaign/big-sleep-out-24</u> and giving what you can.

While I will not be sleeping out this year, I have recently started volunteering with Kingston Street Pastors. On most Friday and Saturday nights, groups made up of members of a range of local churches go out into Kingston town centre in order to help, care and listen to those we meet. As the nighttime economy evolves, the times at which teams go on patrol have moved in turn, and so shifts now cover 8pm to 2am, by which time as the photo shows, it can get pretty chilly even on a comparatively mild night!



Many of the people we meet are rough sleepers, such as Phil in this picture (who did give his permission for me to use this photo), and it is both moving and quite sad to be thanked for stopping to talk to them and for treating them like real human beings. Thankfully, most of us will never experience trying to find somewhere relatively safe and warm to rest, without ready access to sanitary facilities or somewhere to keep belongings other than with us, with the constant threat of being moved on, harassed or even attacked by passers-by. What makes it worse, as I have learnt through stopping to chat to various folk, is that being treated as effectively invisible and/or a social nuisance is so commonplace. There are often a range of complex reasons as to why somebody ends up in that situation, and being judged by others does not help anything.

A little while ago, Georgie Forshaw from KCAH came to speak to the congregation at Kingston Methodist Church about their work. The number of people accessing their services has increased sharply as the cost-of-living crisis and a shortage of affordable housing continue to bite. This has in recent months included many working people on salaries of over £50,000, who nonetheless find themselves unable to navigate a private rental sector in which prices have soared, and mustering a large sum of money for a deposit and advance rent is not always readily possible at short notice. It is frightening to think that the onebedroom house I rented when I lived in Milton Keynes is now on the market for £1,100 per calendar month, compared to £650 when I moved out in 2015.

There are no easy answers here, but whether it is supporting the vital work of KCAH or simply taking a moment to pause and reflect on how we respond to someone on the streets, can make a real difference. So, as autumn continues and the nights get colder, may we do what we can to address homelessness, remembering that there is no such thing as a person who does not matter to God, and Jesus himself did not always have a fixed place to lay his head.

Part of the sanctuary was included in Wesley's & the pews were removed during the project. The stained-glass window was also installed at this time with the hymn 'Summer suns are glowing' as the theme.

A special Dedication Service was held on Saturday 17th June 1995 so our anniversary celebration will take place on Saturday 14th & Sunday 15th June 2025. There is much to celebrate including the many community activities that take place every week in Wesley's.

Friends of Friendless Churches

During a walk above Matlock and Matlock Bath in Derbyshire over the summer, we came across this impressive set of gates with the following plaque next to them.





The following is extracted from their very interesting website friendsoffriendlesschurches.org.uk

Over the centuries, churches have fallen out of use for many reasons. But we believe that these buildings represent the spiritual and artistic investment of generations, that they belong to all of us, and should be preserved for the future.

Who are the Friends? The Friends love unloved churches. Without us, they would be torn down, sold as houses, or abandoned. Since 1957 we have campaigned for redundant churches to be preserved, as "sermons in stone".

We currently care for more than 60 places of worship in England and Wales. In Wales our work is funded by Cadw and the Church in Wales. But in England we rely on the generosity of donors and members.

What do we do? We preserve these churches for the local community and visitors to enjoy. We make them wind and water-tight, put back roofs and windows, repair drainpipes and stonework. And we make sure they are open, or have nearby friendly guardians to keep an eye on them. Friendless no more!

Barbara Cavalier's Chocolate Mousse without eggs

Spotlight is always happy to print one of Barbara's recipes. They are always delicious and she knows not to give us anything too tricky to do!

255g Dark chocolate
250ml Milk
500g Greek yoghurt
3 tbsp Caster sugar
Pinch of salt
1 tbsp Grand Marnier could be added for grown up mousse

Melt the chocolate in the milk (I put bowl over water).

Add the caster sugar and pinch of salt, stir well until incorporated.

Leave to cool (I stand the bowl in cold water for quickness).

When cool, mix together with the yoghurt (if using, stir in Grand Marnier).

Portion into dishes and put in the fridge to get really cold.

This is very rich!

For Diabetics this can be made without the sugar.

For Vegans it can be made using vegan milk and yoghurt.
