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#### **Message from Karl**

#### Greetings!

Every year, my primary school used to put on a Christmas play. Every year, I wasn't allowed to take an acting role because (for some reason best known only to the teachers) they were always musicals and, as anyone who has heard my singing will know, it isn't among my gifts! The one exception was the memorable year I was allowed to be 'Third Sheep' and had to say 'baa!' at various points. Nativity plays were, therefore, one of those things that I could not wait to get out of the way. For many within our society (including churchgoers), that's how Advent feels – it's the boring bit before the party.

There's undoubtedly something of a gap between the Church's understanding of Advent as a space for reflection and slowing down, and the mad rush which goes on in the world beyond

its doors, that seem to start earlier each year (of course, that may be because I'm turning into a grumpy old man!). What we're waiting for is nothing less than God's love embodied in human form, showing up in our neighbourhood and transforming the world forever. However, in the midst of the busyness, it's easy for this to get lost in a sea of Brussel sprouts and tinsel.

Things are even harder if, for whatever reason, it's difficult for you to embrace the mood of joy that almost seems to be compulsory in December, reinforced by advertising and the pressure for the 'big day' to be perfect. That's why we're once again holding a Blue Christmas service (20<sup>th</sup> December). Blue Christmas is a special service for everybody who, for whatever reason, finds Christmas difficult. In poetry, music, silence and prayer, it offers the space to bring those things that are painful to God, so they can be held and acknowledged, without having to put on a smile and pretend to be happy.

Whatever our feelings about Christmas, Advent affords us an opportunity to take a deep breath, and to reflect on how things are in terms of our relationship with God. We're invited to ask what might happen if we allowed Jesus into our lives that bit more fully, that bit more radically, and to experience the difference that might make. It won't necessarily be easy, because stepping out of the darkness into God's light may well show us things about ourselves we rather wish weren't there, but we do so safe in the knowledge that we are loved without any conditions attached. The truth of Advent is the faithfulness of God in the midst of our messes and muddles.

I'd like to encourage you, therefore, to take a few minutes each day to ponder these things, and to read for yourselves those great prophecies of Isaiah and others that point forward to the coming of Emmanuel, God with us. Writing to a people struggling in exile, they brought Israel promises of hope and new beginnings, which crystallised hundreds of years later as God's initiative and Mary's 'yes' came together to change everything. God's love now has a human face, because God showed up, and took the risk of entering into this broken world, loving us to the end, even those of us stuck with playing the equivalents of Third Sheep!

#### **Toilet Twinning**



Each year the Wives and Friends group support a charity and raise funds from the Christmas Tree Festival and our fund raising sale in the summer. For 2017/18 we chose 'Toilet Twinning'. A strange charity I hear you say but, and I quote

"Good sanitation and clean drinking water are fundamental to communities. Yet 1 in 3 people worldwide don't have access to somewhere safe, private or hygienic to go to the toilet." The human and economic impact of this is enormous.

Every two minutes a child dies from diarrhoeal diseases and 60% of all rural diseases are caused by poor hygiene and sanitation.

Investing in sanitation is one of the most cost-effective forms of aid. For every £1 spent on water and sanitation programmes, £5 is returned through saved time, reduced health costs and increased productivity"

So, we raised £320 (enough for 5 toilets) and have now received 2 framed certificates, one for a church toilet block in Lusaka, Zambia and one for a latrine in Choma, Southern Province, Zambia. Obviously we have been twinned with toilets already in existence from previous funding so our money will go towards a future project.

These certificates will be hung in the two Welcome Area toilets and in the words of the charity - "your twinned toilets are helping to flush away poverty! Please hang your certificates with pride.



#### **Children's Page**

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Here are some facts about Advent Calendars:

There are many types of calendars used in different countries. The most common ones in the UK and USA are made of paper or card with 24 or 25 little windows on. A window is opened on every day in December and a Christmas picture is displayed underneath.

In the 19th Century, German protestant Christians counted down to Christmas by marking 24 chalk lines on a door and rubbing one off every day in December.

Paper calendars were first popular in Germany in the early 1900s, although people made their own ones from the 1850s.

There's a debate about exactly where and when the first mass produced calendar was printed - but it was certainly in Germany in the early 1900s. During World War II, the production of Advent calendars stopped due to a shortage of cardboard.

When they were first made, scenes from the Christmas Story and other Christmas images were used, such as snowmen and robins, but now many calendars are made in the themes of toys, television programmes and sports clubs. Some of these types of calendar even have chocolate under each window, to make every day in December that little bit better! I used to like those when I was a little boy (and still do now!!!)! The first calendar with chocolate in it was made in 1958, although they only became really popular in the 1980s.

Some European countries such as Germany use a wreath of fir with 24 bags or boxes hanging from it. In each box or bag there is a little present for each day.

There are also now all different types of Advent Calendars used to sell and promote different products including chocolate, perfumes, alcohol and beauty products. You can even get advent calendars for your pets with dog or cat treats in them! The world's largest advent calendar was made in 2007 at the St Pancras Train Station in London, England. It was 71m tall and 23m wide and celebrated the refurbishment of the station. The most expensive advent calendar ever was made in 2010 by a jewellers in Belgium. It was made of 24 glass tubes each containing some diamonds and silver! It was worth about \$3.3 million (€2.5 million | £2.1 million)!!!

You can also now get online Advent or 'Christmas Countdown' calendars. So during December, why don't you visit an online Advent Calendar and find out\_about something Christmassy each day!



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### Our Refurbished Organ

At the end of last month, three members of the Organ Committee made a day trip to the workshops of Pipe Organ Services near Melton Mowbray which is the firm charged with refurbishing and reinstalling our organ. We were shown the re-leathering of the chests, cleaning and repairing of some of the nearly 1100 pipes, the wiring up of the extensive printed circuit boards which will control the digital action and, perhaps the most spectacular, the nearly-complete refurbished console from where everything on the new organ will be played and controlled.
